

Connecticut Blue Cross narrowed its operating loss to \$451,192 in 1970, down from a loss of \$10.5 million programs were cited as major contributors to the finan-

Blue Cross paid out slightly over \$1.00 against each premium dollar received, compared with \$1.11 in 1969. However, income from investments was sufficient to close the loss gap and bolster reserves by \$617,000.

The year 1970 marked the first time that payments of \$112,727,201. Including payments as Medicare intermediary, total disbursements were \$179,224,451.

At year-end, membership stood at 1,532,815, representing almost half of the State's eligible population.







Instead, for the main thrust of its finding the Court rode rough over the claim of the defendants that it was a particular kind of religious conviction which led them to differentiate between wars they considered just or unjust and conentrated, for its verdict, on the clear stipulation of Congress that, whatever religion might be involved, the status of conscientious objector could be granted only to individuals "conscientiously opposed to participation in war in any

The Court held to this strictly because it determined that this was what Congress meant when it wrote the language

The Court, as well, acknowledged some solicitude for the practical side of the matter. To broaden the gate open to conscientious objectors might, it recognized, defeat "the government's interest in procuring the manpower nicessary for military purposes, pursuant to the Constitutional grant of power to Congress to raise and support armies."

In the ruling, the Court disappointed those pacifiats who hope to move their nivilization away from war by degrees, if necessary, as well as all those nonpacifists who do happen to judge that the war in Vietnam is neither just nor

And in this ruling, the Court did uphold, when it might have weakened, the institution of war as a national policy and part of our civilization. But when the Court leaves every-

If you have to compremise on a nice round number like 90 per cent on some nice round date like Jan. 1, This is just what the Senate did fClean Air Act by a vote of 73 to 0. After all, if air pollution is a moral issue, not a practical one, then there's no need to consider what's necessary, what's possible, how soon it's possible, or how the benefits compare with the costs. One arbitrary compromise is as good as another. And as for that 73-to-0 yote, no politician can afford to vote for sin. Another trouble with the moralistic ap-
