goodby today to Charles de-Gaulle. In the magnificence of Notre Dame Cathedral, yet with the simplicity he ordained, world leaders joined thousands of Parisians at an austere Mass concluded with the Magnificat.

De Gaulle's body was not at this church of Our Lady, where the tall general once celebrate the liberation of Paris from th legions of Adolf Hitler, T body, remained at the home village where he lived and died And there, a few hours later, i was committed to the soil France.

Great crowds had gathered at the village of Colomboy les Deux Eglises, but a simple burial in a country churchyard replaced the military pomp that DeGaulle had rejected for the final ritual.

Nonetheless scores of world leaders, including President Nixon, made the Notre Dame service the greatest such gathering since the funeral of Dwight D. Eisenhower 19 months ago. And the bells o cathedrals and churches all over France sounded a requiem

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

door-to-door. Scientists, engineers and conservationists in the nation, in-cluding many in town, have become increasingly concerned with the waste of natural resources, the disposal of solid waste and the need to retrieve reusable materials. The Clean Water Revival Com-

mittee of the Manchester Jaycees presented its long range recommendations for the Hocknum River to the commission. The commission, after a mo-tion by Maldment which was seconded by Fred Sweet, voted manimously to back the recom-mendations. They include: A ontest for landscape students for a park; giving an award to the best existing treatment of the river; developing Union Pond into a recreation area; holding another townwide river clean-up; sponsoring a hike around Union Pond in the spring; and increasing the coordination with the Connecticut Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources regarding the availab

ity of funds. Edward Bates, Jeffrey Keith, Donald Brown and Joseph Law-ler, all from the Jaycees, dis-cussed their plans with the com-mission. After Bates said he did mission. After bates said he did not wish to duplicate work being down by the commission, Leslie Buckland, one of its member, reassured the Joycse's that there was so much to be done. completed. The commission agreed to support stricter regulations on junk yards, drive-in restaurants and car washes that have been proposed by the Planning and Zoning Commission. The commission postponed the election of officers until its next meeting which will be held Wednesday, Dec. 9, at 7:30 p.m.-in the 8th District Firehouse. Dr. Spaulding, whose term on the commission expires in 1972,














Decision By Refusal To Decide Some things our Supreme Court, which our naive fancy may believe exists in order to resolve all conceivable constitutional questions on their merits and according to the law, insists on deciding questions without examining their merits or the law.

This is the way it has been with regard to the legality of the war in Vietnam, and with regard to the allied question of whether or not Americans taking part in the planning for and the action of that war could conceivably be classified as war criminals under the terms of the Nuremberg laws this nation helped establish, and therefore presumably accepted for itself, after the Second World War.

These are questions the Supreme Court consistently sweeps under the rug, refusing to let them be tried. The nearest the Court does come to hearing them is when it permits an argument before it as to whether or not it should consent to hear such a case. Recently, it did permit the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which formally sought an opportunity to argue the unconstitutionality of the war in Vietnam, to argue that the Court should grant such an opportunity. At the same time the Justice Department of the federal government, which is conducting that war, was allowed to argue why the Court should not hear such a case.

Now the Court has voted, six to three, in favor of not hearing the case. This verdict, that the case shall not be heard, does not necessarily mean that, if the case were heard, the vote in favor of the legality of the war would be six to three. The one guaranteed unity of the six was that they didn't want the Court letting itself get involved in a procedure which might have to end up, if the law were followed, by having the Court forbid its own country to conduct a war already in progress.

Similarly, the Court has consistently over the years, refused to involve itself in the highly important moral question of whether citizens of the United States are under the injunction laid down by the Nuremberg laws - the injunction to refuse, on pain of being declared war criminals themselves some day, their cooperation to what they might consider an unjust war.

The refusal of the Court to hear such matters may well be an indication that the Justices are afraid that, if such cases were permitted, the law might have to be found to go against the actions and policies of their own coun-

When, in such a situation, they avail themselves of the device of refusing to hear such cases, the result is that they let present practice stand without having to give any reasons for their decision. It is a decision which is given by a refusal to decide.

The powerful irony is, of course, that the verdict we refuse to give to ourselves on our own actions is a verdict we did not hesitate to give to our enemies in World War II, once we had them in our possession and got around to creating law against war which we then imposed on them retroactively.

We ought, some day, even in our highest Court, develop both the honesty and the courage to satisfy our own curiosity, even if the probable result would be that we would renounce our own law and our own principle.

Champion Job Makers

The Labor Department down at Washington has just produced a study titled "United States Manpower In The Nineteen-Seventies" which is intended to be

a somewhat adventurous prediction as to just how many of us are going to be working at what kind of jobs in the decade ahead.

Many of its guesses are interesting. It foresees by 1980, a 15,000,000 decrease in our total work force, with 7,000,000 of the increase representing women. The increased number of women entering the work force are going to have a harder time finding jobs because there are going to be fewer children who will require fewer teachers. Among the men, the percentage shift from blue to white collar classifications will continue, which will mean, for one thing, that dropouts will be worse off than ever. Such extrapolations run the customary risk involved in following changeable statistics rather than permanently fixed patterns of society behavior.

But one of the Labor Department's predictions can be taken as absolutely guaranteed;

When this manpower study says that it will be state and local governments which will make the biggest percentage increases as employers over the decade, it is dealing in a certainty.

