# **Stabbing Attempt in Manila Fails To Daunt Pope Paul**

MANILA (AP) - Pope Paul VI. undaunted by a Boliviar painter's attempt to stab him; carried out his program in Ma-nila today as if nothing had hap-

Civic authorities said a million Filipinos thronged the streets to watch the Pope drive to Manila Cathedral, where he held a Mass.

Later, the Pope received foreign diplomats at the nunciary where he is staying, and had dinner with President Ferdinand E. Marcos.

Police said the painter, in priest's robes, carried a foot-long knife hidden under a golden crucifix when he approached the Pope.

The pontiff had just arrived in Manila. His face showed surprise as police and dignitaries subdued the painter on the red carpet spread out at the airport for the papal visit. He quickly "seemed calm and serene," Church official said.

Police identified the attacke as Benjamin Mendoza y Amor 38, a surrealistic painter from La Paz, Bolivia. He told them he wanted "to save humanit from the religious propagand of the Pope" and had been plan ning the assassination for years The National Bureau of Investigation charged him with atempted murder and assault. Marcos had just greeted the Pope on this first major stop or his eight-nation tour of Asia and the Pacific,

Marcos was walking beside the Pope on the red carpet when the man darted from the crowd of about 3,000 at the airport and hurried toward the pontiff. Marcos helped to subdue the Bolivian with a kick and

he ancient 8 p.m. curfew hour. The five newest bells being tuned at Whitechapel Bell Foundry are part of a ring of 13. They are being cast for Shef-field Cathedral from the metal of old, worn units dating back to 1799. It's natural that Whitecha pel should get the Sheffield business, since the foundry, which opened for business in 1570, cast the originals.

The bell-casting business, gan in English monasteries in 400 A.D. When Whitechapel be-gan the first Elizabeth was queen of England and no cathedral or church wanted to be without bells.

But modern churches can't find the room or the desire for cell towers. However, Whitechapel still keeps busy, mostly repairing bells they cast a couple of hundred years earlier.

Over the 16 centuries the have been ringing bells, the British dreamed up a hatful of reasons for making what Thomas Hood called "music's laughter." Bells were the clocks of intiquity and the broadcasters of the days before electronics. They rang for the arrival of

the London mail coach, for the illage squire's birthday, for airs, births, marriages, deaths, nvasion, the Angelus, the beginning and the end of harvest, of course, the hours. homas Nash of Bath willed

Westminster Abbey bell ringers 50 pounds to toll a dirge on his wedding anniversary date and mirthful peals" on his death to signal "my happy release from domestic tyranny and wretched Richard "Beau" Nash had a

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

OSACO, Brazil (AP) - Surrounded by pipes, valves, switches and conveyor belts, the maestro, wearing a red sports shirt, raised his baton. Hundreds of husky electrical workers in grimy overalls stared curiously, especially at the bass player who was standing on the platform of a mammoth lathe. In the middle of the huge fac tory, a string orchestra softly began playing Vivaldi's "Four Seasons."

Julio Medaglia, director of the 14-member Sao Paulo String Orchestra, and Fernando Pacheco Jordao, a producer for Sao Paulo's staterun educational television station, decided recently to start the program to bring good music directly to the people. It may be that the time has come when the Federation, by its own tactics, is helping "break" itself. The most welcome sign of all would be for more teachers to disown such leadership, and the possibility that this is now a trend has been the one bright development in the midst of needless test of strengths in Hartford.

#### The Prisoner Issue

One can imagine that President Nixon, authorizing that daring helicopter landing inside a North Vietnam prison camp in the hope of giving a dramatic liberation to some American prisoners, could calculate that the sentimental odds would be in his favor even if the attempt turned out to be a failure.

Perhaps, he even expected, with some relish, that what his own Vice President might term "knee-jerk liberals and doves" would weaken their own position by giving their usual negative reaction to any tactic which did not amount to retreat in Southeast Ania. What if the exploit did amount to a momentary invasion of territory hitherto reserved exclusively for American shell and bomb but barred to American personnel? What if it did, in a way, amount to an extension of the war? Could those

Senate doves be so heartlessly un-Ameria can as to criticize and resent an effort to rescue American prisoners from the rough savageries of the North Vietnamese?

The speculative answer would have had to be that the doves could protest such an action for such a purpose only at the cost of imperiling their own standing with the American public.

President Johnson, it may be remembered, used to try to browbeat the American public into loyalty to the war in Vietnam by proclaiming that we must protect the lives of the young Americans he had sent there.

The idea that we have an obligation to the men who became prisoners after we sent them to Vietnam should be even more persuasive. The North Vietnamese handling of the prisoner issue is full of barbaric fault, and the prisoners themselves have been used as diplomatic blackmail, and it is easy to summon up public sympathy for these prisoners, in their plight in North Vietnam, and for their families, back in this country.

In spite of all this, the administration's use of the prisoner issue is not entirely candid and not entirely privileged. Considering some of the conduct which has taken place on our side of the war, in our disposal of prisoners or people who might have become prisoners, we have to be thankful for at least one thing, which is that the North Vietnamese do take prisoners and do house and feed them. #### **Raids And Attitudes**

It would have been hailed as an example of American courage and enterprise. And every individual would have felt that he stood a bit taller because of it. We are sure that large numbers of individuals. - particularly among the socalled "silent majority" and the so-called "hard hats" - feel exactly this. Furthermore, we deem it likely that many who criticized the raid, such as Senators J. William Fulbright of Arkansas, Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, and Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island, might have been more cautious in criticism, had the attempt succeeded.

