Sift dry ingredients. Work in lard with fingertips until it resembles coarse commeal. Beat egg with water and flavoring and mix with flour mixture. Add raisins and knead dough, adding more ice water if necessary. Shape into ornaments, poking raisins well into dough so they won't burn. Insert a long loop of wire well into the cookie. Bake on ungreased cookie sheets at 325°F. until cookie is firm. (Time varies according to thickness.) Cookies harden upon standing. Decorate with frostings, nuts, raisins, colored sugars.


