Conference May Tighten Drug Control

barbiturates, "speed" and LSD—is expected to tighten as a result of a United Nations conference taking place here. Experts from 62 countries are ensidering control measures

for a proposed treaty supplementing the present Convention on Narcotic Drugs. That 1861 statement came into force Dec. 13, 1964, and has been ratified by 80 countries, including the United States. It never covered psychotropic drugs. What it set out to achieve was a legal framework for control of opiates, derivatives of opium. Even this limited step has no

expert declared.

Nor are the controls envisaged for psychotropic drugs likely to be watertight.

U.N. officials speak of "two frontiers" being involved—lilegal trafficking and overdosing of prescribed drugs.

"It is difficult to define the limit of illegal circulation of psychotropic drugs," the U.N. expert said, "because of the widespread illicit use of these drugs and the unknown degree of overdosing."
