Opening The Way To A Bomb

What is the lapse which opens the way to a bombing of our national Capitol? Is it a gap in the intelligence and protective work of our police, or the F.B.I.? Or is it the presence, in our midst, of some particularly reprehensible characters who originate particularly dis bolical plots?

The real cause of the bombing of our Capitol is not either of these things, even though they will certainly be the things we will now be looking at with feverish national intensity.

The search for the real cause will not, however, go toward any specific, tangible laxity in our security, nor toward any particular, identifiable set of criminals, although discovery and apprehension and punishment of the latter would, of course, provide all of us with a grim satisfaction.

Where the deep, underlying reason for our Capitol being bombed lies is in the ntangible collapse of the national social, economic and political compact which this people has bound itself together in a judgment that it has a common destiny worthy of commanding the basic respect and cooperation of all

its component factors. The effective interdict against bombthese years has not been in any law forbidding us to bomb ourselves, nor in the presence of sufficient police to stop us on our way in with the bombs, nor in the suppression of ideas and opinions which might be termed disloyal.

Our happy security has derived from the fact that there has never developed between the will and aspiration and understanding of the people, on the one hand, and their own collective national conduct as led by their own government, on the other hand, any gap wide enough to permit entry to that devouring beast which can ruin any democracy - a lack of mutual respect between its necessary partners and a compounded lack of respect between them and the common cause institutions they originally creat-

ed to serve themselves. Today, and for what is beginning to seem a whole era almost as shocking as the Civil War itself, something has been allowed to happen to turn off the instinctive homage and loyalty we tender to the rights of each other and to the institutions we have all created for ourselves. There was a time the mere sight of the Capitol had beauty and symbolism enough to strike respect into the heart of any American who might stand in front of it with a bomb in his suitcase.

The spell of what America meant to all of us encircled our institutions and protected them.

That almost magical spell has been shattered and broken, until a bomber can move past and through it as if it did not exist.

Why has the spell been broken? Perhaps, even if we knew, there is not much we can do about it. Perhaps it can be said that we, the American people, have allowed ourselves to grow lazy and indifferent in our own obligation to demand the best of our own collective governmental behavior. Perhaps our collective governmental behavior, feeling its own blind mindless dynamism grow as our supervisory attention seems to slack off, widens the gap and increases

our people's cynicism. But, if such intangibles are part of the explanation, neither evangelistic exhortation nor technical, procedural reexamination of our institutions and systems is going to provide the gure.

The cure, if it comes, must be like our weakness and disease, of the spirit and by the spirit.

Perhaps, it too, like so much else in

our experience, is going to come, in its due cyclical time. Perhaps a due mutual respect for each other and for our common cause institutions is going to come back, like women's skirts. But that seems to be about as strong
