When Crusades Tackle Specifics

The trouble with idealiam is, of course, that it sometimes splinters itself, or even knocks itself out, when it gets down to specifics.

Four months ago, a highly respected blic servant, John W. Gardner, once retary of HEW in the Johnson Cabinet, launched a new national organiza tion called "Common Cause," designed to rally Americans to crusades to improve the quality and the functioning of American public life. In short order, such was the shining reputation of Mr. Gardner, "Common Cause" had received initial financing of \$1,500,000 from several corporate angels and from \$0,000 members who paid \$15 each for the privilege of associating themselves with the forthcoming crusade

Then, after such an auspicious begin ning, "Common Cause" selected its first crusade. It was a crusade to revise the seniority system in Congress.

main through many more years of the seniority system, that the presence of important committees in Senate and House is an automatic block to progressive legislation of all kinds.

Knock out these impossible reactionaries, and get younger men in their place, and good legislation will flow through Congress like downhill mo lasses in August, or so the expectation would seem to be.

The strategy, and the philosophy, with which "Common Cause" selected such a target has been explained. It and its leadership wanted to prove that it was not just an up-in-the-clouds idealistic venture, but an organization which would be able to select specific political objectives and then power and persuade its way to them.

But the moment this particular target was selected for its first crusade, "Common Cause" began losing in two ways.

First, some members of its staff apparently tried to use the supposed prestige and power of the new organization itself in order to try to twist arms and persuade votes inside Congress on the seniority issue,

Second, there was immediate and justifiable questioning, out in the hinterlands, as to the soundness and balance of the crusading leadership which had selected the issue of seniority for its first target. It is not always the opposition of crusty old men which slows the progress of good legislation in Congress. It is, much more often, the fact that good legislation has not yet been put to the analysis or put into the final shape which would merit adoption.

e would think "Common Cause" ould have done better to devote its first energies to demonstrating how to produce and offer a good bill rather than seeking its first victory or defeat on an attempt to obtain a temporary change in the personnel which would preside over committee deliberations on such a bill.

We may be unjust. Perhaps, as we selves indicated at the beginning. there has to be an inevitable let-down never any idealistic crusade selects specific objective. But those cynics at Washington who have already begun referring to "Common Cause" as "John Gardner's Lost Cause" may be unfortunately close to the truth,

The Buck For The Tabasco

One hopes, for their sake, and for the ake of all of us, that the appearance of such a disillusioning reality is going to be only a temporary hiatus in the nobly evolutionary careers of our younger eneration.

But the momentary sad news is that the conscience stricken affluence they have rebelled against even while they ubsisted on its fringes is over. It's jus not with us, for a moment or two,

That occasional cushion, that occasional dipping well which helped buttress their healthy and refreshing disdain for the crude and tasteless busi ness of earning a living have, for the moment, been placed beyond reach.

The family cash is likely to be growng a bit short. The gay caballero kind dalliance with work, in which the young wanderers of our time would walk n almost anywhere and nail a job for a weeks in order to make up a stake for their next move - that doean't work when the places that used to be glad to hire any wanderer, just to put another warm body on the payroll, are busy laying off their own steady employes.

Slight economic realities are beginning to creep into the existence of the perpetual graduate student. It takes cash to buy a new set of frayed denims now and then. That communal diet gets down close to scurvy unless it is brightened up with some unlog-picked greens.

Most of the younger generation, bless them, are still too free and too dedicated to worry about their own tomorrows. They will, we hope, never have to grovel before the great god money, as some of us did when, in ugly depression days, we thought we didn't know where the next necessity might be coming from. We would, if we could, exempt all of them from the experience of ever making sordid bargains in which they ubordinated their versatile and interesting talents to the dull objective of somelike a regular weekly pay en-

We believe in them, and in their being different from us, and we are sadder than they themselves yet know how to be at the prospect that anything of a serious economic nature, like a recession which lops all the fringes off that great affluence we seemed to have only a few months ago, should ever interrupt their creation of a new kind of civilization. They are so right on so many of their theories, with even the economists admitting that our civilization is so efliciently productive that it no longer really needs slavish work from anybody that it is more of a cruel jest on them than anything useful to society as a denly blighted by such a rude question as who's got the buck for the Tabasco. We hope, for their sake and ours, that lush times return soon enough and swiftly enough to spill over before any pernanent disillusionment is inflicted.

Don't Buy It Yet

Not just a piggyback tax — a monkey on the back of Connecticut: That's the way a dissenting member of the Gover-nor's Revenue Task Force described the ation for a new state income issued yesterday— and after reading provisions contained in the report we

can see what he means. A number of legislators in Hartford were described as being in a state of shock at the size and scope of the recommendations for new taxes. Recommen dations for the whopper of an income tax were only part of it. The 5 per cent sales tax was pegged by the report to stay at its present high level, with a number of present exemptions, including children's clothes, abolished. And a number of new taxes, and raises in present taxes are

The assigned job of the Revenue Tasl Force, as the report observes, was to figure new ways of raising money. This plainly was not enough. There should have been-and should now be-a State Expenditures Task Force working with he revenue task force, to increase eficiency and cut costs of state government at the same time.

Governor Dempsey appointed the Revenue Task Force more than 15 months ago - he saw the handwriting on th concerning the size of the deficit which he was powerless to control even though legislators of his own party had triggered most of it.

Governor Meakill is not bound to follow them. Indeed, if he values the welfare of the state and his own political future, he would be ill advised to do more than acnowledge them at this point, Meskill is rapped by a Democratic deficit and can expect to be pushed to the wall by a Democratic General Assembly. But in self-defense he had better have his own

proposals and programs. He must begin with a more energetic and comprehensive attempt to cut gov-ernment costs and services, no matter whether it hurts. Not until we have apared-down version of state services will Connecticut people be convinced that taxes to this level are justified and equit



Each of our readers, I am certain, knows at least one Swedish word — smorgasbord. We see smorgasbord used in restaurant advertisements ap-plying to all sorts of dishes. Not too long ago, I lunched at a well-known Swedish restaurant in New York City noted for traditional dishes. Next to the Swedish meatballs was a huge container of Italian lasagne. Translated, "smorgasbord" means "bread and butter table." The word appears in our dic-tionaries through common us-age. "Smor" is butter. "Gas" s goose, "Bord" is table. Where does the goose come in? Supposedly, the lumps of butter are a fancied resemblance to The traditional Swedish smorgasbord offers a variety of foods and dishes. It is said to have

originated at country parties to which each guest brought a dish. One always begins with bread, butter and herring. Next the cold fish dishes are eaten. then the cold meats and vegetable salads. Hot dishes are next in order with cheese fin

ishing off the meal. The smorgasbord varies in the quantity and variety of dishes offered just as is true of a buffet table. It all depends on the occasion and the cook. When a top-flight chef refers to a buffet, he means a tlered arrangement of food. This is also true of a traditional smorgasbord. Since most of us are not equipped for such formality, the food is simply placed on the dining room table or a side serving-piece.



Lawmakers File **Record Number Of New Action**

HARTFORD (AP)-"This session will produce 1,000 more bills than any previous session in the history of the state," leg-

islative Commissioner Arthur M. Lewis predicted Wednesday. Lewis and his fellow commissioner, Joseph Goldberg, told newsmen they and their seven legal assistants are almost liter-ally buried beneath a flood of legislative ideas waiting to be drafted into bill form. Some 2,500 bills have been cleared through the offices of the House and Senate clerks, but there are 4,400 more still to be drafted, the commissione

"This will be the first session to top 7,000 bills," said Lewis, noting that committees may raise additional bills during the course of the session.
