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Interest Centers Around Health-Care Plan Provision

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon's proposed health-care plan would be a landmark, the nation's largest private medical system.

By contrast, a competing plan sponsored by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Rep. Marsha W. Griffith, D-Mich., would nationalize medical care. The government would pay for at least 85 per cent of the cost of the care. The plan would employ all doctors, nurses and related health personnel.

The President's proposal would increase the supply of doctors, revamp government medical care for the poor, encourage group-practice health-care organizations and health-maintenance organizations, and place physicians in doctor-poor rural and ghetto areas.

But the provision arousing the greatest interest is one requiring all businesses to offer full-time health insurance to their employees. The provision would require that most government employees have health insurance. It also would require that all businesses with more than 25 employees provide health insurance for their employees.

Administration officials claim it would vastly improve benefits for most Americans. It also would provide a new source of revenue for the federal government.

Q. What about doctor's office?

any further," one "wagtail" informant officer commented. Asked for a total of all helicopters shot down in Laos, including those recovered, Jones replied: "We don't have that figure and I can't get it. My system can't handle it."

U.S. helicopter pilots are a major source of information since they fly more than 1,000 sorties a day over Laos. But many report being ordered to "keep our mouths shut" by their commanding officers.

Jones says no such order has been issued, but he concedes: "From time to time individuals are reminded of Directive 3601."

This directive says: "Any individual subject to these directives may be asked to grant an interview for a news story. He is to be interviewed in a limited area which has been designated for that purpose."

He is not to be interviewed in areas where the information is not classified or otherwise nonreleasable.

Tolland County Superior Court Lawyers Share Duty As Public Defender

More and more attorneys are through its executive committee of judges. However, according to Judge Barber the position may be affected by a bill now in the legislature which would reorganize the judicial department.

Persons desiring the services of a public defender must qualify for the service as having a need financially, although according to Judge Barber each case is judged on its merits with no hard line drawn as to eligibility.

For the special public defender, his compensation for a full day in court is \$75 and for an hour in court one sixth of that.

According to the minimum fee schedule of the Tolland County Bar Association private attorneys are expected to charge \$300 for a day spent on a criminal matter in Superior Court.

Barbed Humor

Many a truth, says an old proverb, is spoken in jest. But what about a lie that is spoken in jest? Is a false statement excusable if the speaker is "only kidding?"

Consider the case of a television personality who, in the course of his patter, referred to one of his guests as "a member of the Mafia."

The remark got a big laugh from the audience, but the guest pointed out that the remark not only was not amusing, it was a defamation suit against his host, accusing him of soiling an innocent person's good name.

Nevertheless, the court turned down the guest's claim. The judge pointed out that the remark not only was not amusing, it was a defamation suit against his host, accusing him of soiling an innocent person's good name.

On the other hand, a jest may indeed be defamatory if those who hear it take it as true. Thus, a guest at a party passed the word that his hostess had been dabbling in adultery. When she later sued him for defamation, he explained that he had been trying to be funny.

"How can I be liable," he said, "when I had no guilty intent? It isn't my fault that some people just did not catch on."

But the court ordered him to pay damages for failing to make his humorous intentions clear. As one judge put it: "A person shall not be allowed to murder another's reputation in jest."

Even words of flattery may be defamatory if they carry a hidden sting. Another case arose because of repeated references to a local political leader as "beautiful" and "spidery." In fact, the man was widely known to have an ugly deformity, left from a severe illness some years earlier.

Under these circumstances, the court held that the words of seeming praise were actually defamatory. The court said the injury was so no pain, merely because it came in disguise.

New Case For Year-Long D.S.T.

Once again, as it had when it first came into usage during World War I in Europe and the United States, Daylight Saving Time has a hard economic argument in its favor.

Con Edison is supporting a New York state bill to extend Daylight Saving Time all year round because it calculates that one less hour of early darkness at the end of the day would, in the period from the last Sunday in October to the last Sunday in April, be a tremendous help in guaranteeing against power shortages which New York City and other sections of the Northeast have experienced several times during the present winter.

