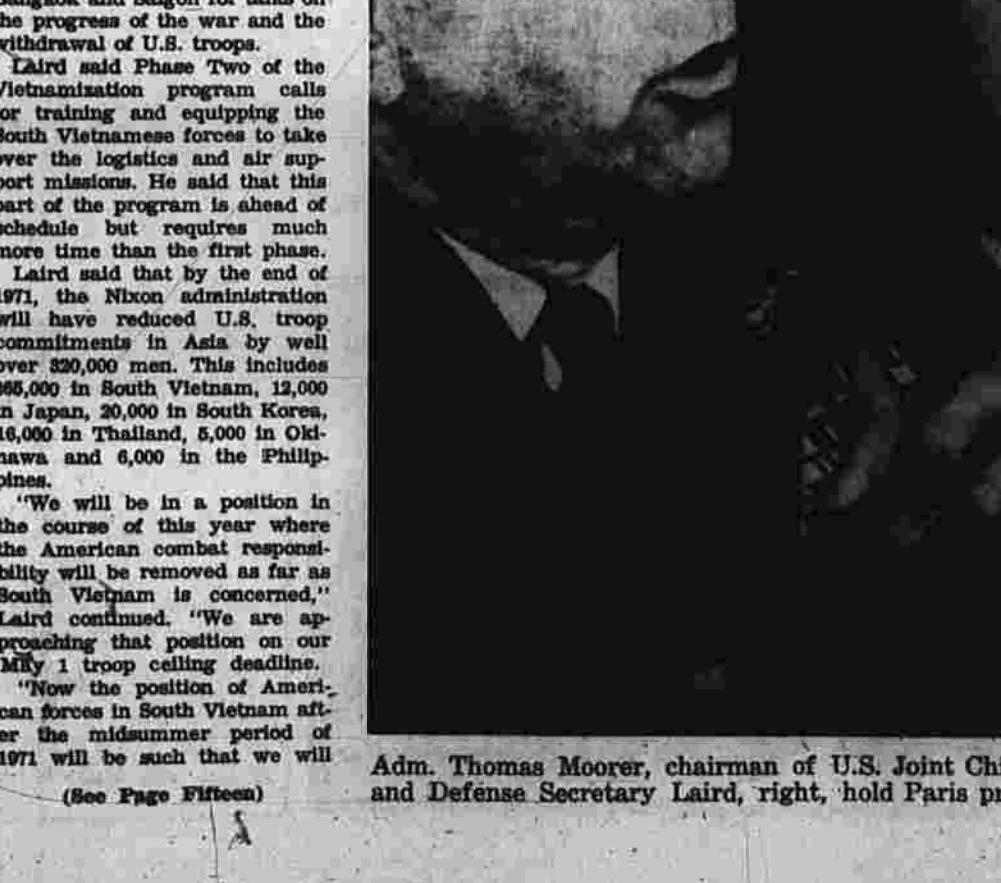

As Peace Talks Resume

The hiatus in peace talks in the Near East has intensified and hardened the confrontation there. Perhaps, by doing so, it has created some chance that when the peace talks resume, they will do so to some purpose.

The result leaves the situation in the Near East much more of a direct confrontation between the United States and Russia than it was before the cease-fire. And, since the assumption about any confrontation between the United States and Russia is that civilization itself couldn't survive its deterioration into nuclear war, the situation now needs to be everybody, including not merely Russia and the United States themselves, but their clients on the scene, must be more careful than before not to precipitate any irrevocable action.

There are no packaged answers to such questions. All that can be said is that if both the protagonists on the scene and their great shadow sponsors on the world scene decide to be pragmatic, then this great age of pragmatism rather than principle, there ought to be international lawyers somewhere who could devise a formula by which the enemies of the Near East could proceed to live and let live with each other, and thus let the rest of the world live too.

