Hebron Zoners Reject Plan for Stricter Limits

The Planning and Zoning Commission after a public hearing last night voted to reject proposed regulation changes on increases in height, area and yard requirements and minimum livable square footage for all new construction in town and to "hold for study" and changes in regulations governing construction of two-family residences.

In reaching this decision, the commission took into consideration a vote called for by local real estate agent Wayne Miller on both issues. Miller acted on the basis of a statement by Richard T. McDonald, commission chairman, that the hearing was called to ascertain public opinion on the changes.

Strong opposition was expressed by almost all of the about 50 residents who attended the hearing on any increases in height, area, and yard requirements and minimum square footage.

Reaction to changes in regulations governing construction of two-family residences was mixed with 20 opposed and 18 in favor.

It was this latter issue that proved to be the most controversial. The present plan brought requests from the floor for adequate town planning.

The commission is proposing that frontage for two-family houses be increased from 200 feet to 300 feet and that the area be increased from one acre to two acres. Also, the minimum square foot livable area was increased from the present 900 to 2,000 for single story and one and one-half story, 2,400 for a colonial and 2,500 for a single story with no basement.

Proposed changes would also limit duplexes to a maximum of three bedrooms, former Hebron state representative, stated that he "would like to support the concept that is being introduced here tonight by the Planning and zoning commission."

"I feel," he added, "that someone has to make a decision, and we can see that hasty decisions by the towns around us have not been to the advantage of taxpayers. Hebron still has time to do some adequate planning."

Local builder Joseph Caron echoed Fellow's sentiments as did resident John Gelsner, who said, "I think we want to take a look at the mode of living that we desire in Hebron, better come up with some zone or plan."

Fears "Zoning Out People"

Selectman John Perham felt that "the zoning board at this point is planning to zone out people" with the proposed changes. In his opinion, Hebron has no tax problem now. However, he referred to the town of Andover, which, because of poor planning "has zoned out people and their tax mill rate is about 20 mills higher than ours."

Perham also urged that "before we make any changes in regulations, we should do some planning."

Bruce Kalon, local attorney, who spoke on behalf of interested residents, said that an increase in acre requirements from one to two acres, would raise the cost of property alone from an average now of \$4,500 per acre to around \$7,500 per acre.

Also, increases in minimum square footage requirements, based on present costs, would average out to an increase of approximately \$6,200 per duplex. This in turn would increase the present rental of duplexes from \$215 per month to \$285 per month, he said.

Robert Cuffaro also mentioned the possibility that if minimum frontage is increased from 200 to 300 feet, "five years from now there is the possibility of sticking homes in between."

With regards to any increases in height, area and yard requirements and minimum square foot livable area for all new house construction in town, Kalon said that this would be an added cost to the contractor which in turn would be passed on to the homeowners.

Using costs based on an increase in the existing minimum livable square foot area, Kalon figured an average increase for a one-family house in a R-1 zone would amount to \$3,979.

The minimum square footage requirement presently for a one-family home in a R-1 zone is the same as that for a two-family home, 900 square foot for a single story home. Here the commission also was proposing a 1,000 square foot minimum.

Increases were also proposed in single story homes with no basement, 1 1/2 story homes, split levels and colonial.

Favors Mixture

Kalon felt that the town should have a plan where "you have small houses, medium

professional planner come in and do a plan, and don't let one citizen or a few citizens necessarily all grouped together according to size but proposed regulation changes on increases in height, area and yard requirements and minimum livable square footage for all new construction in town and to "hold for study" and changes in regulations governing construction of two-family residences.

He recommended to the commission "that they do some further study before enacting any new regulations and the possibility of a town plan before making any action."

McDonald mentioned that a recent meeting of the commission (Feb. 9), he had recommended to members the possibility of requesting \$15,000 in the 1971-72 budget for a new town plan and up-dating of present zoning regulations by a professional consultant.

At that meeting he stated that the last town plan, which was completed in 1963 at a cost of \$2,000 to the town with state and federal funds paying \$4,000, was not comprehensive and "none of us are professional planners."

Other commission members felt at the time that possibly the best plan would be to bring brought requests from the floor for adequate town planning.

Kalon seemed to summarize the feelings of those present at the last night's meeting—that these proposed regulations not be adopted by the commission.

Second District Congressman Robert Steele of Vernon has joined the war against junked cars.

Steele is proposing legislation designed to clean up the more than one million cars junked or abandoned annually.

The legislation which carries a \$10 million price tag, would provide federal funds distributed to the states, who could either operate their own junk car pick ups or contract with private firms for removal of the abandoned cars.