With no assurance that this region's supply of electric power will, within any calculable number of years, reach levels definitely and comfortably ahead of our growing demand, the institution of Daylight Saving the year round would seem almost a sensible compulsion upon us.

Other persuasive arguments are also being advanced. Having an additional hour of daylight at the end of the day would, it seems certain to most city police authorities, tend to reduce the amount of crime and reduce the number of traffic accidents.

Further possible dividends from having Daylight Saving the year round are something that each individual can calculate for himself from his own experience. We are, right now, advancing into that time of year when additional afternoon light might be used for outdoor exercise, such as raking up spring lawns, or shoveling the last spring snow, or practicing a golf swing.

There seems absolutely no question that year round Daylight Saving Time would be more pleasant and perhaps safer for people, and that it would be, as well, the only important instant contribution that could be made to the easing of the recurring power crisis.

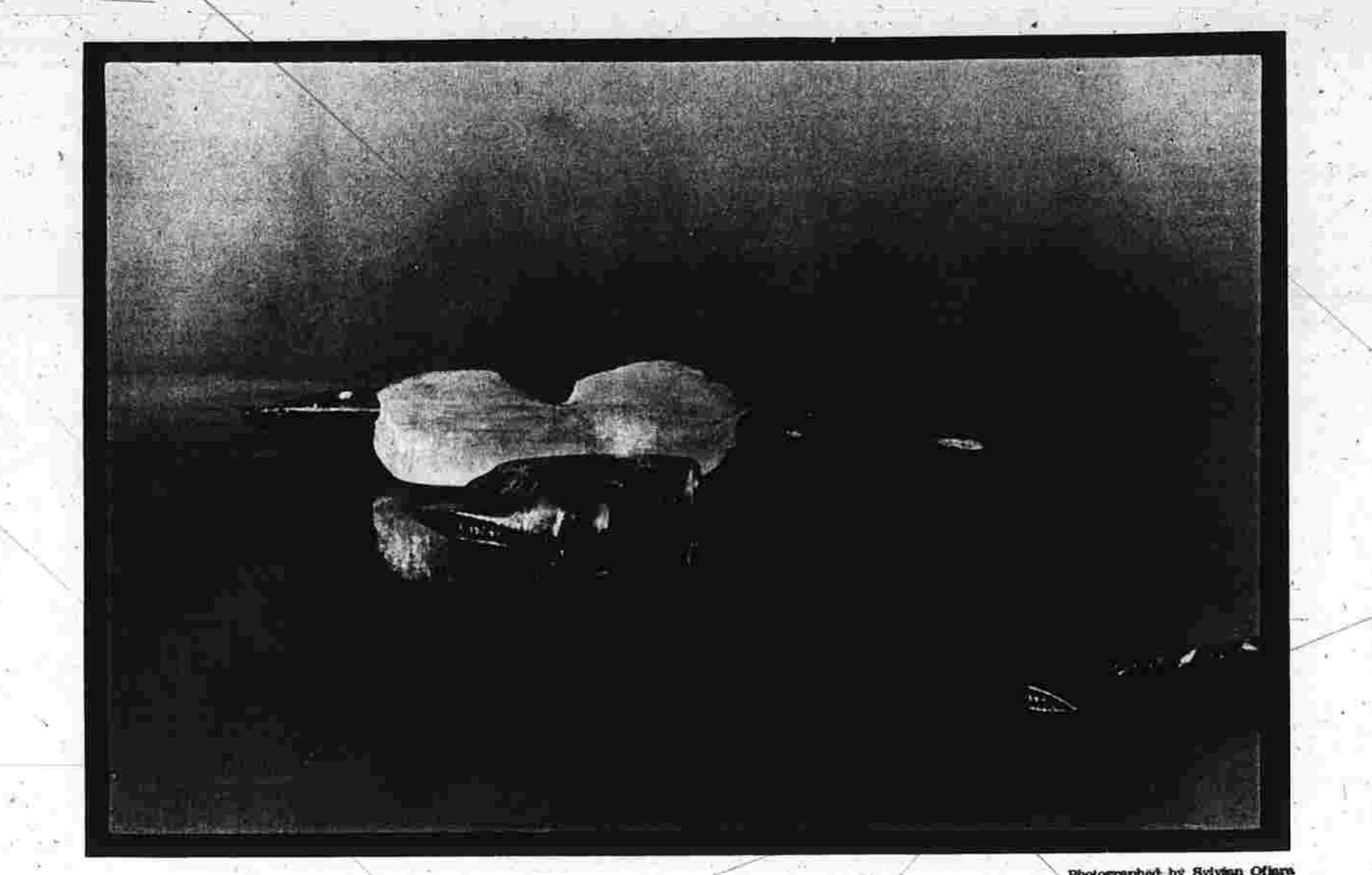

But in the United States, Great Britain, and other countries where high standards of personal rights to privacy have existed, the kind of information has been traditionally safeguarded. Undoubtedly various intelligence and police agencies—as well as the tax collector—have possessed a great deal of personal information even in the best of countries. But in the United States, the whole, shows little abuse.

There is no doubt that information-gathering, storage, and instant retrieval is very helpful in law enforcement against crime. Such measures are especially tempting at a time when much money engendered by crime and vice is flowing into legitimate channels. We all would like to know whether we are about to be taken over by a vice lord or are patronizing a business financed by the underworld.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal board said today the sighting of a plane in the Wichita State University football stadium could have been avoided if the pilot of the plane had realized only a minute sooner that he was flying into a dead-end canyon.

The National Transportation Safety Board made the finding with the mountain aerial charts in its official report on the Oct. 2 crash of an aging overwing jet propeller plane on the slopes of the Rocky Mountains.

The board said Skipper came back to the plane at Denver and spent the time talking with passengers rather than studying the Continental Divide west of Denver while the team was flying to Utah.

