

'Nightmare of War' Nearing End: Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, admitting to disappointments during his first two years in office, says "I hope to be better" and achieve both prosperity and peace by 1973. His greatest accomplishment to date, Nixon said, was the TV-radio audience Monday night, has been the grandest of American troops from South Vietnam. But he acknowledged setbacks on the home front and suggested the Democratic-controlled Congress must at least share responsibility for these.

In an hour-long live interview with four broadcast journalists as he left the White House for his alma mater, Nixon predicted a revival of prosperity without resort to controls or wage-price guidelines and—in 1971, at least—"without increased federal tax."

Pentagon May Seek \$75 Billion

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon budget request that goes to Congress later this month will call for defense spending of about \$75 billion in fiscal 1971 and fiscal year beginning next July, according to reliable Pentagon sources. Final details of the Defense Department money bill were reportedly hammered out in discussions between the White House, Defense Department and the President's Office of Management and Budget during the last week in December.

The request, still subject to last minute changes by the White House, represents a sharp upturn in military expenditures since the Nixon administration took office. Military spending for the current fiscal year is estimated at between \$73 billion and \$74 billion, and in fiscal 1971, 74.7 billion, and in fiscal 1970, 72.5 billion.

U.S. Jet Lost Battling on Five Fronts Reported in Cambodia

SAIGON (AP) — Military forces at four points ranging from Highway 7 about 50 miles northeast of Phnom Penh to the northeast of Phnom Penh and the loss of a U.S. jet fighter-bomber over southern Laos while it was bombing enemy supply routes.

The two crewmen aboard the Air Force F4 Phantom are missing, a spokesman said. The plane went down Sunday night. Only one significant action was reported in South Vietnam, the ambush of a U.S. convoy on Highway 20 in the southern part of the central highlands. One American was killed, one was wounded, and one of the enemy soldiers was available.

U.N. Talks Resume On Mideast Peace

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The disrupted Middle East peace talks were resumed today. Ambassador Yosef Tekoh of Israel met privately with special U.N. envoy Gunnar V. Jarring for 25 minutes.

The report contained texts of letters from Israel, Egypt and Jordan indicating that both the Israeli government and Egyptian President Anwar el-Sadat are ready to continue hard-line positions on Israeli withdrawals from occupied Arab territory. Jarring also published a Dec. 28 message from Foreign Minister Eliezer Shalev of Israel agreeing to a resumption of negotiations with Secretary-General U Thant and Jarring.

Dempsy Gets Resignations Of Two Cabinet Members

### Business Mirror Public Sure To Be Victim In Upcoming Steel Unrest

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP) — It is pretty sure that the steel industry will be taking for when the negotiations begin. This includes "a substantial" wage increase, "a cost of living escalator, increased and additional benefits and a four-day work week."

The minimum, a union spokesman said, is what the United Auto Workers got from General Motors Corp. in its 18-week strike in the fall. The GM settlement called for a 30 per cent wage increase over the next three years, plus some very expensive benefits.

One steel industry spokesman summed up 1971 like this: "Bleeding business" for the first seven months; "the doldrums" thereafter.

The hedge-buying apparently has begun. After an industry slump caused by the auto work-strike, orders have been an upping.

"In the past 2 1/2 weeks orders are up 10 per cent," said a spokesman for a major Eastern steel company. "And there aren't any signs of a lull in the steel industry."

In line with the upturn, those during the auto strike slump are expected to begin a recovery. The steel industry will seek price increases regardless of the strike or what happens in the steel market.

Should there be a strike, as weathered in the past, the subsequent settlement is likely to bring about a hike in steel prices. And, as it always has, the price hike would find its way into the pocketbook of the consumer.

A spokesman for a major appliance manufacturing firm in the East said he had to doubt that the steel industry will seek price increases regardless of the strike or what happens in the steel market.

The probability of a price hike was confirmed in recent months by Edwin G. Wainwright, chairman of the nation's largest steelmaker, U.S. Steel Corp.

"I certainly think that if you look at the profit sheets of the steel industry that there is no question that there has been a price increase," Galt told newsmen in New York Dec. 27.

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### France Holds New Outlook On Drugs

PARIS (AP) — France has started the new year with a new approach to the drug problem. It is the punishment of drug takers and a sharp increase in penalties for manufacturers and purveyors.

The new law reflects the recent increase in drug taking and pressure from the United States to do something about the heroin factories in Marseille, where raw drugs from the Middle East are processed for shipment to the United States.

For the first time, use of drugs rather than simple possession is a crime. But proceedings may be suspended if the addict agrees to undergo treatment. And judges may order drug addicts to undergo treatment at approved institutions in lieu of jail terms or fines.

Addicts are also guaranteed anonymity if they turn themselves in voluntarily for treatment.

However, manufacture or sale of hard drugs can now bring sentences more than twice those imposed by the previous law. Sentences for pushing can range from two to 10 years in prison with fines up to \$30,000.

In addition, drug manufacturers may lose their civil rights for up to more than 10 years from specified areas for five years, and lose their driving licenses for three years.

Other articles of the new law ban any artificial means of increasing drug usage and increase police powers of search and detention in drug cases.



### A Dignified Draw

It getting so that, for better or for worse — and we are not very sure it is better — each session of contact between the President and the news media has become a ritual and evaluated from three points of view.

First, how did the President look and perform?