\$12 An Hour But Out Of Work

An official of one of the construction unions was quoted, the other day, as being offended by public reports that his union members, now having got their wage rates up toward \$12 an hour, should be classed as \$20,000 to \$25,000 a year men.

The point is conceded. What is notable is that, on his way toward making this particular point, the union official neglected to realize that he may have been making another and a different kind of point. What he was inviting, in his remarks, was some attention to the possibility that this business of getting construction jobs up at \$12 an hour might have something to do with the fact that construction workers are, occasionally, running into periods when there is no work for them to do for their \$12 an hour.

Actually, of course, it is only in what seems a somewhat spectacular hourly amount, rather than in principle, that the present day construction worker is any different from everybody else. Everybody except the retired fixed income person jumps gladly into the inflationary balloon of our times, and each assumes that his wages, or his profits, his costs and his prices, can keep going up forever and that he cannot be blamed, therefore, for at least making sure that he gets for himself as fair a share of the general lot as he can.

No agreement among men, or organization, or institutions, and no policies of government, ever succeed in turning this round and making people realize that their own reasonable dip into the pie is nevertheless one of the things that contributes to its going sour for everybody eventually.

All we know, when the result begins to come to us, is that we had it so good, and that now we suddenly have it so bad. Or, to be specific again without leaving any particular blame, even a 112 an hour man can encounter a situation in which he can't get even one hour's work, partly because the \$12 an hour rate has helped kill off potential new construction projects.

The One-Man Margin. It seems to me that one of the many acts of genius of those incomparable statesmen who drafted the American Constitution was to require more than a bare majority on certain crucial decisions. This requirement of a two-thirds majority of the Senate to ratify a treaty, or the provision that three-fourths of the states must approve a constitutional amendment.

Hence it is one more reminder of the volatility of the judicial process when the Supreme Court alters or reverses some long-standing interpretation of the Constitution by a mere one-vote margin.

Now there is talk that perhaps President Nixon's new appointees to the court will make possible a reversal of the landmark decision on reapportionment, 1962's Baker v. Carr, Associate Justice John Harlan reaffirmed this week his belief that he was right in opposing the majority of his colleagues in Baker v. Carr. That he was joined only by Associate Justice Felix Frankfurter (a formidable colleague) but now he might very well have several others.

