Late General Was 'Patton' Of Indochina

SAIGON (AP) - Lt. Gen. Do Cao Tri, cocky, aggressive and flamboyant, was confident that South Vietnamese troops could take over from the Americans. "We can do better and we can go deeper and we can go any-where, not only in country but also outside of country, and even in the rainy season," said Saigon's top field commander, killed today in a helicopter

Tri, 42, often braved death in heavy fighting and had a num-ber of narrow escapes. His assurance and aggressive style suggested comparison with World War II's Gen. George S. Patton Jr. After he led his troops into Cambodia's Parrot's Beak section last spring, he was dubbed the Patton of the Parrot's Beak.

Tri was a familiar figure a the front in camouflage jungle suit, with snub-nose pistol in a shoulder holster, black felt baseball cap with three stars, sun glasses, swagger cane and a briar pipe. He once teld an interviewer:

'Maybe 10 times everyone around me was killed or wounded. I have never been touched by an enemy bullet, "One day I was walking and stepped on an antipersonnel mine with my right foot. It didn't explode. With my next step my left foot came down on another mine. It didn't explode. I don't know why.'''