Second, did the news conference produce any news?

Third, how did the press look and perform?

Last night, in the judgment of this particular viewer, President Nixon looked strong and natural and more impressive than usual in what seemed to be a comparative absence of heavy make-up and not particularly hectic lighting.

As for the production of news, last night's conference served mainly to reinforce and clarify previously indicated directions of Presidential thinking.

Beyond such touches, the President used the questions directed at him for a reiteration of the best good hopes and promises of his policies.

Finally, the press itself, through the representatives of the four networks, looked beautifully groomed and elegantly made up and certainly did itself more credit, with such selected performers, than the press en masse had been able to do for itself in the last press conference at the White House.

It was, in summary, an evening well spent, handsome to look at, never too boring for too many minutes at end, and a format which could probably become more productive of interest and news in the future performances which should certainly be scheduled.

The fourth step came with the introduction of mercy, forgiveness and grace. The Ten Commandments were introduced to create harmony and good relations between people.



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### 91st Congress Frustrated In Post-Election Windup

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 91st Congress, its mission to complete the legislative program of the 90th Congress largely frustrated by post-election maneuvering, has passed its last day in history, only 19 days before a new House and Senate take office.

Procrastination in the earlier months and refusal to gear the horse-and-buggy machinery to the space age created a sea-son-and-impasse which long hours and long talk could not overcome.

Adjustment came Saturday afternoon after the Senate agreed to a House-passed resolution shifting the debate over the superconducting transport plane to the 92nd Congress.

Some major bills took the afternoon, including the anti-Communist act, the anti-racketeering act, and the anti-submarine act.

Adding to the crush allowed to pile up for the lame-duck session were long sessions for lengthy holiday recesses earlier in the year and a one-month summer vacation.

Vernon Sabrina Wins Her Battle For Survival

It was a long fight, but Sabrina and her mother, Mrs. Francis Willis Jr., RFD 2, Crystal Lake, Huntington, who was born three months prematurely on Oct. 20. After 10 weeks of intensive care, she slipped the scales at five pounds on Sunday and was allowed to go home to her parents.

Sabrina, the smallest newborn to survive in the hospital last year, was only 14 inches long when she was born, and had a 19 1/2 inch measurement and eight inch chest. Credited with saving the baby's life, along with the devoted attention of the hospital staff and a piece of equipment called a respirator. The equipment has been the mark for about five years and the local hospital has had one for three hospitals. It is used on any baby with breathing difficulties.

In the case of little Sabrina, it was used for five or six weeks. The machine has a device attached to the baby's chest and should the child stop breathing a light flashes and a beeping sound. Hospital personnel can quickly stimulate the baby to restart breathing. At the first few days of her life, Sabrina's weight dropped to one pound 15 ounces and she was given only a 50-50 chance of survival. She spent the early weeks of her life in an incubator equipped with oxygen. Sabrina's leaving caused much emotion for the hospital staff and the baby's mother.







Copter Fliers Find DMZ 'Is Where the War Is'

By HOLLER JENSEN Associated Press Writer QUANG TRI, Vietnam (AP) — There's a gut feeling in the air when a man flies a helicopter gunship near the DMZ, the demilitarized zone that divides the two Vietnams. Scared? "If I said no I'd be lying," grins Capt. Robert Barthelmess. "This is where the war is, bad guy country. It's miles below the pink line. Anything that isn't ours is theirs. You try to kill 'em."

The yarning canopy we comes his stocky frame as he prepares to take off. Rodeo croon, then start as the Cobra helicopter trembles and comes to life. The ground roars. Airborne in olive drab, Barthelmess and Barthelmess feels better. A round of guns, rocket pods under its armaments and only inches wide, which doesn't give Charlie a lot to shoot at. It is a strange, quiet war and a lot of jungle and paddies fields and jungles. Barthelmess says he's been in the United States. South Vietnam is the rice bowl of Southeast Asia. "Not me, Bob."

Once Barthelmess was cabinet-maker in Vallejo, Calif. The U.S. Army invested \$600,000 to make him a Cobra pilot. He was a killer. Now he has to decide whether to spray Charlie with 4,000 rounds a minute from his 1.5-inch minigun, or "free" him with rockets containing 2,500 deadly 1.5-inch shells. One error in judgment or one well-placed enemy bullet, and the Cobra could become \$600,000 worth of scrap metal on the green hills below.

The mission is simple—two Cobra gunships to fly cover for a light observation helicopter (LOH) and a larger Huey chopper carrying a seven-man team of riflemen into enemy territory across the Thach Han River. The Huey will insert the riflemen and extract six tired grunts who've been battling the bush for two days.

Only 12 miles south of the demilitarized zone, the destination is crawling with enemy troops and nameless regulars. Gunships report seven "kills" there every week. Barthelmess is high gun, about 200 feet above the Huey. The LOH circles at treetop level, covered by the other protective Cobra. Chatter becomes more brisk as the river makes its view.

"It's a 9 o'clock look like a good one."

"No sign of bad guys."

The LOH darts over a grassy knoll, a smoke flare marks the landing zone and Barthelmess' wingsman makes a fast figure-eight. The Huey follows, dropping the riflemen and evacuating the grunts-covered man on the ground. As they climb aboard, Barthelmess goes into a screaming 80-degree dive right above their heads to distract any hostile gunners.

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


