man Thomas J. Meskill called Wednesday for a "sweeping reorganization" of the state court system that would include abolishing the Court of Common Pleas. 'Connecticut is facing a judi-

cial crisis," said the Republican candidate for governor referring to the big backlog of cases in the courts.

"For a combination of rea sons - public apathy, lack of funds, absence of leadershipthe courts have failed to keep up with the times," he said. Meskill proposed to merge the Court of Common Pleas with the Superior Court, establish an appellate court between the Superior Court and the Supreme Court, and set up specialized divisions within the Circui Court and the Superior Court. "The adoption of the measures I propose will strengthen the fight against crime," said Meskill at a state capitol news con-

"I fully recognize that some of these changes will require amendments to the state constitution. This will take time but there must be a beginning. Under questioning from newsmen. Meskill said he does not favor a no-fault system of hand ling routine auto accident cases, because it would not adequately compensate victims for pain and suffering.

He also indicated he was not calling for any change in the probate court system . "at the present time."

Uccello And Steele

Voters in the First and Second Congressional Districts have, for next Tuesday, choices remarkably similar in na-

In each District, the Democratic party has nominated a faithful, routine party figure. In each case, the main distinction of the Democratic nominee consists of the length of the connection with the Democratic state machine. This could, in each case, explain the success of the particular nominee in the party primary battle by which each nomination was determined. It is not the basis for any public excitement over the remult of that primary struggle.

The Republican candidates came to their nominations by party acclamation rather than party strife. In each case, the question was not what regular party figure should be rewarded by the chance to take a great long step up the party ladder, but a question of whether the party was going to be lucky enough and fresh talent which seemed capable of moving naturally into the opportunity for service at Washington. The Republican party was lucky in both instances, and wise enough to welcome its own good luck.

In the First District, Mayor Ann Uccello is a candidate who has already demonstrated, in the key and difficult city of Hartford, her ability to offer voters something they prize above the tired rivalries and divisions of old party machines. The nomination she holds is normally considered a lost cause. But indications are that, this year, the normal Democratic majorities in this district may decrease to the point where Miss Uccello has an even chance at achieving an individual victory. Helping this intelligent, forthright, liberated lady open her career in Washington is an opportunity which ought to appeal across all routine party lines.

In the Second District, the Republican nominee is Robert Steele, a young man who did an impressive amount of homework and advance preparation for his entrance into the political field. His campaigning has been clean and to the point; both his mental equipment and his personality combine to create spontaneously favorable reaction to his appearances throughout Eastern Connecti-

The Congressional race in the Second District is, in normal political years, something of a tossup, easily influenced one way or another by the appearance of higher than usual quality in a candidate. The young Mr. Steele approaches the major issues of the day with a sanity and sense which ought to be rewarded by a conclusive mandate next Tuesday. 🐃

In neither the First nor the Second District is there any likelihood that victory for the Republican nominees will merely result in the provision of rubber stamp support for anybody. In both instances this opportunity is to send a Republican President support which will be the more valuable because it takes its own independent and discerning look at each individual proposition. There are some candidates who give the public the kind of service which builds their party instead of giving their party the kind of service, which exploits the public. We recommend Mayor Uccello, to First District voters, and Bob Steele, to Second District voters, as that kind of candidate.

Mr. Kennedy's lament might be echoed by many men and women these days who find that the press of immediate responsibilities leaves little time for reflec tion, for leisurely consideration of larger matters. Nor must one be a man of affairs to conclude that the pace of modern living scarcely permits the daily hour or two of solitude that restores an individual to himself.

How does one go about finding those moments in a day when one is free not only from interruption but from the possibility of interruption? In truth, those twin benefactors, job and family, are partners in a subtle tyranny.

It was because of such solemn houghts that one Sunday morning I decided to cancel that evening's airplane reservation and set about getting from Washington, D.C., to Maine by an alter native means. The change of plans required haste. After calling a taxi and packing a sultcase, I spent 10 minutes selecting two books to take along. One was 'The Jewler's Eye, a collection of essays by William F. Burkley, Jr., and the other was Typhoon, a collection of short stories by Joseph Conrad.

These books, together with two Sunday papers. The National Observer, the New Yorker, three packages of tobacco, an extra pipe, two notebooks, six pencils two ballpoints, and a package of peanutbutter crackers were jammed into two breifcases whose hinges seemed ready to give up the game.

Once settled in the Penn Central's 10 a.m. Washington-to-Boston train, I unsnapped one briefcase to remove the newspapers. The peanut-butter cracker flew out and landed under the legs of the lady in the next chair.

In retrieving the crackers, I made a riend. The lady and her recently retired. usband were on their way to Boston, not because they knew anhone there or wanted to see anything special there, but because they knew anyone there or places you just sit at home and keep celing your pulse."

My chair was located next to a window that had a bullet hole in it. This is not inusual on Penn Central trains, many of ose windows are webs of cracks. Var dals along the right-of-way apparently enjoy throwing rocks or shooting bullet into passenger cars. When I have a choice. I generally sit by a window that has taken a rock rather than by one pierced by a bullet, but when you buy our ticket in the station instead of on e train you have to be content with what you get.

We were just leaving Baltimore when the retired couple rose to go into the club car, and we were just leaving Philadel phia when they returned. I had been reading myself into a blissful state of nawareness, when I was roused by meone's hand on my shoulder.

