As I drew closer I saw one boat gaff and pull in a cod which nust have been at least 30lb., and whooped out loud, swinging the dinghy towards the action and hearing the loud chatter of excited fishermen. Almost every boat was into cod, and sometime two men in one boat were stuck into hard fights with heavy fish.

I cut the engine uptide and drifted down, working a seven ounce ABU Sextett lure at about 15 fathoms. Almost immediately I took a strike, a heavy bang which dragged down the rodtip made the slipping clutch chatter. The fish fought deep and hard and heavy, but finally came struggling to the surface, all head and belly. I gaffed it and dragged it inboard, killing it with a hammer brought for that purpose. The cod would go about 25lb. I moved up and was taken as it fluttered down and brought in a cod of about 10lb. I droppe the bait again and hit another fish slightly smaller, and then a fourth abou

The next drifts produced strikes but missed the fish. On about the sixteent drift, the lure was stopped so solidly was sure I had snagged the rocks. fish moved quickly and began the heav pounding, diving fight of the big cod. I leaned back against it. It went on mak ing short, heavy rushes, but giving a little way each time. I fought it as hard as dared, and the line was slowly being recovered as the cod came reluctantly upwards. Finally he was close to th urface, a great head and eyes and gap ing mouth. He was the cod I had dream ed of catching ever since I first began fishing when I caught codling from the North Pier at Blackpool and stared with envy at the picture of the twenty pounder in the window of the tackle shop

I drew him slowly towards the bos ding the rod high with one hand and making ready with the gaff in the other When I hit the fish I knew he would truggle hard and try to sound, and tha would need to drop the rod and hold ard with both hands to drag him inpoard, I also knew that I would need to risk swamping the dinghy which has only a low freeboard, a thought made he more uneasy because I cannot swim The big cod came close to the boat, within gaffing rach. 





The government in its January price report will change to a 1967-59.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics also reported a slight increase in the purchasing power of some 45 million rank and file workers following three straight months of declining buying power.

The average paycheck rose \$1.08 per week to \$122.43, \$4.81 above a year earlier.
