

believably short time - the record includes the proliferation of human numbers and human settlement, the creation of educational and cultural institutions and the growth of tradition on them, like ivy, the production of schools of thought and philosophy, of geniuses ranging from the Thoreau of civil disobedience to the Goddard of rocketry, the cycle of the streams from pristine purity through drab fortune-building commercialisms back toward expensive repurification, the cycle of the fields from Revolutionary War granaries to inability to with the agriculture of the great western planes on to suburban cottages and condominiums, the cycle of routes of transport from the trail that had to broken through the wood to the nodern problem of trying to leave strips of woods somewhere between the pave-

In the course of such developments and in many others which have been part of the New England story, there have been chapters of infinite variety and richness, tapestried moments in which human talents of unique proportions have appeared against a landscape which combines continual arousal and stimulus with invitation to reflection and

The Puritan Ethic

Virtually everything in and about the United States is under searching que tion today. There is hardly a traditiona value, outlook, custom, or conclusion which is not being subjected to some times constructive sometimes destructive doubt and inquiry. While this pres ent state of scrutiny has in some areas opened men's minds to look more deer y at man and his works, it has also sown widespread confusion and resulted heightened social and political ter sion. In short, the American people an at one of those challenging turning where they must, for their ow safety and progress, decide between those portions of history's legacy which are outgrown and must be reformed or discarded, and those which are fundamental and indispensable and must be more fully recognized and more sincerely practiced

This weekend there begin in Massachusetts celebrations for the 350th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims, what is now Cape Cod, then shortly thereafter at Plymouth. And there could be no bette ime to look at certain of the question raised about the United State during celebrations for an event which, perhaps more than any other, set the country upon the moral, political, in tellectual, and economic paths which it has followed ever since.


We hear it increasingly stated, for example, that the America of today is urning away from one of its strongest traditional attitudes, something various termed the Puritan or the Protestant Ethic. By this is generally meant (a) hard. unremitting toil is redemptive, and (b) an unusually narrow view of noral questions. Nor can there be much doubt but that in this age of material well-being, both of these restricted and imited interpretations of Puritanian and Protestantism a r e being either questioned or partially abandoned by certain circles and strata of American

will be noted that we said "restrict ed and limited interpretations." We do so because we do not believe that, examined in depth, either of the interpreations mentioned above is a true readng of the Puritan or Protestant Ethic believe that a far more fundamenal, indeed the only correct interpreta tion of this ethic lies in the latter's conviction of the perfectability of man. This roes vastly beyond questions of how hard men should work or how stern their moral outlook should be, although these particularly the latter, cannot be disas ociated from man's determination to perfect himself.

When read in this simultaneou higher and deeper light, the Protestan or Puritan Ethic is found to be not onl alive but thriving in modern-day Amer ca. As one writer put it, the youth of America is increasingly gripped in "a neo-Protestantism which holds that each man must justify his existence by for saking personal gain and doing something socially constructive" It would be blindness, indeed, not to see in such an attitude a refining of Puritanism and an inquenchable yearning for the perfect-

ability of both man and society. No, the basic impulse of the Puritan Ethic is too soundly grounded in mankind's need, too firmly entrenched in American thinking, too applicable to that country's present need to work its way through monumental challenges, to either outmoded or abondonable Like all great historic truths, this ethic s not rigid, but is adaptable to men's ecessities at whatever period they find mselves. Outward trappings may change, but inward power and effectives remain the same.

As the United States, along with fassachusetts, rethinks the lessons of the last three and a half centuries, its greatest need is to draw fresh strength rom the humanly wise and divinely in spired foundations upon which America was established. It makes little difference by what name these are called so long as they remain green in men's - CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONearts.

ORLANDO, Fla .- The sym- ations bol of Republican defeat here Gurney, the sole statewide Re- force the theme of revenge on Nov. 3 is the sudden uselessness of a \$30,000 fund, carefully protected from campaign squandering, to finance a special gerrymander study designed to maximize Republican strength in the new, 15-member Florida Congressional delega-

Having lost the governor's office, the Republicans have now also lost all power over redistricting and the gerrymander fund is superfluous. The Democrats will now decide how to carve 15 districts out of Florida's present 12 districts, under the guidance of Gov.-elect Reubin Askew. Out-going Gov. Claude Kirk, overwhelmed by Democrat Askew in the election, won't be around with his veto power to engage in delicate gerrymander negotiations

As a result, the loss of the governorship may cost the Reublicans what could have been gain of three Congressional seats in the Congress to be elected in November 1972, to go with the three they already have. Moreover, the redistricting-here as in other big states like Pennsylvania and Ohio where Republicans lost the governorship-will affect the composition of Congress until after he 1980 census. Yet the loss of the statehouse is only a small part of the Republican problems hatched here in the election. Far more serious, Kirk's defeat, along with the defeat of Republican Rep. Bill Cramer in the Senaorial election, has finally prought the violent sub-surface power struggle within the party to a furious boil. This bitter actional feuding reached a peak last spring when Kirk and tepublican Sen. Edward Gurney unsuccessfully tried to end Cramer's career by running ex-Judge G. Harrold Carswell

against him in the Republican Senatorial primary. Now, the Kirk-hating backers of Cramer, who is still Republican nationcommitteeman, are plotting to purge the party organization of its principal Kirk holdovers, chief of whom is state chairman Duke Crittenden.

Stabbing Attempt in Manila Fails To Daunt Pope Paul

MANILA (AP) - Pope Paul VI. undaunted by a Boliviar painter's attempt to stab him; carried out his program in Ma-nila today as if nothing had hap-

Civic authorities said a million Filipinos thronged the streets to watch the Pope drive to Manila Cathedral, where he held a Mass.

Later, the Pope received foreign diplomats at the nunciary where he is staying, and had dinner with President Ferdinand E. Marcos.

Police said the painter, in priest's robes, carried a foot-long knife hidden under a golden crucifix when he approached the Pope.

The pontiff had just arrived in Manila. His face showed surprise as police and dignitaries subdued the painter on the red carpet spread out at the airport for the papal visit. He quickly "seemed calm and serene," Church official said.

Police identified the attacke as Benjamin Mendoza y Amor 38, a surrealistic painter from La Paz, Bolivia. He told them he wanted "to save humanit from the religious propagand of the Pope" and had been plan ning the assassination for years The National Bureau of Investigation charged him with atempted murder and assault. Marcos had just greeted the Pope on this first major stop or his eight-nation tour of Asia and the Pacific,

Marcos was walking beside the Pope on the red carpet when the man darted from the crowd of about 3,000 at the airport and hurried toward the pontiff. Marcos helped to subdue the Bolivian with a kick and