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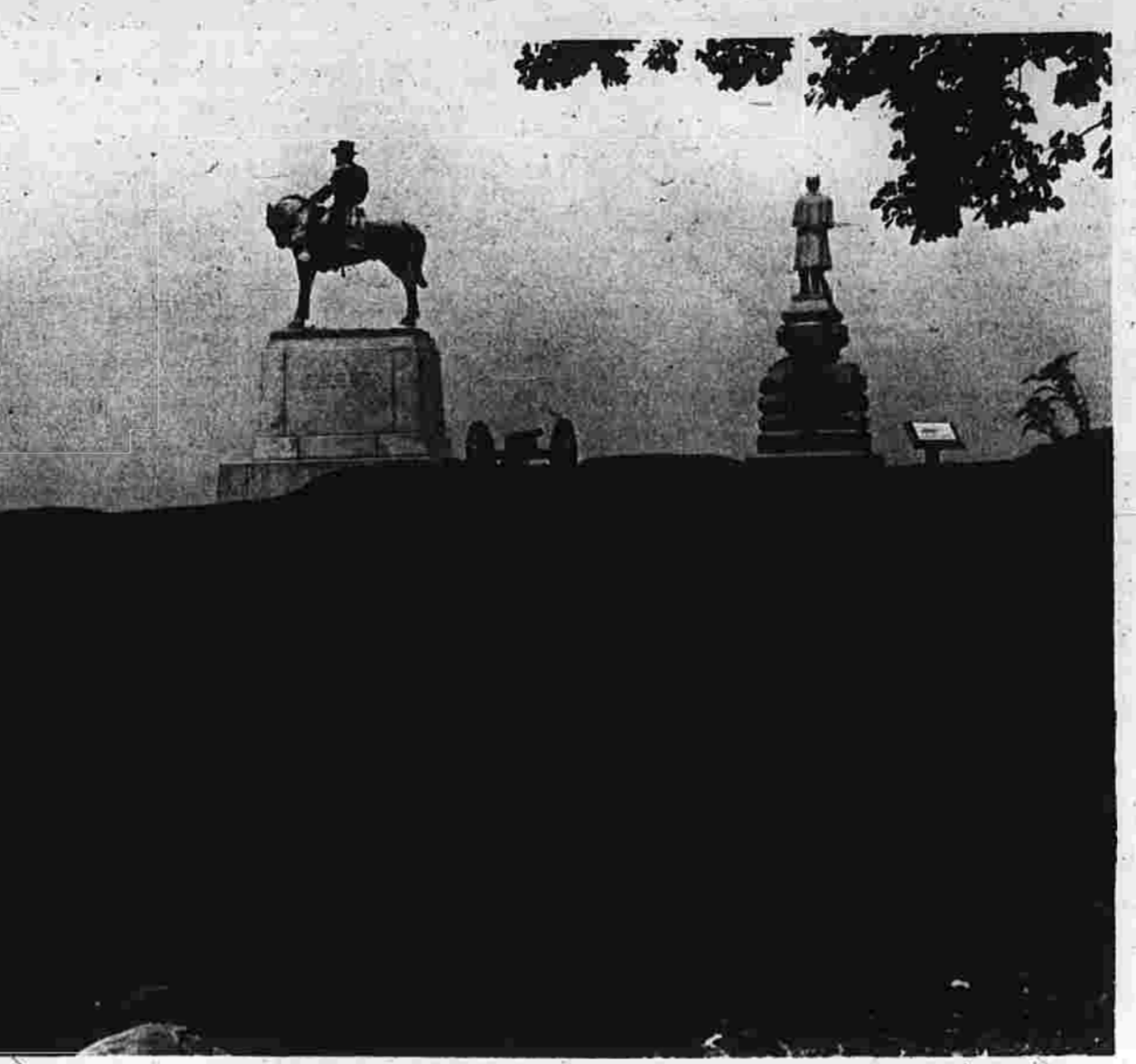

But it is also true that, in keeping with the beneficent purposes of unemployment compensation, the workman usually gets the benefit of the doubt.

The court said this offhand comment was simply too insignificant to deprive the man of his right to compensation.

Finally the mechanic said: "Don't you cuss me, Fire!"

The employer did fire him for his "insolent" attitude. But when the matter was taken to court, the judge ruled that the man was still entitled to full unemployment benefits.

"We believe in elementary justice," said the judge, "that an employee possesses an inherent right to render verbal abuse on the part of his employer."

6-Month Limit Set in Federal Pre-Trial Rule
NEW YORK (AP) — Defendants in federal criminal cases must be brought to trial within six months or the charges against them dropped, according to new rules issued by the U.S. Court of Appeals.

The directive, contained in a set of new guidelines designed to speed up federal criminal proceedings, will affect New York, Connecticut and Vermont, the states under the jurisdiction of an eight-judge court of appeals panel which published the guidelines Tuesday.

The panel declared: "If the government is not ready for trial within such time, or within the period as extended by the district court for good cause, then upon application of the defendant or upon motion of the district court, after opportunity for argument, the charge shall be dismissed."

The new rules will take effect in July. The panel said the three states had reported an increasing number of criminal cases pending for at least a year, even though defendants were available for trial.

Campus Agents Felt Harmful

NEW YORK (AP) — The chairman of the President's Commission on Campus Unrest agreed with students Tuesday that infiltration of campuses by federal agents was harmful and should be removed from colleges where they are protested.

Red China Greets 1971 Buoyantly

By JOHN RODERICK Associated Press Writer. TOKYO (AP) — Communist China's greeting to 1971 was less strident than its statements at the start of 1970. The wishes about revolution and the hate of Soviet and American rulers continue, but they are muted in the annual policy statement carried by Peking publications.