Scrap processors would be offered tax benefits as an incentive to install modern equipment to reduce the old cars to scrap.

The \$10 million needed to fund the program would be taken from the federal auto excise tax, according to the Congressman's proposal.

Meskill Budget Called Opposite Nixon Policies

HARTFORD (AP) — Connecticut's Republican governor is going in the opposite direction from President Nixon's national economic policies, a Democratic legislator said Tuesday.

While Nixon has proposed deliberately unbalanced budget in order to boost the economy, Gov. Thomas J. Meskill has recommended an austerity budget, he said, "not only raises the state deficit, but it doesn't take income where it isn't."

Mrs. Beck said it is "unsound and irresponsible economic policy" to pay off the state deficit in one year, when unemployment is at a rate of nearly 10 per cent.

"To collect all this money at once is fiscal suicide," said Mrs. Beck, who advocated paying off the state deficit with borrowed money over a period of years.

In a time of unemployment and recession, government should keep money flowing into the economy, while at the same time refraining from taxing too heavily, she said.

In order to get the money to finance continued state programs, Mrs. Beck advocated an income tax. This kind of tax, she said, "not only raises income tax, but it doesn't take income where it isn't."

Mrs. Beck, who strongly backed an income tax in the task force "convince me more than ever that Connecticut does not need a state income tax."

"To impose one at a time when our economy is suffering from a deflationary hangover would be disastrous," he said.

