High School Relaxes Its Smoking Rules

Manchester High School students will be permitted to smoke outside the building before and after school and at any time during the school day when they have study halls. The partial change in policy becomes effective Monday, the start of the fourth quarter.

In making the announcement to the student body yesterday, Principal George Emmerling said that the experiment will be on a trial basis the rest of the year, with the sanction Superintendent of Schools Donald J. Hennigan and the Board of Education.

The no smoking ban inside the building remains in effect. Any student found violating the same financial limit, brought by one of a one-week suspension from school for the first offense, and a two-week suspension for the second.

The smoking privilege is not a hasty decision. Emmerling stated, nor should it be interpreted as a condemnation of smoking by the administration. Rather, he said, "We are promoting an honest and realistic appraisal of the present situation."

Emmerling added that he feels that the prohibition on smoking in the past has encouraged deception, and that polling of inventories is an almost impossible task. "I feel there are more important responsibilities in education," he said.

"The rules of 20 or 25 years ago just don't work," he said. The student smoking privilege, Emmerling pointed out, is really a restoration of one that was granted in the late 1940's, when MHS was located in the present Junior High building, which was then the Manchester School Main Building. It remained in effect when the new high school building was dedicated after the Surgeon General's report in the 1960's, recommending the prohibition of smoking. The recommendation to restore the privilege was made in the final quarter of this year. The school board, which was formed in December, March 1969, a junior headed the student group in connection with the school will conduct, on a voluntary basis, and with study halls in connection with a five-day plant to stop smoking seminar during the week of April 26 to 30. It will include discussions, and possibly members of the medical profession.

Among other changes, Emmerling announced yesterday, said that after school activities will not be permitted to enter or leave the student parking lot before the lunch period without official permission.

"This step is being taken, he said, in answer to complaints by teachers, students, and neighbors in the morning, about the noise, disturbance of classes, raising of cars, presence of outsiders, and the litter problem.

In connection with permission to leave the building during study halls, specific plans to re-enter have been designated for the lunch hour and other periods. For those who wish to remain inside, study halls, the library, cafeteria, and subject matter areas will be available for study.

Emmerling reminded the students of the new school hours next year, which are being instituted in cooperation with the Junior High School Grade 9. These will include overlapping sessions and a slight change in the right to use in state and local. He added that changes are also being anticipated in the Student Activities Association policy, lunch schedule, study halls, and curriculum. The course changes he said, will depend upon final budget determination.

Emmerling, called upon all students to respect the new freedoms being granted; a co-operation, he said, "that would serve to enrich themselves and help to make the school a place of which they can be proud."

The complete text of his remarks, Emmerling said, will be printed in next week's High School World in The Herald.

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Pilgrims Return The Holy City

JERUSALEM (AP) — In crowds in a re-creation of war and sunny weather Christians' agony nearly 20 centuries ago, about 2,000 pilgrims returned to the Holy City today for the annual Good Friday procession.

The march of the pilgrims—some singing, others weeping—over the 1,000 steps of the winding Via Dolorosa was led by the Roman Catholic custodian of the Holy Land, Franciscan Father Ermilino Ronconi.

More pilgrims participated Thursday in any previous Good Friday since the 1947 war—when Israel captured the Old City of Jerusalem, including shrines holy to Christianity, Islam, and Judaism.

And for the first time since the war, the Holy Sepulchre, the site of the crucifixion and burial of Jesus, was open to all pilgrims.

Arab shopkeepers along the Via Dolorosa kept their stores open in effect since last year, and the hopes of attracting more tourists.

The Holy Sepulchre, a site of violence by Arab threats against the shrine, was closed for several days last week.

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Enemy Hits Allied Bases In Highlands

by gunships. Enemy casualties were not known.

Targets of the shelling attacks included Da Nang, the Highway and Dak To air bases in the central highlands, the headquarters of the South Vietnamese 25th Infantry Division at Lai Khe 25 miles north of Saigon and the provincial capital of V. Thanh in the Mekong Delta about 110 miles southwest of Saigon.

The U.S. Command said enemy gunners fired five 122mm rockets at the Da Nang Air Base and one landed inside the base. The command said there were no U.S. casualties and damage was light. South Vietnamese headquarters said three of the 100-round rockets fell short of their target and landed in Da Nang, heavily damaging three houses and wounding six civilians. Earlier reports had said five civilians were killed.

At Lai Khe, five civilians were reported killed and 11 civilians and one soldier wounded during a shelling attack.

At V. Thanh in the Viet Cong area, a mortar round broke up in a paddy when the Viet Cong fired eight mortar rounds into a rally for defectors a few minutes after the program began. South Vietnamese headquarters said six civilians and one militiaman were wounded.

