

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
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Double-Boomerang

Unpleasant, unnecessary, boomerans ish, criminal acts are now being perpetrated, in both the United States and Russia, against citizens and representatives of the other nation. Individual Russians, and Russian institutions, are being harassed in this country, with the harassment extending up into the use of explosives. Americans in Russia are being made the target for personal abuse and vandalistic tricks.

But, although it is the same kind of thing which is happening to nationals of both countries inside the other country, there is a vital difference the Russians do not seem to understand.

The violence in this country toward our Russian guests is the policy of an extremist fringe of a minority, and it is a policy which is deplored by other members of that minority as well as by Americans in general and by their government in particular.

The retaliatory harassments of Ameri cans in Russia, however, almost have to be government policy in order to occur. The ordinary people of Russia are not even well informed enough about what goes on in America to develop spontaneous resentment over it.

If there is an act of violence toward Russians in America, it is certain to be an act privately planned and accomplished by evading and outwitting the aw, which would prevent it if it could. If there is an act of violence toward Americans in Russia, it is likely that the Russian police themselves may be responsible

There ought to be an end of such vendetta in both countries, and it is to be hoped that this country can take the lead by restraining its own extreme activists, both by the pressure of public opinion, and by enforcement of law. But it should also be a responsible part of Russian behavior for the Russian government to realize, first, that our government is not permissively responsible for the bomb ings which have taken place here, and, second, that Russian planned reprisal is doubly dangerous because it allows a small violent extremist group in this country to create international trouble of a magnitude and intensity the American people as a whole do not deserve or wish to encounter.

Freedom Is Wet Feet

It is to be noted that President Nixon, allowing himself to be photographed on the occasion of his 58th birthday, chose to be taken walking along a beautifully lonely stretch of beach and then, almost as if he himself had forgotten the cameras on him, allowed his feet to wander into the path of an oncoming wave, so that he experienced, once again, the ineffable and unequalled joy of getting his feet wet.

We were pleased to see him deliberate ly turn back all the years and grab this pleasurable sensation for himself, and we were envious, too, not only of the fact that he could get his feet wet if he wanted to, but of the beautiful insouciance with which he wore his small boy look of mingled intent and innocence.

Not long ago we happened to watch a much younger boy 'accomplishing the same thing, toward the same kind of blissful satisfaction, and it is our report that the President was just as smooth and clever about it as the small boy and wore, afterward, exactly the same subtle smile of triumph over the legions of propriety and law and order.

This brings us, we think, to as weighty a definition of what is freedom as we shall probably ever deliver.

Freedom is when, anybody, even a President, can get his feet wet if he feel like it.

Happy birthday, Mr. President! Hap v feet! Happy waves!

The Bedside Shadow

By the evidence accumulated in a recent Wall Street Journal survey, this law-suit-crazy society of ours is now beginning to turn its attention to the rich potentials glimpsed in allegations of malpractice against the nation's doctors.

There has been, in some sections of the country, a marked increase in the number of malpractice suits brought. The result has been to frighten both the doctors and the insurance companies the doctors so that they are almos afraid to practice alone, the insurance companies so that some of them have begun getting out of the field of malpractice insurance.

Eventually, one way or another, this is going to make all health more expen sive, just as society really has to bear collectively the expense of the great modern craze for negligence suits.

And just as the business of claims for the results of automobile accidents is going to have to come under regulation and limitation of amounts, so excesses in the joyous business of suing the doctor will eventually bring a necessary reaction, which will make it possible for physician and patient to live together again without having to think, every moment, of what lawyer they will hire against each other.

Inside the psychology of this law-suitcrazy society of ours there is a near relative of that unquenchable human desire to get something for nothing. It is not quite that, for there is frequently an injury involved, and a sense of injury, and a feeling that simple justice demands some recompense. But we do have a gambler's instinct to see whether what we are going to get will be all we fully deserve, or perhaps, unpleasantly, a little short of it.

Perhaps, in the evolution of our sweet human natures, we are going to grow out of this business of trying to put a high price, through the insurance process, on the negligence and imperfections of others. But if we don't, we are eventually going to have to regulate our exploitation of all those golden geese of misfortune we have set up for ourselves in one field after another. It might even seem pleasant, some day, and it might be especially healthy; to get back to a condition in which a patient would incline to trust a doctor, and a doctor could trust his patient.
