6,000 Leads **Checked** In **Quebec Hunt**

MONTREAL (AP) - Maurice St. Pierre, director of Quebec Provincial Police, said Wednesiay about 6,000 leads have had to be checked out so far in the search for the abductors of James R. Cross and the abductors and murderers of Pierre Laporte . Cross, 49-year-old British

trade commissioner, was abducted from his home Oct. 5 by Quebec Liberation Front terrorists. Laporte, Quebec labor min-ister, was kidnaped five days later by the FLQ and his body was discovered in the trunk of a car Oct. 18.

The Montreal Gazette says Cross may have been held for a while in the apartment where accused terrorist Bernard Lortie was arrested Nov. 6 and where three other kidnap suspects hid in a false wall to avoid apture.

An unnamed police officer is quoted as saying the hidden compartment was "big enough to hold more than three persons."

Paul Rose, 27, his brother Jacques, 23, and Francis Simard, 23, apparently eluded police by hiding in a well-hidden compartment during the police raid which netted Lortie. Police have confirmed that

the secret hideaway yielded fingerprints of the three kidnep suspects, but they have not disclosed if any physical evidence of the British diplomat was also discovered there. Cross is believed still alive





Thursday, November 19 Why Not Reverse The Alibi?

Connecticut is now in danger of find ing itself in a mood to use the easiest of all alibis-everybody else is doing it, so why shouldn't we?

What everybody else is doing in catering to the gamblers, Rhode Island with racing to the East, New Hampshire with lottery to the North, Vermont with racing, New York with racing, and lottery, and, after the first of the year, even off-track betting on its horses, and lassachusetts, next door, with racing and with mounting pressures inside its ncoming legislature in favor of off track betting and the same kind of state lottery being run by New Hampshire and New York.

Why, then, should Connecticut hold to ts own bothersome brand of purity, its ill-joy assertion of its own moral speriority? Why let good, or bad, for that matter, Connecticut money go to Rhole Island, Massachusetts, New ampshire, Vermont, or New York, to sustain racing enterprises there and mdirectly fatten their state treasuries?

One can even notice the most sophisticated new argument of all now making its appearance in Connecticut. Where once the argument used to be that bringing racing to Connecticut would be surrender to potentially criminal elements and an invitation to them to nvade Connecticut life, now we have the theory that the way to get rid of the criminals is to legalize racing and then also legalize off track betting so that the criminal elements will be deprived of their illegal source of income. To beat crime, we may soon be hearing, bring salized racing in!

The Connecticut picture is altered, over what it has been in the past, bccause we have an incoming Governor who has expressed a willingness to take an open-minded look at any racetrack proposition which comes up to him.

Where are the classic Connecticut arguments against racing? Does anyone dare contend, these days, that there is still a real dividing line between things which are moral and those which are immoral? Does it have any effect to "point out that one Massachusetts track has gone so broke the state itself may have to take it over and operate it if it is going to continue in use? Are we interested in the story of unexpectedly low returns for the dear cause of education from the state lotteries in New Hampshire and New York?

Above all, if legalizing racing and operating a state lottery will offer a relatively painless method of raising state funds so that some other more painful method - like the income tax - neednot be invoked, who is going to fight very hard for unpleasant and outmoded Puritanism?

Well, we will, here in this space, until we meet with better arguments than we have so far cited in favor of change. We think it is going to be a bad bargain if Connecticut abandons its own tradition and its own uniqueness in order to invest its good name and its good social being in a kind of license which has already been exploited so much it is beginning to yield diminishing returns. We think there is a vast difference between being unable to prevent the occasional inveterate gambling dollar from leaving the state and putting the hot gambling opportunity within easy reach of every

kind of dollar everywhere in the state. Why not turn the new argument around? Instead of telling ourselves we hould do something because everybody else is doing it, why not tell ourselves that we are proud to be different, and still convinced of our own good sense, and determined to continue in it?'

That being so, we have a suggestion We have in mind something concerning possibilities of life on a relatively small planet, some 26,000 miles in circumference, which has one spectacular advantage, in that nobody has to travel vast distances through space to get to

There is relatively little advance scitific information as to just what kind of organism might be best designed for survival on this small sample planet. It is true that certain experimentation has been going on for a rather extended length of time. But there has been as yet no valid scientific determination that there is any particular form of organism which has established itself as a surefire survival design. If the Buffalo scientists have the slightest chance of dohey think they can do, we mmission them to start from cratch and lose as little time as possible in trying to assemble the cell-parts for something that will be capable of surviving, not on Mars, but Earth.

My helpmeet can corroborate that I have not exactly apotheosized the supposedly fading ethic of unnecessary labor. And some would say I have partialsucceeded in not unradicalizing the children in this respect. So imagine our feelings when a fantasy of having millions was mentioned, and a young voice said it wouldn't be any fun because there wouldn't be any work to do.

And what of the older children to whom Mr. Reich presumably refers? We don't have any, but my wife ran into a girl she knew in a specialty store the other day. The girl had become a radi cal, a member of the Progressive Labor party. But here she was with her fiance planning a wedding to suit her mother's wishes, cloosing a stainless (not silver of course!) cutlery pattern to be registered for the convenience of corporatestate gift givers.

The mother of another girl, an emigrant to the hipple world of London. was thunderstruck to hear that her laughter wanted a conventional white wedding. Where, Mr. Reich, had that mother gone wrong?

Add to such facts the liklihood that the resent members of the under-25 majority cited by Mr. Reich will someday turn 8, and the imagination boggles. If acting on their youthful ideas has not caused them to be forever blacklisted in the computers of the corporate state, they will become part of that state, as their parents are

Will they remain sufficiently radicalzed to transform the system, as Mr. Reich comfortingly hopes? Will they confirm his image of flowers pushing up through a concrete pavement? Or will they become part of the hardened mass eaving Mr. Reich to wonder Where have all the flowers gone? It depends on whether the greening goes faster than the graying.

So to make the ideal strateg cal chart for the situation of new administration, one would start with a Governor who seemed almost pitcously al alone in the midst of wicked powers of the other party. One would have the political oppo sition treat him with such bru ality as to generate sympath or him, and, incidentally, pro vide him with a satisfa alibi for him own failure to p many of his own promises int

some such cynics On scheme, the new governor would consolidate himself and his party for a long run of pow er by being virtuous but help ass in his first administration by attracting increased public support and legislative backin for his second, and then b coasting into office for a thir dministration on the strength of his accomplishments in

Suppose, on the other hand in incoming governor should have everything his own way in his own very first admini tration. Two consequence would follow. First, it would be revealed that his promise were either not very important keepable. Second, he would e deprived of alibis to use in explanation of his lack of miracle accomplishment.

Occasionally, what such even cal analysis would consider th ideal strategy for an incoming regime is thwarted by uncom mon sense on the part of the party which has just been ousted from power.

In rare instances, the party which has been in power in the previous era, sometimes b strategy as we have outlined has brains enough to refuse to play the obstructionist game. In such an instance, it will embarrass the incoming party by giving it too much cooperation, too much room to show what it really can accomplish. This happens so rarely that it is almost never. What usually happens is that the party which has just lost, but which still retains obstructionist power in the legislature, calculates it cannot afford to let the new governor make any real kind of record for himself.
