> Rail Renaissance In Reverse After outlining a new passenger rail service network for the United States, Transportation Secretary John Volpe said, "Frankly, I wish that the system could be bigger.

Frankly, so do we. The administration's claim that 85 per cent of metropolitan areas of 50,000 people or more will continue to have passen ger rail service is misleading. In the first place, rolling stock will be drastically refuced. Today 366 trains are running the city-to-city, as distinct from local commuter, routes. When the proposed system would take effect next May under the new National Railroad Passenger Corp. (Railpax), only 150 trains would be in operation. Further, although cities like Seattle and San Francisco are on the new network, a West Coaster would have to take a train to Chicago to get from one city to the other. To go from Washington, D.C. to Detroit, a rail trav eler would have to zigzag first between

Some employers, almost unbelievably, were in such a hurry to announce the new thing that they did so even in advance of the Nov. 3 election, as if they had no realization that such down-grade economic news might have some influence on the way wage earners felt about the Republican ad-

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NEW YORK (AP) - Network concern over disruptions and uninvited guests on late-night talk shows has resulted in the posting of extra guards when controversial guests are booked or when trouble is suspected.

"You always have that fearthat someone is going to jump onto the stage from the audience," said one talk show spokesman. Another said, "We have to have guards. It takes a lot of bread to stop taping or cancel a show."

Every network talk show has had interruptions or uninvited guests. Two such events in the past few weeks illustrate their

Opposing factions of homosex-uals threatened to break up the Dick Cavett show the Friday after Thanksgiving. A leader of one faction had been booked as a guest on the ABC show and a leader of another faction had not been.

Members of the second group threatened in advance to break up the show unless they too were heard.

A compromise was reached at the last minute and both sides were represented on the show.

"We had no problems," said a Cavett spokesman, "but we did have plenty of studio security and policemen were on call in the vicinity."

On a talk show a few weeks ago a comedian walked onto the stage and complained on cam-era that he couldn't get a booking on the show.

Instead of having guards hustle the man offstage, and erasing it from the tape before air time, the talk show host let the man give part of his comedy routine. It was then passed off as a planned stunt.

All three network talk shows were interrupted by black jazz musicians who contended they were being excluded from tele-

The Mery Griffin show was disrupted in August when it was still in New York. About 40 black musicians and supporters blew horns and noisemakers. The taping was halted for the day and the studio was cleared. Police were called in to stand by, but were not needed.

In September the musicians briefly interrupted the Cavett show. Leaders of the musicians met with ABC officials and a booking on the show was ar-


