





The largest age group is the present seven year old one, , which has consistantly taken first place each year the census recorded. The seven-yearolds number 256, followed closeiy by the four-year-olds, 248, and the nine-year-olds who account for 245 children this year. As a comparison there are only 40 twenty-year-olds in town.





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

When Votes Displease Us

On the United Nations Colonialism Committee things haven't been going the way Britain and the United States like to have things go, in word and vote, and so these two great nations have now withdrawn from membership in the

United Nations subsidiary body. This illustrates two things, one in the realm of law, the other in the realm of spirit.

First, there is no legal compulsion which binds any country inside any United Nations process it doesn't happen to like

Second, although the United States and Britain, to give them credit, have remained on the committee in question longer than it pleased them, they have, in the end, felt no overpowering moral compulsion to submit themselves to a United Nations process they don't happen to like.

When the United Nations was being created, there were hopes for it higher . sion, back in 1968, of the possibility that than that.

There were hopes that it would be a world federation, so strong it could only be threatened and challenged and tested by some revolution as deep and violent as the Civil War which had unsuccessfully challenged the federation which was the United States.

small nations, which it could be imagined might have little choice, but great nations as well would consider it their special obligation, as world leaders, to submit themselves to the jurisdiction and judgment of the United Nations even in instances when they did not like the re-

We have some grounds for being displeased with what has been happening in the United Nations Colonialism Committee. Its African members who are most sensitive on the issue of colonialiam have let themselves be snared by Communist diplomacy into a boring, exasperating routine in which every slight surviving touch of colonialism on the part of any western nation is a major crime, while Russia, no matter how much it may dominate the lives of other peoples by one stratagem or another, is always being classified with the angels.

But, although we are often unfairly classified and charged in many of the verdicts of the Colonialism Committee, we are not by any means free of responsibility in the field of colonialism, as any examination of our physical and political positions in the Pacific will illustrate

The fact that we do continue to hold some responsibility in the colonialism area constitutes some reason why we should not seem to quit a United Nations organ merely because we do not control the votes and sentiments of a majority of its members. We should, as a minimum, be at least as willing to remain inside international processes when they are going against us as we expected Russia to be willing to remain in them when we had Russia almost automatically outvoted in every possible United Nations functioning.

The Not-So-Terrible Mr. Maddox

The nature of the human being, and the nature of the game of politics being what they are, it was almost predictable that the performance in office of Lester G. Maddox would prove something different than he himself once promised it would be.

When he campaigned and got himself elected Governor of Georgia four years ago Maddox had the reputation, as a New York Time correspondent describes it, "of a rip-snorting, Bible-toting, flag-

waving, pistol-packing, God - fearing white supremacist who had defended his tried chicken restaurant against prospective Negro customers with ax handles, picketed the White House twice, championed the Ku Klux Klan, endorsed the John Birch Society, and founded an anti-integration group called GUTS, an acronym for Georgians Unwilling to Sur-

"His campaign was anti-civil rights. anti-welfare, anti-Communist, anti-Catholic, anti-Lyndon Johnson, anti-alcohol, anti-United Nations and anti-Supreme Court "

These were the things that set the anticipation for what was expected to be a new dark age for Georgia. Now, as Lester Maddox leaves office.

the post-mortems are surprisingly mild. Those who expected disaster have discovered , that, somehow, Maddox was never quite as bad as he seemed likely to be.

It seems to be on the record that, willingly or not, Governor Maddox, in these past four years, presided over more integration than had occurred in all the rest of Georgia's history.

And people of Connecticut will be interested in the fact that Governor Maddox took such an interest in his state's penal system that he paved the way for his successor. Governor-elect Carter, to employ away from Connecticut its Commissioner of Corrections, Ellis Mac-Dougall, who is probably the nation's number one dedicated servant in

Two things often happen when extremist campaigners actually come into office and responsibility. First, they inevitably discover that the real problems of public service are not subject to simplistic answers and solutions. Second, they find that they themselves have a human desire to be remembered for broader and more constructive views than they may have exhibited in their campaigning. Mr. Maddox is currently smiling, one can be sure, at the discovery that he really wasn't so terrible, af-

What A Might-Have-Been!

It now seems to have passed from the realm of rumor into that of probability that there was some long range discus-Hubert Humphrey might engage one Nelson Rockefeller to be his nomines for Vice President.

New York's Governor himself seems to have a sharp recollection of having been approached, by Humphrey representatives, with such a proposition.

Humphrey sources have begun admitting that such approaches might have been made, not, of course, with Humphrey's own involvement, hesitates to discuss the post po-

tential of such horrendous possibilities, for fear that they may, in this unpredictable age of ours, rise up to confront us again some time in the future.

