We can remember back to the days when the federal debt limit was, as we recall it, first approaching the \$200,000,-000,000 mark, and our Republican national leadership, drawing more courage from the fact that it was out of power than from the sense of its own inevitable rightness, was expressing its public horror at such a national debt burden.

Then Dwight Eisenhower, who sincerely believed in balancing things, and living as free of debt as one could, was elected President and the Republicans had af least a share of the power. And, of course, the inevitable happened. Sooner or later a Republican national administration found itself going, like all the Democratic administrations before it, to the Congress with a request for a new upward move on the debt limit,

The Nixon Administration, a Republican regime, has now asked this Democratic Congress for a \$40,000,000,000 increase in the national debt limit, which will bring it up to a new high of \$435,-000,000,000, and no one, not even a computer, blinks an eye. It is so much a matter of course thing that the only response from the Democrats in Congress seems to be a cordial suggestion that perhaps the new limit ought to be set a

We believe it is now accepted as an economic truism that the size of the national debt is now our best index of national prosperity, and much more reliable, since it always keeps going up steadily, and permanently, than that somewhat more volatile and whimsical barometer, the gross national product.

Shocking, But Not "Irrelevant" The Very Rev. Francis B. Sayre, dean of Washington Cathedral, was understandably shocked and grieved by the behavior of some pacifist demonstrators at that Cathedral earlier this month, and he demonstrated his state of mind by the language of the sermon he delivered at a New York church last Sunday.

The pacifist demonstration in Washington had been a disruptive protest on the occasion of the consecration of Col. Clarence E. Hobgood as Episcopal Bishop for the armed forces.

In his New York sermon, Dean Sayre assailed and questioned the methods of such pacifist demonstrators. Victories for peace, he said, were not to be won "by throwing priestly stoles to the floor, shouting, and contemptuously walking out of divine service.

"The great weakness of so much social idealism today," he continued, "is precisely that while the issues raise are true enough, the place and the method of raising them is so often inappropriate, silly or irrelevant, not to say sometimes downright arrogant."

This criticism can be appreciated and shared, especially, perhaps, by many of those who devoutly hope that today's idealists will somehow manage to have a more lasting impact on the future quality of human behavior than have any of their predecessors.

But one can share that worry and, at the same time, lend some sympathy to the view of the pacifists who demonstrated in Dean Sayre's Cathedral. They had, as their target, that forever tobatable area of the relationship beween religion and war. Should the church, instead of sending chaplains along with our armies in order to comfort our young men in their hour of danger 'and perhaps, incidentally, even

make better soldier-killers out of them. counsel them to give first loyalty to the Commandment "Thou shall not kill?" Is war svil? If so, should the church join with the state in giving it the attributes of a respectable institution?

The answer to such questions, today, is still as debatable as it ever was. It is quite probable that any of our organized churches would, if they tried to give an answer, find themselves hopelessly split and divided.

The pacifists, for their part, have to believe, if they are philosophically sincere, that a true interpretation of religion would forbid the raising of one human hand against another. One may deplore some of the reported aspects of their demonstration in Dean Sayre's Cathedral, but one still has to ask what occasion could have been more appropriate for an assertion of their own beliefs than one in which organized religion was giving its cooperation, and perhaps even its blessing, to the institution of war.

Conservative-Republican

WASHINGTON-Columnist William F. Buckley is alarmed by President Nixon's new American revolution. He complain that the rhetoric is overblown; that th full-employment-budget concept is just a cover-up for deficit financing, and that the federal government should be cutting taxes instead of proposing to share with states and cities money it doesn't have. Senator James Buckley, the colum nist's brother, applauds the revolution's direction, is able to rationalize the defi cit and funds much that is good in the evenue-sharing notion.

His victory as the Conservative Party's candidate in New York's three-way Senate race last fall was widely hailed as symbol of a new rightward trend; he is the only Senator ficially designated "Conservative-Re publican." Yet such seems to be the corrupting influence of politics and power that he takes a considerably calment view of the administration's course.

