

Enemy Raids Jungle Base; Kills 33 GIs

SAIGON (AP) - North Vietnamese sappers ran through a U.S. artillery base in the jungle south of Da Nang early Sunday, killing 33 Americans and wounding 75 within an hour. It was believed to be the highest American death toll of the war in an attack on a U.S. installation.

Something Slower Than Sound To the news that Railpax has graciousconsented to continue some passenger service from New York to Hartford and Springfield we might respond with a sarcastic "thanks for nothing."

Here, as elsewhere in the nation, the new authority of maintaining and perating passenger service on the railways is starting out with a scale of service which has to be rated a pitiful minimum

But, if Rallpax meets its own responsibilities, there will be one change in this minimum service, which could lead on to others.

The few trains Rallpax does keep running are supposed to be clean trains, comfortable trains, on-time trains, accident-protected trains, so that they offer the people in the territories through and to which they run a kind of travel opportunity which has been missing from the routine railroad operation for at least two decades.

If Railpax does provide such a standard of service, there should be little doubt about the public response. It would pe, as it has been with the Metroliner service between New York and Washington, to turn back to rail travel as the convenient, comfortable, luxury mode of

If this happens, there is going to be justification for the scheduling of additional trains, on additional routes.

That is the bright, hopeful possibility which lies ahead of this initial Railpax guarantee of a minimum service.

When we turn from that hopeful possibility to the prospect that the recovery of rail patronage may go slow, even if the service proves good immediately, we find one phase of the Railpax prospectus we ought never to accept. This is the threat that, if this or that passenger route should fail to turn profitable as an individual operation, Railpax would then have the privilege of abandoning it altogether.

The least that ought to be required of Railpax in the public interest, no matter what its operating experience profitwise, is that this very pitiful minimum of service with which it begins shall be maintained and kept in operation regardless. We can afford to run losing operations on sections of the national network much better than we can run the risk of destroying the minimum network concept, Let the national passenger service deteriorate downgrade farther and we shall one day be sorry. And to keep experimenting and ploneering toward more exotic modes of travel, and yet neglect a fundamental asset we still have within our grasp would be costly folly. A civilization which can send rockets off at 28,000 miles an hour ought to be able to run trains at 100.

Ratify Without Asterisks

Forty-five years ago American diplomacy took a lead in writing and launching of the Geneva protocol by which all signatory nations would pledge themselves not to indulge in chemical or biological warfare.

Having helped to draw it up, we never ratified and signed it ourselves. Recently, however, the Nixon Adminis-

tration had the praiseworthy idea of having us try to repair our moral position in the international community by ratifying the Geneva Protocol at last. It asked the Senate to undertake this task.

Unfortunately, at the time it was asking this of the Senate, the administration was also approving the use of tear gas, and of defoliants, in Vietnam.

Rather than give up the right to use such weapons, the Administration asked the Senate to make its ratification of the Geneva Protocol carry the reservaMANCHESTER EVENING HERALD, MANCHESTER, CONN., MONDAY, MARCH 29, 1971

tion that we do not interpret tear gas and defoliants to be among the weapons the Protocol would forbid us to use. The Senators handling the matter are inclined to think this kind of ratification would not accomplish very much for the United States image, especially since the United Nations, in the only semi-official specification of just what the Geneva Protocol does seek to outlaw, included tear gas and defoliants. For the moment, then, the Senate is reluctant to ratify,

preferring to walt for the White House and the Pentagon to be ready and willing to give up tear gas and defoliant. There are sub-arguments which cut both ways. The Senators have heard some witnesses testify that tear gas and defoliants are of little practical military value, after all. The other side argues that the use of such weapons, which do not kill directly themselves, but merely make it easier to get at the enemy in order to kill him, is really a humane use,

which softens and civilizes war. All such claims and counter-claim aside, it seems to us that if, after 45 years, we are considering ratifying our own brain child in order to impress the rest of the world with our high philosophical and moral standards, we really ought to ratify it with one bold stroke of the national pen, and without trying to asterisk in exemptions for the particular brand of chemical or biological warfare we ourselves happen to he waging at the moment.

