

The Eight Questions fanchester voters, next Tuesday, will ind eight questions on their voting ma-

The last four questions are Mariches-

ter bonding proposals.

estion No. 1 concerns an amend ment to the state Constitution which would include the office of attorney gen eral among those whose election is provided for by the Constitution itself. This is a legal nicety, of no vital importance. Question No. 2 proposes an amendment to the state Constitution to bar anyone younger than 21 from being elected to office in the General Assembly.

This amendment is being offered to the voters by the action of the very same Legislature which also offers the amendment proposed under Question 3, which is to lower the Connecticut legal voting age to 18 years.

The same legislators who were so enthusiastic about giving Connecticut 18 year olds the right to vote were, then, also alarmed over the possibility that some 18 year old might be elected to be a state representative or a state senator, or to serve in some other lesser public.

The presence of both proposed constitutional amendments on our voting machines is illustration enough of the shallow motivation of the politicians who have been pushing the 18 year old vote

As for those young people who have themselves been legitimately campaigning for this right, we respect their aspiration, and the study and interest they give to political issues.

As for voting on Questions 2 and 3, we cannot refrain from suggesting that those who intend to vote yes on Question 3, to permit the 18-yearolds to vote, should vote no on Question 2, and thus be consistent.

Question 4 is the proposed amendment to the state Constitution which would in answer to the dearest wishes of our legislators themselves, compel the Connecticut State Legislature to meet annually. There has not been the slightest responsible presentation of even a probability that meeting every year instead of every other year would yield the state anything more than twice as much of the same thing. The voters of Connecticut should vote no, and thus try to call some kind of halt to the selfintoxicated effort of our legislative branch to aggrandize itself beyond all need and reason.

Of the four state questions presented, it is Question 4 which concerns a major state issue, and which has the power to set the pattern for the way we do our state business for a long time to' come. We can always, in future years, if experience should ever indicate it has become really necessary, move to annual sessions. But once we give the Legislature annual sessions, it is never going to move to give the voters of the state any chance to change the system back.

Questions 5, 6, 7, and 8 on the machines Tuesday are all local Manchester bond issue questions.

The authorization under Question 5 will be for \$1,996,000 for additions to and renovations of Nathan Hale, Robertson and Keeney St. schools. Manchester is not in the habit of turning down well

Under Question 6, the voters of Manchester are asked to authorize the borrowing of \$3,605,000 for the construction and reconstruction of highways. In the past, this newspaper and a majority of the voters on our referendums as well as the Republican party which now, as the party in control of the Board of Directors, has authorized this proposal, have all had serious questions about the advisability of issuing bonds for what might more properly be considered routine maintenance expenses,

In the meantime, however, the street situation in Manchester has deteriorated to the point where much of the work that now has to be done must of necessity be classified as "construction" rather than patchwork surfacing. We regret what seems the civic necessity of a vote in

Question 7 asks the voters of Manches-

ter to authorize bonding of \$970,000 for the construction and installation of sidewalks, the necessity for sidewalks being one of the penalties of becoming more the busy city than the charming village, and Question 8 would authorize the issuance of \$185,000 in bonds for the acquisition of more land for use as off street parking downtown, which represents the way we are going to have to struggle and improvise to keep downtown Manchester lively and prosperous in the absence of any consistent plan for re-

Except for those who may wish to reassure the young people of our time that we elders do not condemn them, we do not see much opportunity for any happy oting among the questions on the machines next Tuesday. The most serious tasks at hand, it seems to us, are those of saying no to annual sessions of the Legislature, yes to bonds for schools and

A Pig In The Poke

The voters of Connecticut are being asked to buy a pig in the poke in the Election Day proposition that would put the General Assembly on annual ses-

Legislative reformers place a conversion to annual sessions high on the list of revisions they deem necessary to streamline the lawmaking process. This sort of approach asks us to accept, virually on blind faith, that the caliber of the legislators' performance will sudder y spurt to new levels once the General Assembly meets more frequently. In the absence of any concrete assur-

ances to support such thinking, others of opposite light, and that is that it would simply be a matter of a bad performance being repeated twice as often. The wish to modernize the General As-

mbly does not belong to reform-mindlegislators, or to crusading non-profit lations and research organizations alone. It is a universal wish among any and all who have observed, or have been touched, by the tortolse-and-hare, marionette-strung, blindman's buff, shill and shell type of activity that passes for leg-It is simply that the doctrinaire atti-

tude linking annual sessions with a more fruitful and responsible legislative performance puts the cart before the horse. Annual sessions will in no way guarantee that the General Assembly will be shorn of the tremendous waste, stupefyng duplication, outworn and useless tralitions, and creaking and disorganized egislative practices that have been its demarks for so long.

Nor will annual sessions in any way mprove the abilities, motives and dedi ation of the men and women who come the State Capitol to serve as senators representatives. The able and conerned will still be so, as will the indifferent and inept.

Annual sessions is an idea that had been lying about for some time, or until few foundations and research groups ecided in the last decade that its time ias come. Growing alarm over a recedweakened state role in the federalstate-local governmental system helped give annual sessions high priority status mong legislative reform crusaders.