"I just love William F. Buckley, Jr." said the lady who had just returned from 0 minutes in the club car "I just wish I was that smart. He doesn't let anybody walk all over him."

The lady pulled the book from my ands and Then she slapped her husband on the top of his head, "That's brains, John," she said., "Brains, brains, brains. You've got to use your brains and you can't let everybody walk all over you. That was always your trouble. You let too many copie take advantage of you. That's why you never got any further than you

The train pulled into Boston's South Station at 7 p.m., right on time. There were not many moments between Philadelphia and Boston when the lady was quiet, but her several visits to the club car offered occasional respite.

A taxi took me to the Trailways bus depot where I boarded a Golden Eagle express for Portland. Trailways equips its Golden Eagle buses with a steward ess who serves small cups of soft drinks. Unfortunately, the Golden Eagle broke down eight miles south of the New lampshire line. Some of us got out to watch the irritated driver poke about in the gigantic rear engine. A passenger of fered to help. He said he taught sewage disposal at a vocational school in South Portland, Another passenger came over to shake his hand. "You mean they called you the. "That's right, The Lone Ranger." We got into Portland about midnight and I rented a car for the drive to Camden, a village farther north on the Maine coast. In Camden I checked into the Camden Manor Inn. The trip from Washington had taken longer than expected, but it had provided a certain amount of diversion - if not quite the supernal peace I had had in mind.

At the Camden Manor Inn, the desk clerk assigned me to room 5. The hotel is a very old, charming clapboard structure that had weathered many a bad winter. One result is that the floor inroom 5 is badly warped, causing the foot of the bed to be several inches higher



In the present campaign, this columnist's regret that Senator Dodd has insisted on prolonging the personal agony of his politi cal career has been met an matched by our columnist shock at the identity of some of thos Connecticut citizens who some how manage to pretend that nothing ever happened to the Dodd career. It cannot be that they do not know; it has to be that they have somehow managed not to consider it real or important.

But something of the potential Dodd phenomenon can, after all, be explained in terms of strong dealogical, as distinguis from moral, persuasions, or in terms of personal relationships The possible madness of success for the proposal for annual sessions of the Connecticut Legislature is something else again.

This columnist doesn't think he has ever seen quite so much progress forward for any idea quite so illogical and preposter-

Nurtured, understandably, in the membership of the Legislature itself-a membership natu rally susceptible to a proposal which will lead to greater pow er and to all the trappings of power, including higher self-set salaries and constantly escalat ing staff and office space expenditures—the annual session idea has somehow managed t spread out into those zones o public life occupied by well in tentioned organizations such as the League of Women Voters, Public Expenditure Council, and the state Chamber o Commerce.

That the League should go for annual sessions is not too surprising. It went for theory, t the neglect of realities, in its advocacy of that one-man-onevote reapportionment which has so-downgraded the character of the Connecticut Legislature Whtatever caused the Publi Expenditure Council, which had the advantage of really knowing the Legislature at work, to re verse its own original common sense aversion to bigger and bigger doses of the same, re-

mains a mystery. But the general atmosphere unbellevably for most people who have actually observed the Legislature at work, and meas ured the actual distribution of power between the Legislativ and Executive branches, is that the annual session proposal is ever to pass over the East, in one of those very fine things certain to come eventually, and therefore worthy of being has tened now.

And the probability seems to be that the people of Connecticut next Tuesday may accept, whether by indifference or even enthusiasm, a proposal which, in this columnist's opinion, they ought to avoid as if it

were a plague. The potential success of the annual sessions amendment is, we suppose, proper punishment for a columnist for permitting himself the luxury of opinionitis.





He says bonds may be purchased at 6 per cent while onstruction costs are escalating at upwards of 12 per cent per year.

A concerted effort to coordinate utility installation and con struction on the roads would be made under the proposed plans, O'Neill says. The Board of Directors will be asked to consider an ordinance which would levy fines for disturbing new pavement. 



Phase one extends from the treatment plant to the Lake St. area with the main interceptor line going to Waterfront Park and Gerald Park. The Waterfront Park pumping station would also border on phase three of the program.

Phase two extends from Lake St. to Northeast Shores in the Springdale Ave. area, with phase three from Cross St. to the edge of Gerald Park. Phase four is from Waterfront Park to Waterfront Heights along Daly Rd., with phase five go-ing to High St., Snake Hill Rd., and Nathan Hale Heights area. Three pumping stations are included in the plan: Waterfront Heights, Lakewood Heights and Oak Grove.

If voters approve the project, probably to appear on a special referendum early next year, groundbreaking would begin in late 1972 with completion of the first part of the project early in 1976.

Emerging from an auditorium where GOP partisans had given him a warm reception, Nixon climbed atop the hood of his imousine in the glare of photo loodlights.

Facing directly toward his noisy opponents about 50 yards away, he thrust his jaw forward and flung both arms upward With his fingers, he formed "V" symbols, waving toward the crowd.

Most of the demonstrator were young persons, hundred of whom had rallied at the San Jose State College campus for a march to the aulitorium.

The mobbing of the Nixon motorcade lasted perhaps five minutes as his car moved through narrow opening that had bee cleared in the crowd by helmeted riot police.

His limousine and other vehicles in the cavalcade were hit repeatedly by large rocks and other objects. Several persons, including a Secret Service agent, a newsman and a televi sion cameraman suffered minor
