 It is not fair to fault President Nixon for his failure to deal with the world as it has been handed to him. It does seem necessary to remind ourselves that even his best efforts are bound to fail and that not even one generation of peace, or even a part of one generation of peace, is to be found in the superpower formula.

Why We Are Here
 One can imagine something of the chagrin with which Britain, fountain of so much of the world's democracy, and, for a time, something of a critic of America's modern social troubles, now finds itself in the process of adopting a new immigration law which will have the effect of cutting down on the freedom of citizens from the dark-skinned members of the Commonwealth to settle and work in Britain as they please. The admission the British now have to make to themselves is that, faced with the increased turmoil and controversy caused by the invasion of the homeland by Commonwealth citizens, they have turned to policies of regulation and exclusion as a part of their answer. The Superpower Approach
 "History," said President Nixon Thursday in his radio summary of his immense State of the World Message, "has taught us that the old diplomacy of imposing peace by the fiat of great powers simply does not work."

In spite of such words of wisdom in his contemporary press, the president's reports of the many wide-ranging conclusions of that document indicate that American policy under President Nixon is directed, some 66 per cent of the time, to that same "fiat of great powers."

In the main, President Nixon Thursday handed this world as if it were a ball being passed and handed around by what he himself called the "two superpowers."

He did, on one occasion, broaden his acknowledgment of power by including, in the Asian sphere, the People's Republic of China, which he had hitherto called Communist China, and Japan in the case of powers which have not been considered of future influence until destiny in the region.

But his main story of the world today was that of the mutual challenge between Russia and the United States, in the Near East, in the Caribbean, in Europe, in the realm of nuclear weapons, and in space. There is some great truth in this, as a matter of observation and analysis.

The trouble is that there is little real possibility of cure and solution in it. The kind of cure and solution the President does envisage is not going to come, because it is based on an unrealistic reading of the state of the world and of the relationship between the two great superpowers.

To Mr. Nixon, this is not so much a world of evolutionary and hereditary history forces as it is a world of the good guys and the bad guys. We are the big guy and Russia is the big bad guy, and all we need to have a "temporary peace" is to have Russia listen to our preaching, become converted, and become our kind of good guy.

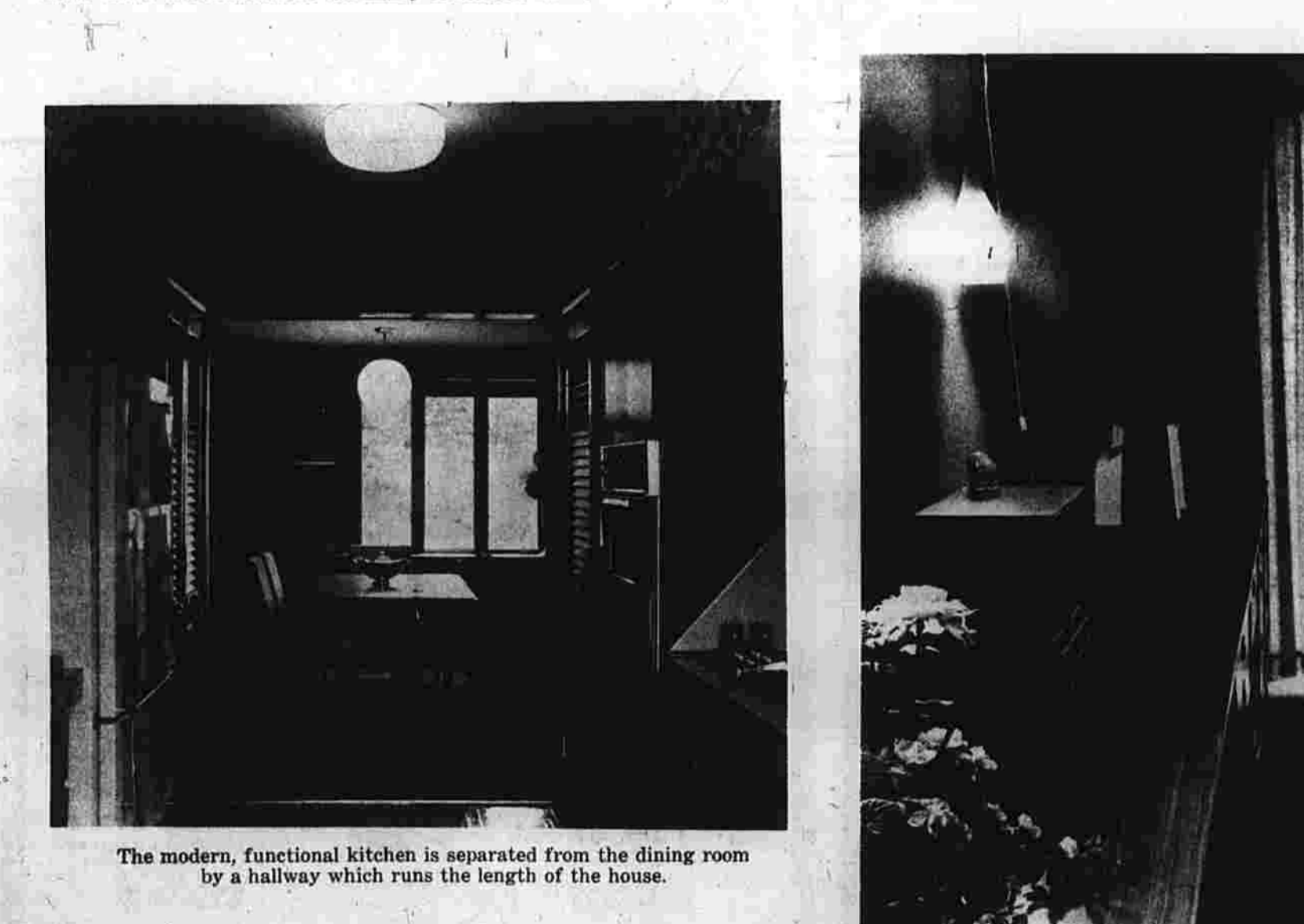

Nicklaus Hungry as Ever, Forsees Golf Peak Ahead

PALM BEACH GARDEN Fla. (AP) — On the doorstep of golf's first double grand slam, powerful Jack Nicklaus scoffs at claims that he's over the hill at age 31.

"My peak's ahead," said the golden bear. "I'm as hungry for my next major championship as I was for my first."

Nicklaus fired his second straight three-putt on 70 Friday and led the 1,096-yard PGA Championship by two strokes with 36 holes to play.

"I've never led a major even all four rounds," admitted the 31-year-old pro. "I want to be on top late Sunday afternoon."

Nicklaus already won three Masters titles, two apiece in the U.S. and British Open and the 1963 PGA Championship. Another triumph in the U.S. Open and the British Open would give him the first double slam.

"That's pretty much newspaper fluff," Nicklaus said. "I would be two-timing the slam. It would be nice, but what I want most is to win."

Nicklaus's mother died Friday in Lafayette, La., and the 42-year-old pro withdrew. Oddy, brilliant putting earned his opening 69.

On Friday, it was prettier. Jack started slowly, bogeying his first hole. Nicklaus was one-over on 17 at the turn but rocketed home with four birdies and a 23 on a windy, sunny Florida winter day.
