### Business Mirror Hospital Day Cost Races Toward \$110

NEW YORK (AP) — The national average cost of maintaining a hospital patient for one day rose from \$9.20 in 1964 to more than \$81 last year, one year expected to reach \$100 this year and to top \$105 in 1972 and \$110 in 1973.

Those averages, which are reported in some hospitals, preliminary medical care beyond the reach of millions.

### Economy Improving In Dominican Republic

SANTO DOMINGO (AP) — The Dominican Republic, mired six years ago by civil war, is enjoying an economic boomlet inspired by loans to tourists—and U.S. purchases of sugar.

The U.S. troops which landed here in 1965 are just memory, mostly illiterate. The Central Bank governor, Digenes Fernandez, says that 1970 witnessed a surging demand for staples and food and fats, plus an 8 per cent rise in gasoline sales and 77 per cent increase in beer consumption.

Demetrios Hales, a leader of the Pan-American Hellenic and Council for the Preservation of Greek Orthodox Church and Language in America, said that such a seeking is also a search for a new faith.

Neither the archbishop nor his spokesman would comment on the pickets.