One must still question, however, what oversight let this federal prognostication fail to mention the possibility that the federal government might be right in there, too.

In the gratitude we owe those government enterprises which do their best to provide jobs for people we should not neglect the federal branch.

And all three levels of government deserve credit for the way they manage to keep 'increasing the number of jobs they can provide while, at the same time, they are continually introduc-ing new machines and new systems and new computers all designed to do more work with fewer people.

There is one important thing that should never be forgotten, no matter what the blandishments of late Septem ber or an unusually benign October. It is that it is Nov. 11 which is the Martinmas, or the feast of St. Martin. What has St. Martin to do with Indian

Summer? He was the kindly fellow who, meeting with a shivering beggar on a chill

and gave it to the beggar Immediately, as soon as the begga was out of sight, warm weather came

back to that part of England, to reward St. Martin for his saintly deed, and to make sure he did not suffer from the cold himself.

That establishes the only safe ground rules for noticing, proclaiming, or predicting an Indian Summer.

The season on Indian Summers is now officially open.



If the two-party system has to depend on a mechanical gadget for its survival, God help it! The arrogance of Connecticut's politicians on the party lever issue was trotted out never more openly than in the 1965 constitutional convention, when the itous piece of machinery was lifted from the ranks of State statute and glorified as a provision of the new Constitution. There it is - locked in - to be lislodged only by constitutional amend

It is interesting that Thomas Dodd's campaign concentrated so heavily on guiding the voter past the party lever hurdle and through the intricacles of ticket - splitting - interesting since would have been much simpler to encourage the voter to disregard the pary lever altogether And the presumption from the scattershot results is that many of them did just that.

Voters have demonstrated emphat cally last Tuesday their mastery over the voting machine. They have treated the party lever for what it is, a useless appendage. The party lever never had ny business being written into the State constitution, and it remains an effronry to the voter so long as it remains. Gateau Aux Pommes

1 cup slited all-purpose flour teaspoon baking powder Apple Syrup* Cream Filling**

(The secret of this cake lies in the beating). Beat eggs until thick and light Beat in salt, sugar and vanilla. Heat milk and Butter together to boiling point beat in. Mix and sift flour and baking powder; beat in. Turn into greased and floured layer cake pan 9 inches in diameter and 1-1/2 inches deep. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes. Remove from pan. Spoon Apple Syrup slowly over surface of warm cake, covering entire surface, until it is all absorbed. Let stand until cold. Split carefully into 2 layers; fill with Cream Filling. Top with Apple Topping. Garnish with whipped cream if desired.

*Apple Syrup

Combine 1/2 cup sugar and 1 cup apple juice; stir over low heat until sugar lissolves. Boil 3 minutes; cool. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla.

1 teaspoon vanil Combine sugar, flour and salt in top of double boiler. Add milk; stir over low heat until thickened. Cover; cook over hot water 10 minutes. Add a little of the hot mixture to egg yolks; combine with remaining hot mixture; cook 2 minutes

*Apple Topping

Place apples in small greased baking dish. Combine sugars, nutmeg and peels; sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. Cover. Bake at 425° for 40 to 45 minutes. or until apples are tender. Stir occasionally during baking. Makes about 1 cup.

Honey Glazed Baked Apples

6 large tart apples 6 tablespoons honey Nutmes

1/4 cup orange juice Core apples, being careful not to cut all the way through. Peel about 1/3 of the way down from stem end. Combine honey and orange juice; pour into centers of apples. Set in baking dish. Pour a little

hot water in bottom of pan. Bake at 400° for 50 to 60 minutes, or until apples are tender. Remove from oven. Brush tops with additional honey, sprinkle with « a little sugar and nutmeg. Run under broiler to glaze. Serve warm or cold with plain cream.

Old Fashioned Apple Pie

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)-Canada underlined its newly estabished relations with Red China today by informing the General Assembly i will support Peking for a U.N. seat. Canadian Ambassador Yvon

Beaulne told the 127-nation assembly his government looks forward to the day when the Red Chinese hold seats in the Assembly and the Security Council, where China holds veto power,

Beaulne spoke as delegates privately expressed the belief that the mildness of the U.S speech Thursday indicates an easing of American opposition to a seat for Communist China. Canada was the first nation to announce a switch in position at

"I wish to make it clear, however," the Canadian envoy added, "that, if in our judgment, continued support of such a resolution could in the future frustrate the will of the general assembly, my government will change its position." Ambassador Christopher Phil-

Two more American infantry men were killed Thursday and two were wounded by another booby trap in another part of Quang Ngai, which is on the northern coastal plain. Military officials attribute at

least 15 per cent of the American casualties in Indochina to mines, booby traps and gre-

North Vietnamese troops ripped into a patrol of the 25th fantry Division 33 miles northeast of Salgon, triggering spo-radic fighting from morning un-til nightfall. Headquarterss aid one American infantryman was killed and six were wounded Enemy losses were not known.

North Vietnamese troops also ambushed a six-truck South Vietnamese convoy on Viet-nam's main north-south highway 30 miles nonthwest of Saigon, killing two South Vietnamese soldiers and wounding one. It was the first ambush on the highway in several months. In Cambodia, spokesmen re-