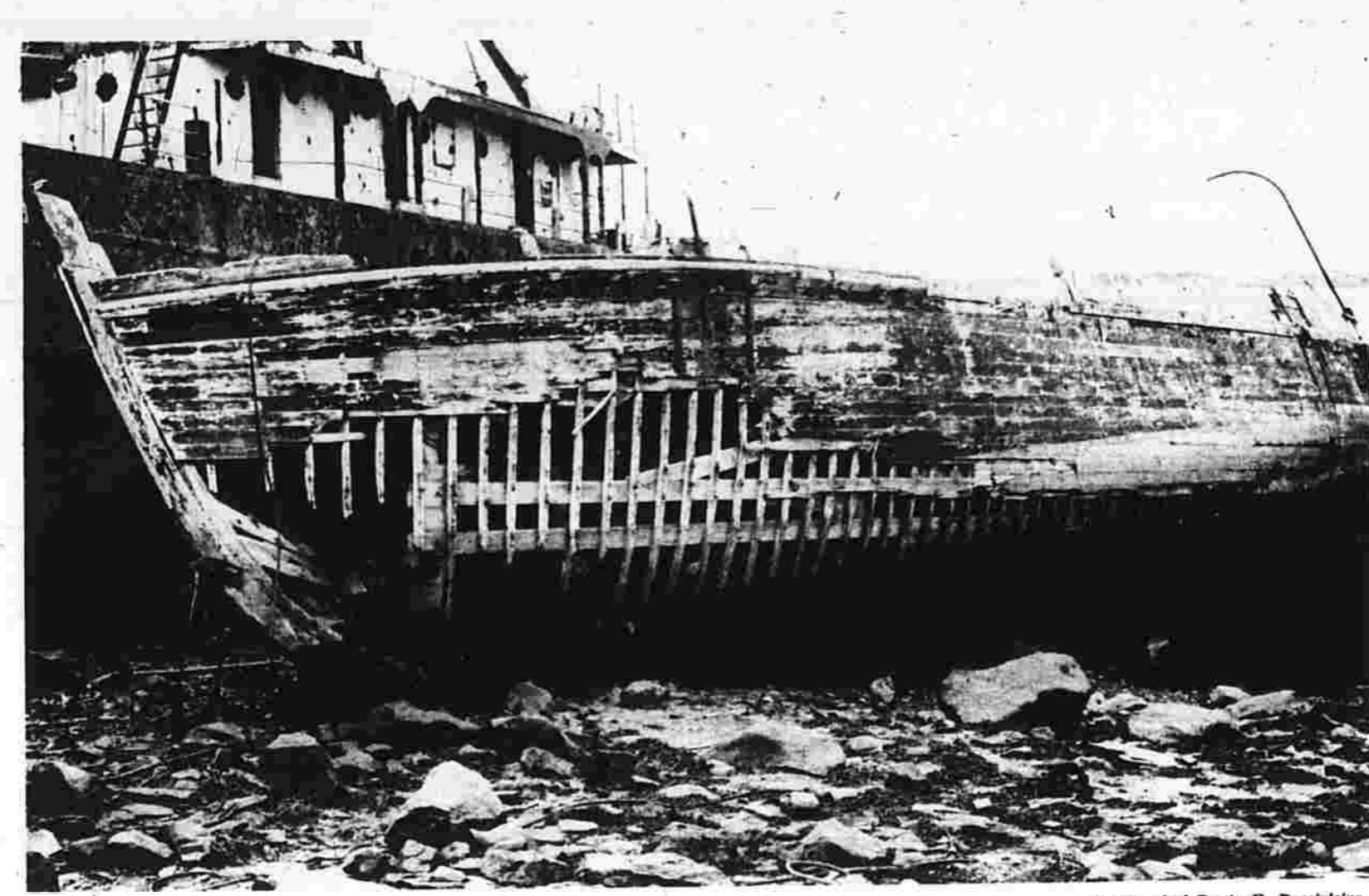

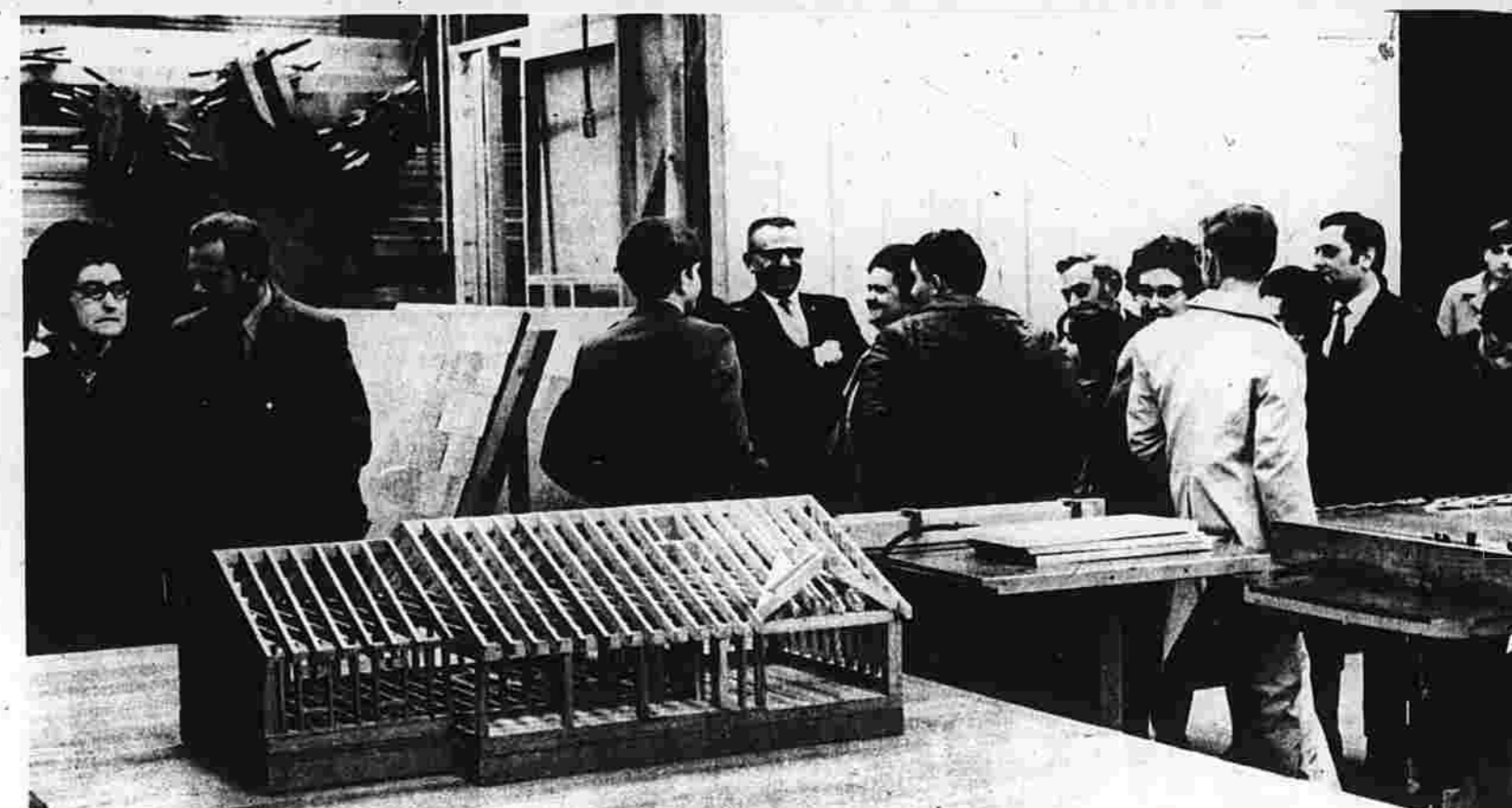