Yet the fact remains that, for almost certainly the first time in American history, it was criticism of such a deed rather than praise for it, which was featured in much of news media coverage. In pointing this out, we are not expressing approval for this undoubtedly highly courageous act of deering-do. Yesterday we questioned in these columns whether the air raid on North Vietnam was a wise step, whether it would heat up a war shich has been quietish, and whether it would put further stumbling blocks in the path of the hardly moving peace talks in Paris, One must obviously ask these same questions about the prisoner rescue attempt. Furthermore, one must ask - and fervently hope that the answer will be naywhether the Communists will vindictively increase the already brutal conditions under which the American captives are said to be living.

But, however grave the answers to these questions may be, they will pass with time. More interesting and more significant is to probe the degree to which the widespread reaction to the prisoner rescue raid indicates a fundamental and lasting change in Americans' attitudes towards their country's tra-







In designing the interiors of the bank Smith felt that prime importance was a visual continuity of the strong simple contemporary statement of the architect's building, and that the furnishings should achieve a blend with this architecture. This is accomplished through a warm, monochromatic color scheme of clear orange carpeting, carried to upholsteries of rust and chestnut and accented by gold vinyl wall coverings, Furniture is highlighted by warm tones of walnut and rosewood, with ac-cents of black and polished chomre. Desks feature chrome accessories to fulfill the chrome theme. All of these areas are then balanced by natural tones of paint

and vinyl wall covering. The main banking floor is designed for ease of use by the pub-lic with a receptionist located just inside the main entrance to facilitate and direct patrons to the vari-ous banking departments. Four lounge chairs in two areas provide a convenient place for customers to pause while organizing their banking affairs. The main floor is further dominated by two circular check desks in the central area. Mr. Smith outlined the main objectives in designing the bank"s

interior as: A. To create an attractive work-

- C. To achieve a totally harmonious image reflecting the bank's character and attitude as well as an interior that would compliment the

But its leaders are But its leaders are among those who launched the current peace movement with the ban the-bomb demonstrations i dozen years ago. And its farmhouse still plays host to far-flung groups on the left with a wide range of activities. Its members see it principally

as a coordinating group, spreading a message of nonviolence to those other groups.

Dave Brown, a young staff member, voices sympathy and kinship-but tactical disagreement-with Black Panthers and Weathermen, and is working to aid the Panthers on trial 50 miles away in New Haven. But, Brown says, his central aim is still nonviolence-for now to lower the level of tension between the Panthers and whites, and ultimately to reduce the level of violence in society through the radical movement Things have changed in the peace movement in 10 years, says Robert Swann, a graying architect and writer who, with his wife Marjorie, has been the group's chief mentor.

In 1960, he says, "if you were for peace you were a communist, almost. Today that's not true ... Even Nixon-he's going to make everything he's doing, even if it's expanding the war, sound like a peace move." Swann says his group is willing to take radical steps-reusing to serve in the armed forces, refusing to pay taxes, even gradually shifting its entire focus to economic issues, h Swann says are behind the problems of war and armaments. (Swann says much of his own effort now goes into writing about "alternate institutions"some other form\_of economic system than capitalism or state ocialism).

But as it has "expanded re markably" the peace move-ment too has changed, Swann says. "Today the question is Are you taking radical enough action? Do you take nonviolent action or violent action?" "We find ourselves less radi-

cal and more conservative," he says. "We're constantly coming down on the nonviolent side of those issues. The CNVA's members, says

Swann, still hold to their creed of a Gandhian brand of nonviolence-"not passivism" but 'an aggressive, active method of resisting tyranny or evil by refusing to cooperate with it." "We still think we're radical in the sense that we're getting to the roots of things . . . That's the meaning of the word." The group hasn't always been asked to prove its radicalism in the late 1950s and early 1960s, the CNVA led many of the early demonstrations' against nuclear bomb testing and Polaris



Focus of the legal dispute is the arrest Wednesday of 25 persons and the occupation of an apartment in a public housing project by the National Commit-tee to Combat Fascism, an arm of the Black Panthers. Police arrested 25 persons black militants and sympathizers-traveling on an interstate highway in four cars said to ave been rented by actress Jane Fonda. Police said the group had been seen leaving the barricaded apartment. Al were charged with criminal trespassing. The NCCA commandeered the empty apartment as its headquarters last month and kept it parricaded until police broke in early Thanksgiving morning. How many egg whites equal ½ cup? You will need 4 to 6 eggs, depending on egg's size. If recipe calls for ½ cup of egg yolks, then 6 or 7 eggs should be enough. Generally 1 large Grade A egg yields 1½ tbs. of egg white and 1 tbs. of egg yolk How do you use up those leftover egg whites and yolks?

#### 'Overexposed.' Says Chief Of **Information Unit**

NEW YORK (AP) - Frank Shakespeare, director of the United States Information Agency, says the U.S. is handicapped by "overexposure" in some countries and should selectively revise programs "for a lower profile of our activities." He said he has already called for such modifications.

Shakespeare, writing in a guest column in today's editions of The New York Times, said the United States has been best known abroad for its prosperity, technical know-how and efficiency.

"To the developing nation," he said, "they may represent an unattainable ideal while the Russians, with their lower living standards and less efficiency olend more easily into the coun tryside."

Without going into specifics, Shakespeare said he has already called for "a lower profile of our activities in some countries by reducing programs involving us in overexposure and too close identification with the house governments." He said the move was in line

with the Nixon Doctrine. Shakespeare said rapid advances in communications tech nology indicate that commercial media will become "the primary image-makers of our country abroad," gradually overshadowing government propa-

This means, he said, that th media will have to pay greater attention to the accuracy and npleteness of their output. "Even with these added resnsibilities we will want them to remain completely free and untrammeled in both reporting and opinions," he said, "We in

the U.S.I.A. are ready and anxious to relay on them to an increasing extent."