The mood this year is buoyant where in 1970 it was bitter and belligerent. The long, detailed indictments of Soviet "revisionism" and U.S. "imperialism" have been dropped and in their place appears an unusual promise that, in its international relations, Peking "at no time ... ever will behave like a superpower, neither today nor in the future."

All this seems a reflection of stability following three tumultuous years of Cultural Revolution purge. The third five-year plan "has been successfully fulfilled," rich harvests have been reaped for nine years running. The picture may be rosier than the reality, but it contrasts with the chaos of the Cultural Revolution.

Chairman Mao Tse-tung's campaign to mend the broken Communist party apparatus and reassert its dominance over the military has made progress.

The fourth National People's Congress and the fourth five-year plan began this year. It also is to be the 50th anniversary of the party, formed July 1, 1921.

Absent from this year's blueprint are 1970 references to "political power growing out of the barrel of a gun," the personal attacks on Soviet leaders, and threats to "drown" potential invaders.

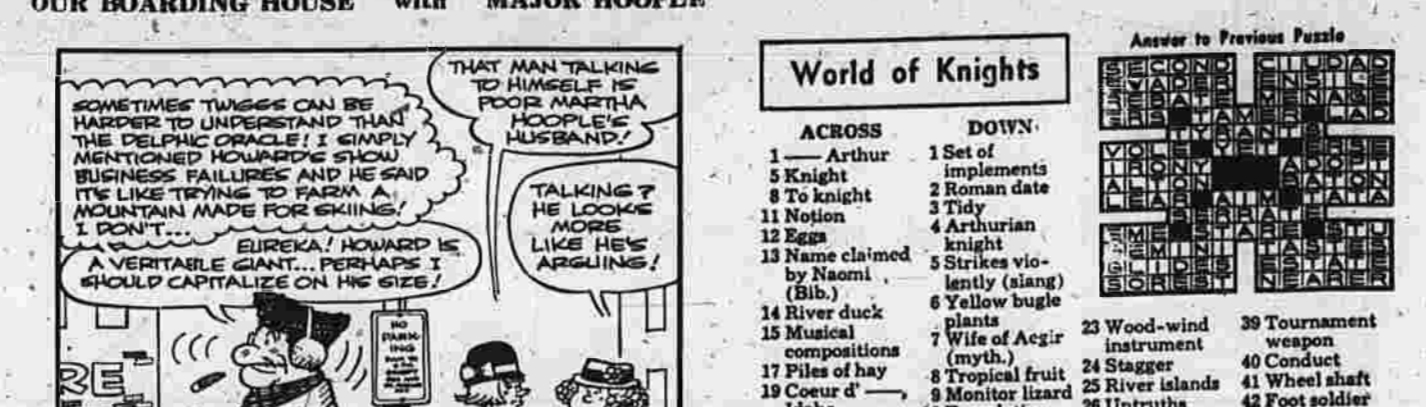
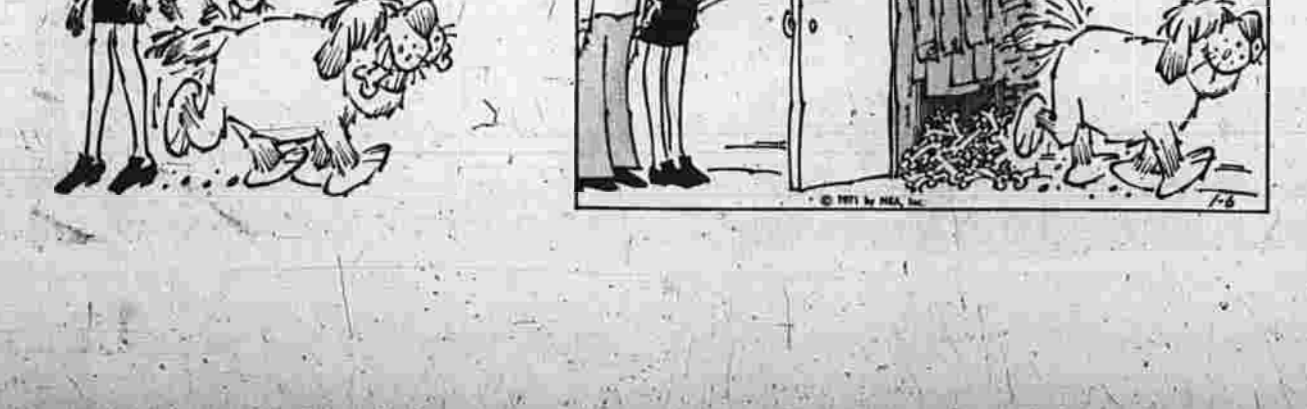