"We must operate within the here and now," he asserted at a dinner sponsored by leading conservative organizations here earlier this month. "Time and again we will be called upon to make pragmatic judgments as to which of the less-than-ideal alternatives is achievle, which will advance us toward our goals, however circuitously." Success, e warned, "requires that we suppress he all-or-nothing impulse which has rustrated so many conservative enterprises in the past."

Senator James is not only more pragnatic than Columnist Bill, but also more affable and less abrasive, lower-keyed and less flamboyant. He is, however, every bit as articulate. "Many features the State of the Union message provide real reason for hope," he asserts I couldn't believe we would ever hear a President saying that we have to start cutting back at the federal level - not ust on paper but in terms of real power. The conservative community ought to be strongly applauding the thrust of his statement." In addition, he argues, the President's call for dispersing power provides Congress and the public with a tandard for judging specific Nixon pro-

The standard, paradoxically perhaps, mpels Sen. Buckley to oppose one of the President's major reforms, the Family Assistance Program, "My quarrel," h says, "is that it doesn't scrap the old, out merely puts another tier of bureaucracy on top of the old. 

LTM Fine In Comedy **By Shaffer**

By JUNE B. TOMPKINS A sizeable audience viewed something different last night in Bailey Auditorium. The Little Theatre of Manchester presented an unusual type of comedy in Peter Shaffer's "Black Comedy." Premiered in England in 1965, it drew nothing but raves when it opened in New York two years later.

The story is conceivable. A young sculptor is expecting a wealthy buyer to come and consider his works. He has bor rowed his neighbor's furnishings to dress up his meager London apartment. He is also expectng a visit from his fiance's her. Just as the artist and his fiance are finishing the final touches, a fuse blows and confusion reigns throughout the play as all the action takes place in the dark. People bump into people, but the near-misse are even funnier.

But what makes it something different is the reverse use of lighting on the stage. The ab-sence of any light in the beginning represents normally lighted conditions. Then, when the lights in the play go out, the audience sees the players fumbling "in the dark" on a fully lighted stage.

The tripping over furniture, getting tangled up in telephone wires, touching people in unexpected places was all done so realistically one would think the players really could not see. Rehearsing with blindfolds achieved the result.

Robert Donnelly has directed splendid cast who portray their off-beat roles superbly. Jim Quinn who plays Brinds ley is positively brilliant as the young sculptor. He is unbellevably funny as he misses people by hair-breadths while he re-

Elements of a 9.000-mon U.S. blocking force on the Viet-namese side also came under attack and a half-dozen more American helicopters flying in upport of the South Vietname were reported shot down. The fighting was the heaviest

since the 16,000 South Victnamese entered Laos to cut North Vietnam's principal supply network.

A South Vietnamese ranger position overlooking a main ar tery of the trail was overrun with heavy losses, military spokesmen said, and two ranger patrol bases nearby remained inder slege for a third succes sive day.

An American advisor on the Vietnamese side told Associated Press photographer Rick Merron: "The rangers are holding on by the skin of their teeth." field reports said more than

Yahya's demands came in notes published in Damascus and Beirut today, a few hours before the 27-man Central Committee was to begin meetings in the Syrian capital on the grow ing momentum towards a eaceful settlement in the Mid

Yahya also called on the National Council, Palestine meeting Feb. 27 in Cairo, to reform radically the resistanc movement and set up a commis sion to determine who is respon

sible for past errors. He said such mistakes as the 1-day civil war in Jordan last eptember between guerrillas and King Hussein's army "have led us to a veritable national

The 42-year-old general charged the Central Committee repeatedly failed to unite the 11 major commando groups into one movement against Israel. Yahya commands 7,000 troops based in southern Syria. Unti recently he was a member o the Central Committee, but h quit when Arafat ciriticized his army's showing in the civil war