What Is The FBI Up To?

With due deliberation and with consid erate regard for the Attorney General's objections, this newspaper yesterday published the substance of some FBI records-stolen by unknown persons from the FBI's office in Media, Pa. and sent to the Washington Post anonymously by mail. The Attorney General, naturally would have preferred no account at all of the records and, indeed, no mention of the theft. Because he asserted that these records include information which would disclose the identity of confidential investigative sources and information relating to the national defense," this newspaper carefully refrained from any facsimile reproduction of the documents sent to it and from any disclosure of the various FBI codes on the records, including identification numbers and names of agents and of persons under surveillance. We reported the substance of the records, however, because we were convinced that it serv-

ed the public interest to do so. The records afford a glimpse, not often granted to the general public or even to committees of Congress, of some of the ways in which the FBI works and o some part of its concept of internal se-They indicate that the Bureau focused a good deal of attention on college campuses and particularly on black student groups which, according to a memorandum issued by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover "pose a definite threat to the nation's stability and security" and that on the college campus in the Philaelphia area the Bureau enlisted the ervices of the local police chief, the local postmaster, a campus security officer and a college switchboard operator to maintain surveillance on a professor regarded as a "radical." Other documents indicated that students were used, ometimes on a paid basis, as inform-

This lifting of a corner of the curtain on FBI activity in the name of internal security seems to us extremely disquiet Granted that it by no means pre sents a complete picture, it nevertheless suggests strongly that an appropriate ommittee of the United States Congress sught to look much more thoroughly al what the Bureau is doing. Disorder or the college campuses undoubtedly presents a problem to the colleges concerned and perhaps to the communitie where they are situated as well. But it does not rise to the level of a threat to internal security of the United

Moreover, the intrusion of undercover operatives and student informers into the life of an institution which has the in terchange of ideas and the conflict of opinion as its very raison d'etre intro duces a disruptive element more deadly an disorder. The FBI has never shown much sensitivity to the poisonous effect which its surveillance, and especially its reliance on faceless informers, has upon democratic process and upon the practice of free speech. 

Tentative Budget and Budget Message Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 1971 SUBJECT :

BUDGET PREPARATION AND FORMAT

The budget document this year has several changes in its format reflecting recommended changes suggested by the Board of Directors. It is hoped that the organization of material will simplify the Directors' budget review. All material is consolidated within each departmental category with the elimination of the supplementary budget book. Most of the former detail remains but standardization of detailed presentation should prove helpful.

ONE MAJOR INNOVATION SHOULD BE PARTICULARLY USEFUL; i.e. THE EXPLANATION OF MAJOR CHANGES APPEARING ON THE GREEN SHEET. . .

BUDGET REVIEW BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

As stated on many occasions, the budget document can never be sufficiently complete to eliminate the need for work sessions between the Manager and Board of Directors. The budget sets major policy patterns for the entire year and as such should be subjected to in depth analysis to assure complete understanding. It is hoped that the Directors will set up several work sessions to accomplish this.

GENERAL FUND

A tax rate of 50.80 mills representing an increase of 3.95 mills is recommended to support General Fund services.

OVERALL REVENUE PICTURE

The revenue picture shows no significant overall improvement that can affect the tax rate. While there has been an increase of about 25% in the Grand List and a slight increase in the school operations grant, there have been offsetting reductions in other grants such as CDAP, and school construction. Also we will not receive rental income from the Community College and we are estimating tax collections of 98.5% next year compared with the high current year estimate of 99.1%.

Fees charged by the Town for various services are being reviewed. For example, we find that charges for funerals on weekends or holidays are less than actual costs. We will be recommending that this be rectified as soon as we have developed full information. We are also proposing a moderate fee for private truck use of the sanitary land fill area. Receipts from this source will serve to both pay for improvements, such as the transfer station and discourage non-resident use of our facility.

OVERALL EXPENDITURE PICTURE

Prior to my budget preparations, the Board of Directors made it clear that they wished a "bare bones" budget. This is what I have presented to you. Increases in personnel or program exist only when they can be justified due to unusual circumstances. In many instances existing levels of service have been cut back.