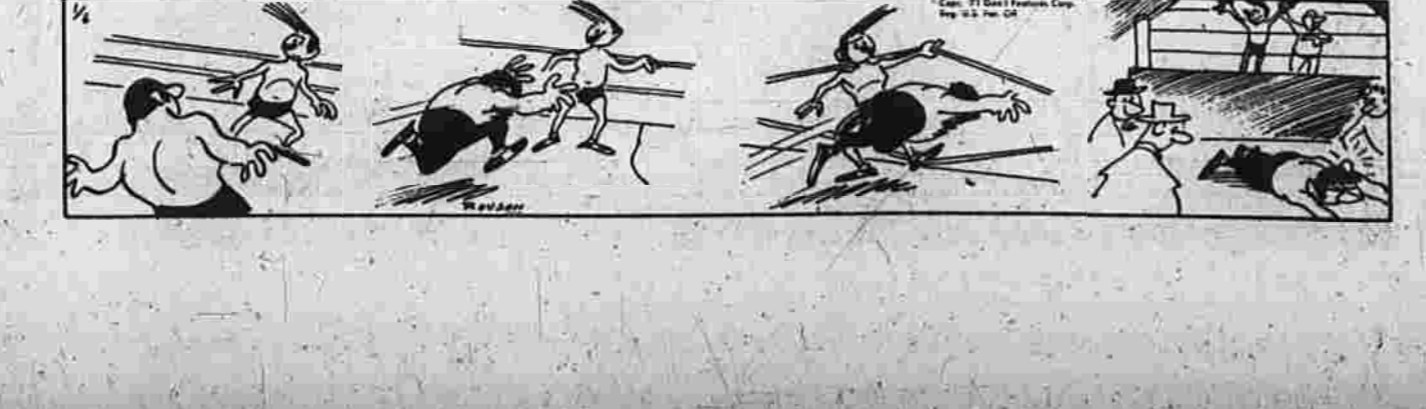

Woman, 70 Is Expert On Repairs

HAYFIELD, Minn. (AP) — There lives near Hayfield a plumber-carpenter-cement worker and all-around repair expert who, at age 70, is thinking about alighting into retirement. Mrs. Eckland built the kitchen cupboards for the house. She said she got started at the craft 25 years ago when "a lady asked me to paper for her, and I papered." Then it was painting. Then it was laying carpet, then paneling, then putting up ceiling tile. Recently she's been doing a major plumbing job at the Arlington home of a sister. She installed a new bathtub, stool and sink, built in all the items and also built a vanity. Before that she did all the finishing work on a new funeral chapel at Hayfield.

Her husband, 70, is mechanically inclined but Mrs. Eckland says she does all the repair and remodeling work at home. "I do it alone, every darn bit of it," she says. She added that her husband helps with lawn-movers. For the work she has done for others, Mrs. Eckland says, she generally has been paid too much. Even so, she says, the biggest reward she has received is praise for a job well done. She'd like to take off, doing work only for her sisters, but she says "it's just so darn hard to turn your friends and neighbors down."
