

# **Requirements Seen Nullifying** Legal Aid for Poor Tenants

## By DON MEIKLE Associated Press Writer

HARTFORD (AP) - Once upon a time, the General Assembly set out to help people in substandard housing force their landlords to spruce up the premises. The idea was to provide legal aid to tenants in the person of

lawyers appointed by the chief judge of the Circuit Court. These ''tenants' representatives," as they are called, were supposed to swing into action whenever a majority of the tenants in a given building signed a petition. Legal wheels would be set in motion; lawsuits would be filed; rent money could be used by the courts to correct substandard conditions. That was two years ago. Now, some observers of the program are calling it a "boondoggle," "unworkable," and "a waste of the taxpayers' money." In some circuits, the job of tenants' representative is a "plum" for which a lawyer with connections may collect \$6,250 to \$7,250 a year for doing almost nothing, says former State Sen. John F. Pickett of Middletown, who was cochairman of the In-terim Judiciary Committee that

studied the program last year. One tenants' representative, Thomas Keating of Stamford, quit his post on April 17, 1970,

John Fusaro. According to the files in the office of Chief Circuit Court Judge John J. Daly, Fusaro has yet to file a report on his activities, for which he is receiving \$7,250 a year. But the First Circuit in Stamford appears to be unusually in-At the other end of the spec-trum is the 14th Circuit in Hartford, where John Delaney, a veteran of service with the old Office of Price Administration, has handled the most cases of any of the tenants' representatives in the 10 circuits where the program has been instituted.

jecting the idea of a state ncome tax, Gov. Thomas J. Meskill called Tuesday for a temporary seven per cent state sales tax to pay off the pending \$250-million state deficit.

"I fully expect the people of Connecticut to be very unhappy with this proposal," the Repub lican governor said in his budget message to the Democratic controlled legislature.

"I am extremely unhappy i having to make such a recommendation," he added.

The governor proposed a state lottery, which he anticipates will net \$2.5 million during its first year, and legalized horseracing. He did not estimate how much money pari-mutuel betting might bring in.

Meskill, who proposed a Gen eral Fund budget of \$1.265 billion for the 1971-72 fiscal yearthe first one-year budget since the 19th Century-noted that he was proposing to increase spend ing no more than 11 pcer cen over current levels.

"The coming year will be a year of sacrifice," the governor said. Meskill said that his budget can be summed up in this way: "Taxes must go up dramat-

ically; services, for the most part, will remain at present levels." The Governor placed the

blame for the current situation squarely on the Democrats, al-though he did not mention them or former Gov. John Dempsey by name.

"The previous administration spent money it did not have," he said, "and left, as a further legacy, future commitments to spend beyond the revenue-raising capabilities of the current tax structure."