The board said the copilot, Ronald G. Skipper, 35, Oklahoma City, had decided to fly through the Rocky Mountains at 11,000 feet when it suddenly was confronted with the Continental Divide. The aircraft crashed trying to turn.

The board quoted an investigation of loopholes in the way the Federal Aviation Administration regulates charter flights. One firm in Oklahoma City, State while another, Golden Eagle, supplied the crew even though the firm is not permitted to operate aircraft that large.

The NTSB said "the numerous deficiencies, unsafe practices, and deviations from regulations, involved in this operation, are typical of charter flights when no single participant admits responsibility for its safety."

It agreed with the FAA that the regulations should be tightened. But another mountain pilot, who was flying the plane, said that he didn't know the flight was the Continental Divide until after the crash. Skipper was one of nine crash survivors.

Savings Cited For Welfare In State Takeover

HAARTFORD (AP) — Cities and towns would save \$12 million and the whole state could cut costs an additional \$12 million if the state took over all general welfare assistance programs, according to a Hartford city councilman.

Councilman George Levine, speaking at a hearing of the Commission, Welfare and Human Institutions Committee of the General Assembly, quoted those figures to back up the council's support of bills to transfer the programs from the municipalities to the state.

The transfer would mean a total estimated savings of \$24 million, Levine said. The savings would be generated by eliminating local administrative costs and receiving more federal reimbursement, he said.

Under the present system, the state repays municipalities 75 per cent of their payments to recipients. The municipalities contribute 25 per cent of the payments and pay the full cost of administering the general assistance programs.

The federal government does not reimburse the municipalities to take over welfare as it does general support at the hearing.

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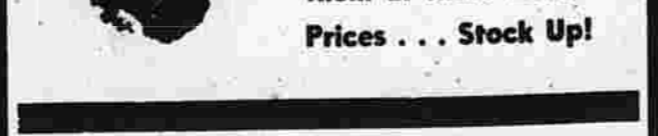

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Congressional Redistricting May Be Postponed Until '72

Associated Press Writer HARTFORD (AP)—The job of redrawing Connecticut's congressional districts, which was supposed to be done fairly early in this legislative session, is going to be put off until the state's General Assembly meets in January.