The overall budget increase is 6.5%. The Board of Education increase is 8.3%; the balance of the budget is 4.5%. In terms of dollars, the total increase is \$1,032,318; the Board of Education increase is \$750,000 and all other Town operations \$282,318. Stated differently, the Board of Education increase represents about 3 out of every 4 dollars of increased Town expenditure proposals. While Town budget increases total \$282,318, it is interesting to note that the increase in several

relatively fixed cost items exceed this amount. Included are: Street Lighting _ _ _ _ _ \$ 44,000 Refuse Collection _ _ _ 74,000 Social Security & Insurance - 97,000

Major cutbacks were required and include a reduction in Capital Improvements of \$200,783 and a deferral in all but emergency sidewalk repairs for a savings of \$65,000. Due to a 30% rate increase for street lights, it is not planned to add any lights next year.

PERSONNEL Personnel costs for uniformed police and fire personnel are based on existing contracts. Contracts have not yet been finalized for the hourly rated or clerical/engineering personnel. The budget figures include increments based upon cost of living adjustments of approximately 7% consistent with federal statistics on living costs.

Four departments have been granted additional personnel. Of the 10 added, 1 is for Library, 2 for the Park, 1 for sanitation and 6 for the Police Department. The sharp increase in police activity and needs has convinced me that we should not defer the addition of another patrol district. For example; in the past ten years; police activity has increased nearly 300% while personnel has only increased 62%. However, a petition for foot patrol at the parkade has not been supported in this budget.

The added personnel in the Park Department is justified for several reasons: Our tree maintenance program is several years behind schedule, our park acreage has increased, we have more swimming pools and ball fields to maintain and the use of our facilities has sharply increased.

Operation of our sanitary fill in a manner that meets state standards requires that more effort be wade in the daily cover of trash. This will mean the addition of a full time driver and vehicle to haul in adequate cover. The need becomes more critical as we reach higher elevations with improved visibility to the highway. However, our present method of operation -

the sanitary land fill - saves us about \$250,000 each year. Funds are also included in the Pension Account for retroactive increases for existing pensioners.

CAPTTAL IMPROVEMENTS

I regrat sincerely that I felt the need to sharply reduce funding for Capital Improvements. Hopefully this will be only a temporary deferral. Our needs would justify a substantial increase rather than a reduction.

In view of the critical need for Capital Improvements and our apparent inability to satisfy these needs on a pay as you go basis at this time, serious consideration should be given to returning to the voters with a bonding program for essential improvements. Perhaps a less ambitious undertaking than the one proposed last fall would be acceptable.

The budget document lists improvements recommended for the next fiscal year. A supplemental capital budget contains the 6 year program in accordance with Charter requirements. Recommended practice would be for the Board of Directors to designate those Capital Improvement items approved at the time of budget adoption.

SPECIAL FUNDS

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Fire operations show a sharp increase reflecting the decrease in working hours from 48 to 42. Personnel to accomplish this change, approved in the existing contract with the firemen, are being added in the final quarter of the current year. Other Fire Department expenses remain fairly stable. \$66,147 is being taken from the estimated \$100,000 surplus in the Fire Fund in order to reduce the funds required by taxation. The total Grand List for the District is \$198,216,979 with each mill in taxes representing \$198,000. A tax rate of 5.1 mills, increased from 4.39, will be necessary to support Fire operations.

WATER FUND

SEWER FUND

Present rates for Water service should produce a slight surplus available for future Capital Improvements. No major improvements are planned in the next fiscal year since we will still be involved in funding the Nike Tower Project.

Sewer operations will require \$75,000 from the \$119,000 estimated surplus. The sewer rate schedule will be reviewed early in the new fiscal year once operating expenses and revenues are known when the Secondary Treatment Plant is in operation.

SPECIAL TAXING DISTRICT

A rate increase of 2 mills from the present 6 is recommended by the District Board in order to support expansion and control of parking facilities.
