Wednesday, January 6 As Peace Talks Resume

The hiatus in peace talks in the Near East has intensified and hardened the confrontation there. Perhaps, by doing so, it has created some chance that, when the peace talks resume, they will do so to some purpose.

The main thing that has happened since the truce was first negotiated and the first peace talks were held and then abruptly discontinued is that both the great outside powers involved in the Near East conflict have deepened and increased their commitment to their respective clients in the area.

When, in the first hours of the truce, the Russians and Egyptians did something with their alignment of interceptor missiles along the Suez frontier, they handed Israel a master bargaining point which has now been used, with the United States, to produce closer and greater United States military provision and guarantee to Israel than ever before. It is under cover of such increased assurances from the United States that Israel now consents to return to the peace talks.

No doubt Russia, on the other side of the equation, has felt compelled to increase its own assurances to Egypt. The result leaves the situation in the

Near East much more of a direct confrontation between the United States and Russia than it was before the cease-fire.

And, since the assumption about any confrontation between the United States and Russia is that civilization itself couldn't survive its deterioration into nuclear war, the situation now reads that verybody, including not merely Russia and the United States themselves, but their clients on the scene, must be more careful than before not to precipitate any rretrievable action.

How much can civilization rely upon such an increased awareness of the nature of the stakes in the Near East? Does the "impossibility" of allowing nuclear war to develop out of this situation constitute any real guarantee that the nation-actors in that situation will refrain from experimenting to see how lose they can get to explosion without actually triggering it? Can the obvious necessity for coexistence in the Near East tranform itself into an inevitabili-

There are no packaged answers to such questions. All that can be said is that if both the protagonists on the scene and their great shadow 'sponsors on the world scene decide to be pragmatic, in this great age of pragmatism rather than principle, there ought to be international lawyers somewhere who could devise a formula by which the enemies of the Near East could proceed to live and let live with each other, and thus let the rest of the world live too.

We are this much ahead - and it is a great deal to be ahead - of where we were before the cease-fire came into effect last summer. The fates involved are at least being examined instead of being blindly rushed into. The fates and stakes have, in the meantime, become more binding. It almost seems, then, that the resumption of peace talks cannot fail. That does not mean that a wisp of prayer, from mankind as a whole, would be inappropriate.

#### \$12 An Hour But Out Of Work

An official of one of the construction mions was quoted, the other day, as beng offended by public reports that his mion members, now having got their wage rates up toward \$12 an hour, should be classed as \$20,000 to \$25,000 a

"If you take the hourly wages and nultiply them by thousands of hours," said this union official, "you might get hat kind of salary figure in some areas. But we've got at least 6,000 members out of work in northern California alone, and 2,000 unemployed in Ohio. So you can't just multiply the hourly rate by the number of hours a man could possibly

The point is conceded. What is notable is that, on his way toward making this particular point, the union official neglected to realize that he may have been making another and a different kind of point.

What he was inviting, in his remarks was some attention to the possibility that this business of getting construction labor up to \$12 an hour might have something to do with the fact that construction workers are, occasionally, running into periods when there is no work for them to do for their \$12 an hour. Actually, of course, it is only in what seems a somewhat spectacular hourly amount, rather than in principle, that the present day construction worker is any different from everybody else. Everybody except the retired fixed income person jumps gladly into the inflationary balloon of our times, and each assumes that his wages, or his profits, his costs and his prices, can keep going up forever and that he cannot be blamed, therefore, for at least making sure that he gets for himself as fair a share of the general loot as he can.

No agreement among men, or organization, or institutions, and no policies of government, ever succeed in turning this round and making people realize that their own reasonable dip into the pie is nevertheless one of the things that contributes to its going sour for everybody eventually

All we know, when the result begins to come to us, is that we had it so good, and that now we suddenly have a lot less. Or, to be specific again without levying any particular blame, even a 1\$2 an hour man can encounter a situation in which he can't get even one hour's work, partly because the \$12 an hour rate has helped kill off potential new construction projects.