The congressional problem has encountered some serious obstacles, especially among Republicans, who are now asking: "What's the hurry?"

As House Minority Leader Francis J. Collins noted in an interview Tuesday, there is no statutory deadline on congressional redistricting, like the April 1 deadline on state legislative redistricting.

Theoretically, the job could be put off until the 1972 session although neither Collins nor anyone else has gone so far as to suggest that.

The snag in the congressional redistricting process is, as has often been pointed out, the city of Bridgeport.

As the situation is now, Republican Congressman Stewart H. McKinney wants to rid his district of Bridgeport. Democratic Congressman John Morgan of Waterbury wants at least a piece of Bridgeport.

Democratic Congressman Robert N. Giammo of North Haven wants no part of Bridgeport; State Senate Majority Leader Edward Caldwell of Bridgeport does not want the city divided into two different congressional districts.

McKinney naturally does not want a Democratic stronghold in his district; Morgan would dearly love to add another Democratic stronghold to the one he put off until the more difficult "Waterbury" and job is completed.

"We want to see an entire primary challenge from some package," is how Collins put it.

Fiction Prize Captured by Saul Bellow

NEW YORK (AP)—Saul Bellow has won the 1970 National Book Award fiction prize for "Mr. Sammler's Planet" in ceremonies marked by a tempest in the poet's corner.

Bellow was the unanimous choice of the fiction judges but the poetry panel split, 1 in naming Mona Van Duyn winner in that category for "To See, To Be."

Dismissing was poet Allen Ginsberg who took the podium during the ceremonies at the Hotel Baltimore Tuesday to denounce the choice of his fellow jurors as "ignominious, insensitive and mediocre." He supported Gregory Corso's "Elegiac Feelings American."

Earlier the entire poetry panel had rejected every one of the titles nominated through a nationwide poll of librarians, book-sellers and critics and substituted their own nominees.

Similarly dismissed after nomination was Erich Segal's best-selling novel "Love Story," which was eliminated in January after the fiction panel termed it "unworthy" and threatened to resign en masse unless it was withdrawn.

Bellow's award was his third, the previous winners were "The Adventures of Augie March" in 1948 and "Humboldt's Gift" in 1965.

"Mr. Sammler's Planet," published by Viking Press, is the story of a half-blind old Pole who wanders through New York's Upper West Side while speculating on the future of the planet.

The awards are sponsored by the National Book Committee, a nonprofit trade association, and are presented in seven categories. Each award carries a \$1,000 cash prize.

The other categories and winners were:

Arts and Letters—"Cocteau," a biography of Jean Cocteau by Francis Steegmuller, published by Atlantic, Little, Brown.

History and Biography—"Boonville: The Soldier of Freedom," a study of the wartime president by James MacGregor Burns of Williams College. It was published by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich.

Children's—"The Marvellous Misadventures of Sebastian," by Lloyd Alexander, published by E.P. Dutton.

The Sciences—"Science in the British Colonies of America," by Raymond B. Stearns, published by the University of Illinois Press.

Translation—"A dal award went to Frank Jones for his translation of Bertolt Brecht's "The Seven Years of the Stockyards," published by the Indiana University Press, and to Edward G. Schickel for his translation of Yasunari Kawabata's "The Sound of the Mountain," published by Alfred A. Knopf.

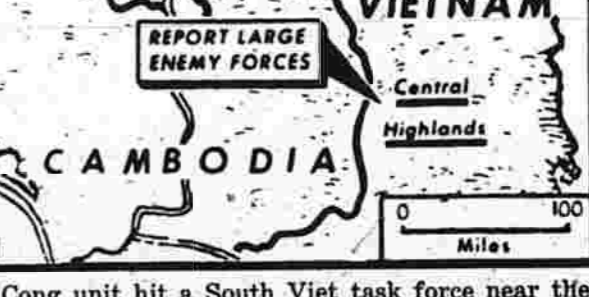
