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



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

The barbarism they both share is this: they seem to assume that any quantity of war in Vietnam is all right so long as it is not American blood which is being spilled and not American manpower which is doing the killing.

Our involvement, and our responsibility in Vietnam cannot really be so easily

We helped create and establish and widen this war. For us to decide, as we are now deciding, that we are tired of it and sick of it and that we want to get out of it, regardless of what happens after our withdrawal, is a hopelessly callous kind of decision,

It is callous whether it is the decision of doves who don't care who wins after we have left, or the decision of President Nixon, who wants to be sure that South Vietnam is able to continue the war after we have left.

Both assume there is something more evil and wrong about the death of American human beings than there is in the death of Asians. Both assume we need not care too much how long the war lasts, or how it turns, so long as there are no more American casualty figures. Both assume we can solve America's problem in Vietnam by getting out the

war and out of Vietnam ourselves. illusion which, if we should ever try to follow it out in real action, would breed shame for us abroad and unending guilt

within ourselves at home.

Our duty is not merely to get out of the slaughter in Vietnam, but to end it, not merely to extricate ourselves, but to extricate the Asians from the struggle in which we have helped involve

It may be argued that this was never really our war, and that we should never have been in it, and that, therefore, our main duty is to get out of it. The trouble is that, in the meantime, we have, by our participation, picked up responsibility we cannot slip off as easily as if it were a special tropic issue raincost. We are not going to be free of the war

in Vietnam until the war itself has halt-

selves really free. That has to mean

that we help find some way in which the Asians themselves can be free of it. The philosophy on which both th oves and President Nixon are nov perating is that this great country of ours can provide soldlers and planes and guns and ships for an Asian problem, but nothing more, that we can find and fight wars but that we cannot make

What we need to prove to the world and to ourselves, is that we have some able, or tolerable, or less in need of a quick, humane ending, merely because the blood being spilled in it may no longer be American blood.

We need to try to prove, to the world and to ourselves, that we are a civilizing peace behind us. We are not going to like living with ourselves if we shirk, in diplomacy and policy, the courage we have asked fighting men to display in the

public parks, squares, spaces, grounds, and buildings. 2.9 "Refuse" is all putrescible and nonputrescible solid wastes (except body wastes), including garbage, rub bish, ashes, street cleanings, dead animals, abandoned automobiles, and solid market and industrial wastes. 2.10 "Rubbish" is nonputrescible solid wastes consisting of both combustible and non-combustible wastes, such as

13. Clearing of Litter from Open Private Property by Town. (a) Notice to remove. The Building Inspector is hereby authorized and empowered to notify the owner of any open or vacant private property within the Town, of the agent of such owner, to properly dispose of litter located on such owner's property which is dangerous to public health, safety or welfare. Such notice shall be ov Certified Mail, addressed to said owner or to said agent at his last known address.

(b) The owner or agent so notified shall have the right to appeal from such notice and order within two (2) days after receipt of such notice, to the Board of Health of the Town of Coventry.

1. Upon such appeal the Board of Health shall forthwith hold a hearing at such time and place as it shall determine. a. A majority of such Board of Health shall constitute a quorum for such hearing.

b. Such owner or agent may act before such board either by himself or by counsel. c. The decision of such board shall be final. 2. In the event such owner or agent does not appeal from such order within the time permitted, or in the event such board sustains the order of the Building Inspector, then the provisions of sub-section (c) (d), (e) and (f) and the penalties housed in Section

14 shall apply. (c) Action upon non-compliance. Upon the failure, neglec or refusal of any owner or agent so notified, to prop-erly dispose of litter dangerous to the public health, written notice provided for in sub-section (a) above or within three days after the date of such notice in the event the same is returned to the Town Post Office Department because of its inability to make deliver thereof, provided the same was properly addressed to the last known address of such owner or agent, the Chief Administrator is hereby authorized and empowered to pay for the disposing of such litter or t

(d) Charge Included in Tax Bill. When the Town has effected the removal of such dangerous litter or has paid for its removal, the actual cost thereof, plus ac crued interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) pe not paid by such owner prior thereto, shall be charged to the owner of such property on the next regular tax bill forwarded to such owner by the Town, and said charge shall be due and payable by said owner at the time of payment of such bill.

Recorded Statement Constitutes A Lien. Where the ful amount due the Town is not paid by such owner within thirty (30) days after the disposal of such litter, as provided for in sub-section (a) and (b) above, then, and in that case, the Chief Administrator of the Town Clerk's office of the Town of Coventry a sworn statement showing the cost and expense incurred for the work, the date the work was done, and the location of the property on which said work was done. The recordation of such sworn statement shall constitute a lien and privilege on the property, and shall remain in full terest plus costs of court, if any, for collection, until final payment has been made. Said costs and expenses shall be collected in the manner fixed by law for the collection of taxes and further, shall be subject to a ielinquent penalty of 1/4 of 1% per month in the event bill upon which said charge appears becomes delin-quent. 



Connecticut Blue Cross narrowed its operating loss to \$451,192 in 1970, down from a loss of \$10.5 million programs were cited as major contributors to the finan-

Blue Cross paid out slightly over \$1.00 against each premium dollar received, compared with \$1.11 in 1969. However, income from investments was sufficient to close the loss gap and bolster reserves by \$617,000.
