DETROIT (AP) - The United Auto Workers and General Motors Corp. today reached a ten-tative agreement on a new labor contract which could put the strike-crippled auto giant close to full production by the end of Details of the settlement were withheld until later in the day after a meeting of the union's 350 member GM council which must okay the pact before it is put before the rank-and-file for

"The cost of the settlement is abstantially more than the anticipated increase of productivi-ty," Earl Bramblett, GM's toy sargainer, said when asked whether the pact was inflation-"That's the general definition of inflation," he added. Sources close to the bargain-

ing table said the three-year pact included these items. -A union demand for a re turn to an unlimited cost of living wage escalator under which workers wages move up or down according to quarterly adjustments in the Consumer Price Index. -Retirement at \$500 a month

We are, half a century later, still deep into the troubles of the world as a whole, but no longer very sure about the possibilities of any kind of peace, no longer quite as blissfully certain as we were cnce about the inevitable natural triumph of democracy.

So we have narrowed down the significance of our celebration and observance on the 11th day of November. Instead of celebrating a victory in one war and a fanciful all time triumph for peace and democracy, we have turned, more realistically and more sadly, to an acknowledgment of the sacrifice and service of hose men and women who have participated in all our nation's wars, past and present. We cannot resist having

Every time there is a war, it is a dignity and the proper destiny of man, a brutal collapse of the values taught in our own religions. Repeatedly, however, we fail in the effort to devise and adhere to any better system of world life. Then, when the price for our failure has to be paid, we call on those too young to have had any part in the selection of values or of policy, and demand of them that they must not fall, even though the ef-"-In the day when heaven was falling,

He eemed to think always in terms of some long, continuous journey rather than in terms of local destinations. aulle had been in position to have more to say about the shape of the post-war world, he would have done better than Churchill, Roosevelt and Stalin did. His ring deference to history did not alvere moments when he seemed not much above the rank of a chauvinistic outfoon, with his dreams of old-fashioned glories for a modern France. But certain sanities did persist in him. He was never capable, as were the Russian, British and American statesmen of the day, of visualizing Europe as anything less than one community He matched the obstinacy with which he fought for the survival of France in World War II with the tingling courage with which he fought to make that same France divest tself of its colonial yoke in Algeria, Future historians, reading the story of our times, will encounter in his Memoirs, again and again, those alternative policies which, if adopted, might have averted the cold war, and whatever possibility there still is that the cold war tangle will have to end in hot conflict. In retrospect, he seems the only statesman of his time who really did stand off

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Labor Department says young people, especially women, planning on becoming teachers in the 1970s should think instead bout jobs in other fields.

In a once-in-a-decade forecast released Tuesday, the department noted the dwindling demand in education, a field entered by two out of three women college graduates in the past, and warned those who pursue that aim could wind up in unemployment lines.

But, the report said, state and ocal governments will offer 52 per cent more jobs by 1980, services and professions 40 per cent more, construction 35 per cent, finance, insurance and real estate 24 per cent, trade 23 per cent, manufacturing 11 per cent, and transportation, comnunication and public utilities and the federal government 10

Mining jobs will fall 9 per cent and agriculture 23 per cent. The document said the elementary and secondary teacher ob decline will bottom out by 1973. Unwilling to give up either the dog or the apartment, the Scotts determined to fight. In a court hearing, they offered this argument to the judge: "Rover happens to be a quiet, well-behaved animal who never bothers a soul and never does any damage. Of course, if he should cause trouble, we would gladly take full responsibility. But in

the meantime, enforcing this nopets rule against us would be arbitrary and unfair.' Nevertheless, the court held they would have to abide by the rule or move out. The judge said a landlord may reasonably be concerned not only about noise, and not only about damage, but also about the likelihood that other tenants might want to keep

Generally speaking, the law gives a landlord broad discretion with regard to pets on the premises. In fact, even if no restric tions are spelled out in the lease. he may still be able to take legal

Thus, another landlord won an eviction order against an elderly woman who harbored no less than 25 cats in her small apartment. Even though pets were not mentioned in the lease, the court said 25 cats were—simply as a matter of common sense-"23 cals too

On the other hand, a landlord may lose his enforcement rights by "going easy" on a tenant for a substantial period. In one case, a landlord tried to evict a tenant after permitting him to keep a parrot for almost four years. In these circumstances, the landlord was held to have waived the rights he had under the lease. Paint can provide cheerful inpiration in a jiffy, and a paint project can be great therapy for people who have time on their

Flat surfaces can be done easily with a roller. Moldings, bor-ders and furniture can come alive with a paint brush of colr. And you can quickly see results. Just be sure there is time to finish a project before kibitz-Here are some suggestions

-A string of closet doors in a hallway-must they be white? Why not paint them a vivid color to match the rug, an accent in the rug or the hall draperies. Consider painting the door moldings in an accent color or white. Deep colors-rosy shades and blues can be love-. The refreshing new pastelsdeep yellow, pink, green—can Is there a dull looking wood

floor in the children's room or another room of the house? Why not treat it to a special color finish. It is just as easy to care for a dark red floor as an ugly brown-stained one. A cantelour color can be beautiful. Give it shiny, plastic-looking finish, i shine appeals to you. -Is there a beat-up piece of

furniture that can use a coat of paint? Investigate the frosty-fin ish kits that come complete with paint, glaze, cheese cloth, sand paper. Different finishes may be btained from the same treatnent, depending on the furni-

For example, a Martha Washington chamber sewing table that was to become an end table was stripped of paint and sanded to produce a matte finish; whereas a shiny finished and unsanded coffee table permitted a creamy, frosty shining finish. Mint color paint was used on both pieces, but the color effect was completely different. Before sanding a piece, consider whether you would like the creamy look.

-Old white metal cabinets in the kitchen may be treated to a sunshine color such as yellow or warm shade such as bittersweet—an orangey-red. (Use a paint brush for cabinets.) Bittersweet is simply great with white, especially white plastic, if you happen to have and white appliances-washing machine, dish washer, refrigerator, stove, whatever, (It would be a nuisance to paint these, if

the look were preferable.) Dye your curtains to match bittersweet, and if you happen to have a white kitchen floor or a terrazo-style vinyl, it will complement it even more. -Large houseplants can be used as beautiful decorative accents by painting willow wastebaskets and using them as outer containers. with demand. During 1969, Alaska produced 570,000 pounds of reindeer meat hrough a state-operated slaugh terhouse at Nome and a privately owned facility at Nunivak on the Alaska Peninsula.

"But there hasn't been a real oush to move it outside the orthwest and southwest Alaska area," Kern says, "The local iemand is this large or larger. Outside demand is wide pread, however. Last year nore than 25,000 pounds of rein. deer meat was shipped to Germany, Kern says, and there have been requests for as much as 100 tons for export.
