

Manchester Memorial's 50th

One of the warming things about a fiftieth birthday for an institution is that representatives of the founding generation can still be around to join with leadership of the present generation in the purposeful festivities.

Throughout this week in which the first half century in the life of Manchester Memorial Hospital has been given its anniversary observances, there has been a warm and vivid remembrance of those particular Manchester people who first saw the vision and first moved dollars and wood and stone into the dedicated purpose and first established the example and tradition of citizen-service without which the institution would never have arrived or survived.

Some of these wonderful people are still with us, and could take part in this week's observances. The memory of many others is still fresh among us. Affectionate honor and remembrance to them all; they taught a lesson even greater than that of health and proper medical care - the lesson of volunteer citizen responsibility for the quality of life in their own community.

If this has been a week of inspiring human memories and tributes, it has also been a week for salute to and fascinating exposition of the amazing growth of the institution itself, both in size and in the ever-increasing sophistication of its service to the needs of modern medical knowledge. The physical contour of Manchester Memorial Hospital grows larger and more extensive every time one looks at it. But t took the "Hospital 70" exhibit at the State Armory to give the ordinary citizen, for the first time, the kind of impression of the Hospital which could only be gained by illustrating some of the details of the whole vast operation. Medical science has now become, almost in the last two decades, the ninth wonder of the world; we do not have to go out of town to find it, and this is something thousands of Manchester people had the pleasure of discovering for themselves this week, as they visited the display at the Armory.

Founded on local vision and courage, sustained for this first half century by the good people of Manchester itself, Manchester Memorial Hospital has become an institution which repays, many times over, the local pride which has been invested in it. It is still, as it was in the beginning,

an institution which gives Manchester the feeling of being a community in spite of the fact that, in these 50 years, both the town and the institution have grown so large so swiftly. Congratulations for the past, and good

wishes for the future, to the veteran founders, the faithful citizen servanttrustees and auxiliaries, the administrative staff, and, once again, the ordinary Manchester people who have all, in their various ways, made this institution their own, and helped build it fine and great. All of these people know that the tasks ahead are to be just as difficult, just as challenging, and are to require proportionately even greater accomplishments. But this is one area and one instance where to look at the past is to

Still Something To Celebrate After twenty-five years the United Nations is not the embryo world government that idealists sought. But it has made the world a little safer, a little nealthier, and a little less unequal—and

that is something to celebrate It was created by the great Powers who built its weakness into it: Without their consent it can take no effective action. It has been used by the smaller nations as a megaphone for their grievances, real and imagined: So much so that the world now is nearly deaf to the General Assembly. But it remains a mutual meeting ground and on occasions it has been vital as a peacemaker oor peacekeeper. In the Congo and Cyprus it has been allowed to show what, given greater opportunities, it could achieve And its specialised agencies — dealing and education — have a proud record in spite of bureaucratic faults.

The UN can be strengthened only if the great Powers want this. At present hey do not. Neither East nor West in willing to risk restricting its right of veto — even though the Western Powers have had to block action only a few times in 25 years, while the Soviet Union has more than 100 vetoes to its discredit, Short of modifying the veto, however, other improvements could be made. The secretariat could be allowed greater initiative and Article 43 on standby military forces could be put into effect. Again, these changes are possible only if the great Powers want them: And it is depressing that during ast week's birthday celebrations no discussion of structural or other improvement took place U. Just How Peaceful The Atom?

The increasing controversy about the safety of the use of atomic energy and its potential by - product, deadly radiation, will be the subject of the CBS New Special "How Peaceful the Atom?" to be broadcast Tuesday on CBS, Correspondent John Hart will be the reporter.

The CBS news special examines both sides of the issue: Does the peaceful atom promise, as proponents say, a future of unlimited technological advances and benefits? Or does it portend, as critics warn, a future of untold environmental and human hazards?

The potential dangers to the environment and to man caused by the release of radiation are explored through interviews with Dr. Edward Teller, nuclear ploneer; Dr. Theos Thompson, member of the Atomic Energy Commission, and Drs. Arthur Tamplin and John Gofman of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, Livermore, Calif.

"How Peaceful the Peaceful Atom?" looks at possible sources of radiation hazards, levels of radiation that can and cannot be tolerated safely, and what is being done to control these dangers.

Norman Glubok is producer of "How Peaceful the Peaceful Atom?" Philip Lewis is executive producer.

Merv Sticks To End

By BOB THOMAS

HOLLY WOOD - (AP) "There were times," admits Merv Griffin, "when I didn't think I could make it through the show. Midway through the first interview, I began thinking to myself, 'I wonder if anybody would really mind if I just got up and left."

Griffin didn't walk out on his late night CBS gabfest. He stuck it out, managed to wrest a transfer back to his native state, and now appears to be surviving the rating race.

Griffin recently transferred his base of operation from the Cort Theater in Manhattan to CBS's Television City here. The rating, he reports, has improved.

"It's now a two-way race," he said. The two leaders: Himself long-time front-runner Johnny Carson on NBC. No longer a threat is ABC's Dick Cavett, although he remains the darling of the critics-and ABC. which recently gave him a year's renewal.

Griffin admittedly was doing poorly in ratings and morale a few months ago. That was when he lost his zest for the show and wished to be switched from New York to California.

When did he realize he had to make the move?

""When the phone stopped ringing," he said. "We used to be flooded with calls for guestings on the show. Then all of a sudden there were four talk shows originating in New York (Carson, Griffin, Cavett and the syndicated David Frost).

'It became a seller's market for guests. The same faces were turning up on every show; you could tune in any night and find Rodney Dangerfield on somebody's show.

"Once Jerry Lewis played my show and Johnny's on the same and the external effects could night! After 20 minutes, he told 'I'm sorry, I've got to leave. He didn't tell me where he was going-to Carson's!"

Griffin said he would have left Manhattan sooner, but he was ashamed to leave the Cort Theater. He had insisted that CBS supply him with his own home base, and the network had renovated the old legitimate house for \$2 million.

A casualty of the Western move was Griffin's old sidekick,

Arthur Treacher. "I miss him terribly," Griffin remarked, "He was a great asset to the show. But Arthur is along in years-he's 76-and he just couldn't make the move from his home on Long Island. Besides, he's involved in a very profitable fish-and-chips franchise business with Bob Hope's brother."

With the move Griffin is going back to what initially made him succeed on the desk-and-couch circuit: his knack of drawing comedy and human interest from oddballs and offbeat char-

He is now planning salutes to Hollywood institutions-Jack L. Warner is one subject.

"Since we're living here now, we want to pay our respects to the community," said Califor-nia-born Griffin, "We don't want to be like Johnny and David and the other shows that come out here for a week, skim the cream of guests to soup up their ratings, then hurry back East again."


