Must Connecticut Reverse Itself? The specific students and parents who would be directly and immediately affected by a proposed institution of substantial tuition rates in Connecticut's system of state colleges can feel the proposal in their own pocketbooks.

Thursday, March 25

For many of them, the blow could be hard enough to force the abandonment of college attendances already begun. For the rest of Connecticut this prospective hardship on the students and the parents of students offers not hard-

The more nearly we put our public education on a pay as you go basis, the less the expense that has to be divided up among all those who are not going to college, or not sending anybody to col-

Yet this relative kindness toward their own pocketbooks, this prospective release from some share of the expense of educating other people's children, is something that we think the state's citition, wish to reject rather than accept. The policy under which the state's system of public higher education has which most of us have been very proud, because it has had the avowed aim of making higher education, on its dif-

dents as wish to reach and work for it. What has happened in the last few years is that this system has expanded so much, and has drawn so high an nrollment, and also has, of course, begun to cost so much more money, that there has developed the temptation to regard what we have accomplished not as a good but as a mistake, and to alter and abandon, now that it has succeeded, the very system we were so proud to be building.

We do not believe, however, that the taxpayers of Connecticut are desperate, at this moment, to change the system in order to unload that share of the expense they have been bearing all along. We do believe they would prefer to give to the young people and the parents of college age young people of this moment the same advantages and opportunities that have been available up

Nor do we believe the taxpayers of Connecticut spend sleepless night worrying over the occasional possibility that some Connecticut family which could afford to spend \$4,000 a year for education in some private college may be getting away with an expense of only \$1,800 a year at some state in-

The kind of thing Connecticut taxpayers might really worry about would be the possibility that higher fees might shut the doors on young people who just manage, by their own work, to meet the present scale of expenses.

The real public answer to the proposal the Legislature is now entertaining, both from Governor Meskill and from the State Revenue Task Force, should not come only from the obvious source that of the pupils and parents and college administrations directly concerned and immediately affected - but from all who are concerned with having the state keep a fine promise it has, all these years, been making, not to any special group, but to itself. That promise has been that we would try to see to it that lack of money never deprived any Connecticut girl or boy of a chance for a higher education. The proposal, now, is to make money a requirement, which is the exact opposite of all our previous endeavor. There is no truly compulsive

Mass Bombing Audited Again One relatively clear verdict seems to have come out of the incursion into Laos, and it is, once again, a disappointment to those theorists and those practitioners who have been betting on the effectiveness of mass bombing.

There seems little doubt that the statistics on our bombing of the particular region in Laos which was also the area of the South Vietnamese incursion show that this is the most heavily bombed terrain in the history of all air force operations anywhere.

A side benefit to a stiffer price tag could be a redeemed value to college education, considerably depreclated in recent years by students who went to college because it was there an fairly available and not because of any interest in higher education. ise that college should be made avail able to everyone should have been dis-On the other hand, the lack of financial resources should not, indeed, be a deterrent to any resident of the state who qualifies for college and is genuine ly interested. Those who attack the proposed tuition charges as harmful to low ome students are forgetful of the loan and scholarship programs carried out by both state and federal governments. Help for the disadvantaged is available and it is the governor's intention to make it increasingly so. It is interesting that the Commission of Higher Education, which deplores the increased fees at the same time complains that the funding of student assistant programs is completely inadequate." From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

By VIVIAN F. FERGUSON When I was a very little girl, I would flip through the magazines and look at the pictures. I loved trademarks, I knew the chick who hadn't scratched yet, the little boy with the candle tires, and the Dutch lady with the stick in her hand. I had a hang-up on the Dutch character She was faceless since her cap covered her face, and besides she had that threatening stick.

I had a few nightmares in each

of which I managed to escape her wrath. My favorite trademark was two cute little kids who expounded, in rhyme, the merits of soup. They were roly-poly, chubby-faced children with sparkling personalities. Called "The Campbell Kids," they were created by Grace Welderseim Drayton who looked into the mirror one day and drew a self-portrait. She was "just a kid" herself at the time. When Grace grew up, she continued to draw her cheerful cherubs. In the mid-1940's, the kids disappeared from the Campbel ads. They were missed by 40% of today's population. Surveys indicate that many people still connect the theme "M-m! M-m!, Good!" with Campbell soups. Consequently, the kids are returning complete with the four-line ditties and a host of tips for nutritious luncheons.