Yet, as we consider the closeness of the 1968 verdict, it becomes conceivable that the presence of a Republican on the Democratic Presidential ticket might have been enough to swing the election, and thus confront the nation during the past two years with a Humphrey-Rockefeller version of national unity instead of the bringing together we have had under Richard Nixon.

At this point in the imaginative process all of us who have ever had the fleeting impression that perhaps President Nixon was a little bit square, a little bit sticky, a little too loquacious in his digressions and slightly corny now and then realize, suddenly how lucky we think we are, that that long-range 1968 matchmaking never did come off.

Fired Pilot **Rehired** To Study Waste

MIAMI (AP) - Jet captain Villiam Guthrie, fired by Eastern Airlines after he took a stand against pollution, has been rehired as a politition con-

sultant: Eastern announced Monday it had agreed with the Airline Pilot's Association to rehire Guthrie, a 58-year-old veteran of 30 years with the airline who was ired from his \$37,000-a-year job

The airline released him after charging Guthrie had delayed six flights up to 98 minutes in order to remove a few pints of jet fuel that collected in each direraft engine while the plane sat on the ground. Normal procedure was to

blow the fuel out after the plane was airborne, the airline said. Guthrie said the expelled fuel added to pollution-caused haze that increased the hazard of inflight collisions.

After Guthrie was fired, the National Air Pollution Control Administration termed the fueldumping procedures "seemingy needless pollution" and urge airlines to find some other method.

Guthrie, who returned Eastern with his former rank back pay and seniority, said: "I'm very happy to be back But we paid an awful price. paid with my job, the airline with public displeasure."

Guthrie said the few pints of terosine blown from each aircraft engine added up to "500 to 00 gallons a day when you figure 800 to 1,000 flights a day at Wiami airport alone." Guthrie said that while he is

not an expert on pollution his new job would enable him to continue the lectures on pellution problems to colleges, high schools and civic groups he has been giving since he was fired.

But when he was three, Jane and Eddie decided they wanted him back. The grandparents re fused to part with the boy, s the two couples squared off in the courtroom to fight for cus-

"Parents outrank grandparents argued the younger pair. But it lso appeared that Jane and Eddie drank too much, worked too little, and had no home of their own. The court ruled that the boy s better off where he was with his grandparents. It is not rare for parents and

grandparents to disagree about the custody of a child. Generally speaking, the law puts its main mphasis on what is best for the child, even at the expense of parental sensibilities.

Nevertheless, in most instances, parents are indeed favored over grandparents because they are the natural" custodians of their own offspring. As one court put it: "The law seeks to work in harmony with nature, and to con-

tinue those ties which bind man to his own flesh." Thus, in another case, parents regained custody of their daughter even though they had no savings, no life insurance, and only

modest income. Noting that heir income at least was steady and their habits sober, the court "Unless they are to be deprived

for all time of the love of their child, and of the opportunity to give her their love, they should be given that chance now." Are a child's own wishes taken into consideration? Yes, if he is mature enough to have indepen-

dent views. But usually this factor is not decisive by itself. A 15-year-old boy, transferred to his parents' home after many

years with his grandmother, was nhappy about the change. He said in a court hearing that, because of squabbling between his mother and father, he wanted to move back with his grandmother But the court held that th boy's discontent was not enough reason to grant his request. The court said he would probabl soon get used to the shift from a heltered existence with his grand nother to the normal abrasions of family life.

Encyclopedia **Omits Beria**

By DEV MURARKA

The London Observer MOSCOW-Lavrenti Beria, in famous chief of Soviet security police during the last years of Stalin, finds no place in th third and latest volume of the new Soviet encyclopedia.

In the old edition nublishe when Beria was at the heigh of his powers, he was given page and a half of eulogy and full page photograph. Afte his fall, buyers of the old en cyclopedia were given a substi e page from which the entry and the photo of Beria had been omitted. Most people, however, kept the old entry as well a the new page. Not even a critical entry

about Beria has been included in the new volume, although he denounced sharply in Com munist party history books. The omission is an exception

to the latest encyclopedia's objectivity. Several new or revised entries testify to its vas superiority in reliability and quality over its predecessor. In the old one there was only one entry under Berlin. A large part of it was devoted to East

Berlin and its glorification. In the new edition, Berlin has three separate entries: One for the city's fortunes up to 1945 another for East Berlin and a third for West Berlin, which emphasizes its separate and independent status, presumably indication of the current o ficial attitude toward the city'

Another innovation is that th major entries are signed. There is evidence that the editors ave drawn upon unorthodo Soviet scholars to get the best possible results.

A notable example is an arti-cle on the Bible. In the old verion the Bible was described as a book that was "widely used by the church organizations and the exploiting classes to blacker the consciousness of the toiling masses and to prolong the cla




