ublican rascals out of office, or at least defend the offices they themselves now hold, have a hard time refraining from seeing bad news in every kind of economic report.

It is now so close to election that the ordinary voter ought to be warned, not to let either political party tint the statis-

And it would be a situation of justice for neither political party if the situation should ever be allowed to deat the polls Nov. 3 would go to that party which happened to be able to come up with the most encouraging, or the most discouraging, economic statistic of

At the moment, the latest statistic that showing that gross national product, or the nation's total output of goods and services, had a fairly healthy increase during the third quarter of the year, is a statistic which seems to fit nicely into Republican hopes that the economic battles of 1970 can be won without yielding any more substantial ground either to inflation or to unemployment,

At the same time, there is continuing memployment, heavy in some localized pockets, which is good news to pobody, not even, for that matter, to the Democrats who may think its existence is good for their political cause.

The truth would seem to be that we are skirting the fringes of a recession, that an unpleasant part of a gradual, non-surgical cure for inflation is a temporary dip in both profits and employment, but that if we can keep on with the gradual climb which has now begun we will have come out of our trouble with minimum of actual injury.

As for the respective merits of the two political parties in dealing with such a near-recession, any difference is more oratorical than real. The Democrats were, of course, in power during the years when the economic conditions of 1970 as these conditions emerged, they might conceivably have decided to let oned the basic half of the crisis, but have guaranteed it would be much worse when it had to be dealt with. Republican policy may have brought the conomic crisis to a head earlier, but that our emergence from our difficulty is now going to be less painful than it might have been. But as far as the favor of a continuation of the moderate policies which now do seem to have some chance of reaching ground that is good and safe for all.

It might not have been the worst location in the world, but it was far from the best, considering the handlcaps involved.

Of course, none of the problems will be apparent to viewers of the two - part "Snow Train" episode of "Gunsmoke" to be broadcast Oct. 19 and Oct. 26 in color on the CBS Television Network.

The script by Preston Wood had been all but discarded because it required a 19th century steam locomotive - the kind now run only as summertime tourist attractions - against a background of wooded, snowy

Production manager Paul Nichols learned, however, of the vintage train operated by the Black Hills Central Railroad near Custer, South Dakota, just as a freak spring snowstorm blanketed that area.

The railroad fired up its old locomotive while "Gunsmoke" executive producer John Mantley brought a 70-man crew, headed by star James Arness, to Custer.

The same train which appears in the episode also was the only transportation available to the location site, a mile and a half from the nearest auto road. It took a bulldozer 18 hours to break a trail for the company's mobile film van to

get to the site.

Every morning the Hollywood contingent was joined by 25 Sioux Indians, enlisted for extra roles from the nearby Rosebud and Pine Ridge reservations. All piled aboard the train to ride to the location.

At the noon lunch break, all were taken back to the windy crossroads, where an open-sided dining tent had been set up. Then, it was back to the filming site aboard the train until

quitting time at sunset. It was bitterly cold the first two days of the four-day shooting schedule. Then a thaw set in, and filming had to be speeded up before the snow melted.

Mantley himself headed one camera crew and director Gunnar Helstrom worked with the other. There were hasty improvisations with sound, camera today will be the subject of the appearing snow.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) -What's this the movie studios suing the networks?

At first blush, it doesn't make sense. After all, the television networks are good customers of the film companies. All of them sell their old movies to television, and most studios also produce television series.

Yet last week seven of the biggest movie firms in the country filed a civil suit in New York against CBS and ABC on anti-

The federal court suit sought to stop the two networks from producing, distributing or in-vesting in television entertainment and feature film programs. The crux of the issue appears to be that CBS and ABC have entered the field of making feature movies for theaters and eventually for sale to television.

Significantly, NBC was not a defendant. Except for investment in Bob Hope and Elvis Presley movies, NBC has not entered the feature film market.

"CBS and ABC are moving movies which will compete with the major companies' films in the television market," said an industry source. "Thus the networks are in the position of buying from themselves.

'The government wouldn't let the film companies do that. Most of them owned theater chains in which they showed their own movies. But the Justice Department made the production companies divorce their theaters. So why should the networks be allowed to make and show their own films?"

The networks deny that they are monopolistic in making feature films. CBS claimed the suit was "apparently an attempt to supress competition during a period of economic distress."

Both networks have denied that they got into feature filmmaking for the purpose of supplying themselves with future programming. Their avowed aim was to diversify their companies and sell films to theaters at a time when product was in short supply.