## The One-Man Margin

It seems to me that one of the many acts of genius of those incomparable statesmen who devised the American Constitution was to require more than a bare majority on certain crucial deci-Thus the requirement of a twohirds majority of the Senate to ratify a reaty, or the provision that threeourths of the states must approve titutional amendment. Hence it is one more reminder of the

volatility of the judicial process when the Supreme Court alters or reverses some long-standing interpretation of the Constitution by a mere one-vote margin The spectacle of four learned and dis inguished jurists saying that white is white, and four equally eminent men saying no, it is black, is never edifying. We had it in multiple form in the Supreme Court's decisions on the 18-year old vote. There Associate Justice Huge Black was the swing man, turning with group of four of his colleagues on one of the issue, and with group of four on another.

onal questions turn on fir points, of course. But to have five sep arate opinions written among nine jus tices is a bit ridiculous. That's what happened. It shakes the layman's faith clarity of law and the validity of its erpretation. I have a feeling that great chief justices of the pas would have required their colleagues to reach a greater consensus before they exposed themselves to the public with tive opinions.

Now there is talk that perhaps President Nixon's new appointees to the court will make possible a reversal of the landmark decision on reapportionme 1962's Baker V. My own long-held belief, for which I have been roundly criticized by lawyer friends, is that on constitutional matters, the court should be required to have more than a one-vote margin. Per it should be 6 to 3. or 7 to 2. Af ter all, in the jury box unanimity is usu-

required. Is the Constitution any less important? Of course, the founding fathers never expected the Supreme Court to have the power it has not attained. They did not resee that the Constitution would be



The requirement for more than a bare majority runs through American experience. It is contemplated, for instance, in amendment to the presidential election ovisions, so that the nation does not ave a minority president. More than a majority used to be required for presidential nominations in the conventions In state constitutions there are many brakes on precipitous action.

The essence of the American system is the safeguarding of power against abuse. The three branches of government, the division of authority between he federal government and the states, the very coalition nature of the political parties, all fragment power. These elenents often delay action. But they have notines prevented disaster.

of his own bad temper. Unemployment compensation laws usually do disqualify, in varying degree, the man who is fired for insubordination. The reason is that these laws are intended to help the workman who is the innocent victim economic forces, not the workman who makes his own trou

But it is also true that, i keeping with the beneficent purpose of unemployment compen-sation, the workman usually gets the benefit of the doubt. That is, he will not be disqualified if his misconduct was nothing serious.

For example, a court refused disqualify a workman who ad been fired just for remarking to his supervisor: "You don't do much of any-

court said this offhand comment was simply too insigificant to deprive the man o his right to compensation. Furthermore, the courts will take into account any provoca-tion that might have brought on he workman's outburst. In another case, a mechanic paused in his work to wait for further nstructions. His employer, passing by, began to swear at him for being idle, refusing to

listen to any explanations. Finally the mechanic said: "Don't you cuss me. Fire The employer did fire him for is "insolent" attitude. But

when the matter was taken to court, the judge ruled that the man was still entitled to full unemployment benefits. "We believe in elementary justice," said the judge, "that an employee possesses the in-herent right to resent verbal abuse on the part of his employ-

# **GIs Taking Out Frustration with Viet War** By Hurling Explosives at Their Own Officers

QUANG TRI, Vietnam (AP) - Sgt. Gene Tingley usually got to the orderly room shortly before 6 a.m. to relieve the night duty sergeant. That morning he overslept. At 6:03, five pounds of plastic explosive blew the headquarters building apart. The blast crippled the duty sergeant and broke the leg of a GI asleep in the next room. "It took me until about noon to figure out they were out to get me," Tingley said. "Then it was kinda shocking."

Tingley, 37, of Madrid, Iowa, first sergeant of Headquarters Company, 14th Engineers, was the target of a "fragging"—an ttack by a GI using a fragmentation grenade or other explo-sive against another American, usually his sergeant or an offi-






