Or, to describe its activity in another way, it has been the scene of a prolonged filibuster designed to stall off and prevent any vote which might deprive any Senate minority of its right to fili-

The heroes and the villains of this fight are supposed to be plainly, labeled. On the one side, talking and voting against the institution of a filibuster, are all the do-good moderates and liberals. On the other side, fighting and voting to retain the fillbuster, are the wicked Southern

the division in the Senate itself isn't really that clear and clean. There have, recently, been those instances in which liberals have been guilty of employing the filibuster, when they have felt it a life and death matter for their particular view and interest to keep something from happening, with just as much ruthlessness as any wicked Southern read-

As the nation itself considers this battle over the filibuster, then, it is no longer obligatory to look at it through the coloration of any particular ideology or philosophical persuasion, except, perhaps, that of the philosophy of democ-

racy itself. A democracy is, primarily, a rule by the majority.

But any democracy that has ever worked for very long has included in its fundamental or in its acquired structure a degree of protection for its various minorities - protection against the possibility of unreasonable tyranny on the part of the majority.

The majority will not, of course, concede that its policies could ever amount to tyranny. But, in a livable democracy, the definition of what is tyrannical has to be left, in some part, to the minority.

make things happen to somebody else. It is merely a negative power which can keep something from happening to

The filibuster is a defensive, not an aggressive, weapon.

One can argue that, in our political history, some minorities have abused the power of the filibuster. But one can also argue that, on occasion, our democratic majorities have abused their power, too.

What other check is there, to the will of a majority, except such talk as the minority can put up? If that will of the majority is so rightly founded that it deserves to win, it always does and always will win in the end. A majority sure of its own rightness can afford some patience and comply with the need to prove its case without trying to bulldoze its way through to its objective.

Planning Battle In Jerusalem Over on what is certainly the most amous hillside in the world, the most familiar battle lines of our times are being drawn once again.

They are not, despite the fact that the hillside in question lies just outside Jerusalem, primarily the battle lines between Israeli and Arab commitment to and plaim of the same historic acreage. One of the very reasonable proposals encompassed in Governor Meskill's new budget is the concept of legalizing vari-ous forms of gambling. The governor has proposed a state lottery, and the legalization of horse racing and pari-mutuel betting. While it may take some time to institute horse racing the governor believes that the state k

tery could be begun quickly and contribute \$2.5 million to his budget.

Any consideration of gambling has to start with the assumption that there is a large amount of it going on in the state. In addition, there is only modest enthusi asm in many police departments for strict enforcement. This in part springs from the difficulty of catching bookies,



Mayor Soona is, in our view, quite correct in urging that off-track bet-ting also be considered. The aims should be to gather as much state revenue as possible from gambling, and also discourage professional gambiers by pre-empting the field. The New York state system of setting up betting parlors around the state (including charge priv-iliges by credit card) is by far the best

way to do it. Ideally, these pariors should handle all kinds of bets. It should

be kept in mind that the handle on foo ball games in the state is probably even igher than horse racing. While the amount of income the state can take in is always hard to predict, it clear that if the state is going to compete with local bookles — and hopefully ninate them — it must offer like services. 