The United States sent more waves of B52 bombers to attack North Vietnamese troop concentrations surrounding the base. Base 6 in the northern part of the central highlands near the juncture of the borders of Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam. The base is about 30 miles north of Saigon.

An American artillery lieutenant, missing since Fire Base 5, returned to the base today, walking back into the base today.

First Lt. Brian M. Thacker, 25, of Honolulu, Hawaii, was reported unharmed although he spent nine days in the jungles in the run.

The base, which the South Vietnamese reoccupied on April 1, was still under fire today and two U.S. helicopters sent to pick up Thacker could not land.

The lieutenant, whose father is a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force at Hickam, Hawaii, refused evacuation and said he "feels his job is at Fire Base 5."

U.S. fighter-bombers laced the jungle around the base with napalm today and helicopters dropped 50-gallon drums of defoliant cover.

There were no reports of new ground fighting around the base, but 30 miles to the south 25 North Vietnamese troops were reported killed in the third day of fighting around Fire Base Lonely. Three South Vietnamese were killed and four wounded.

President Nguyen Van Thieu officially terminated operations in southern Laos, which ended prematurely 46 days later, on March 24 after the South Vietnamese counterattacks forced the South Vietnamese into retreat. However, small South Vietnamese units continued to operate in Laos, and two overnight commando raids were made on virtually deserted enemy bases, one on three days ago.

Asked if there would be more in southern Laos in the future, a spokesman said: "We'll let you know when any raids are conducted."

England To Conduct Census Despite Charges by Critics

By LENA HEINZELING Associated Press Writer

LONDON, (AP) — The United Kingdom is going ahead with its decennial census despite charges that it is a gross invasion of privacy and the biggest bank robbery since the 1940s.

The charges are reminiscent of those that accompanied the U.S. census last year.

On Census Day, April 25, of entry into Britain of immigrants, another asks the country to do to list people and learn how many cars each household has, whether it has a kitchen sink, a bath or shower and many other bits of information.

Registrar General Michael Reed hopes the census will provide the most revealing look since census taking began in 1801.

"We have to find out what the country is truly like," a spokesman for the registrar general said. "There is a tendency for people to assume that every one's environment is the same as their own."

The forms to be filled out by households will be filed away in the public record office for 100 years. No names will be included in the computer data.

"We were going to burn the forms," a spokesman said, "but historians, sociologists and people who are interested in tracing ancestors were up in arms. The computer data will be kept after pages of statistics."

The Southeast England Young Liberals Federation said the government, instead of counting noses and prying into "every detail of our lives," should be doing something "to meet the problems of war, poverty, pollution and the death of the soul."

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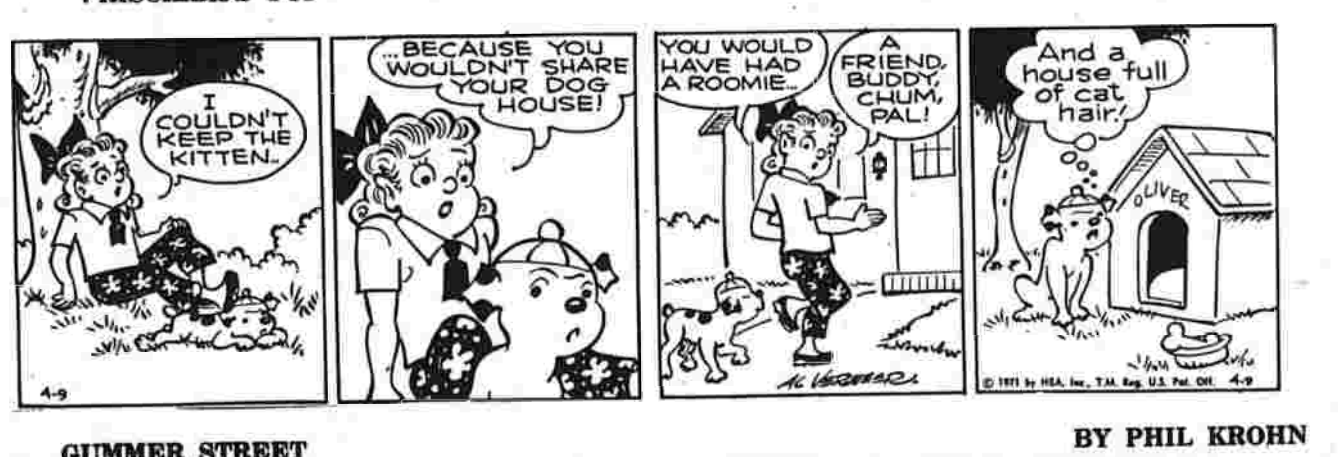

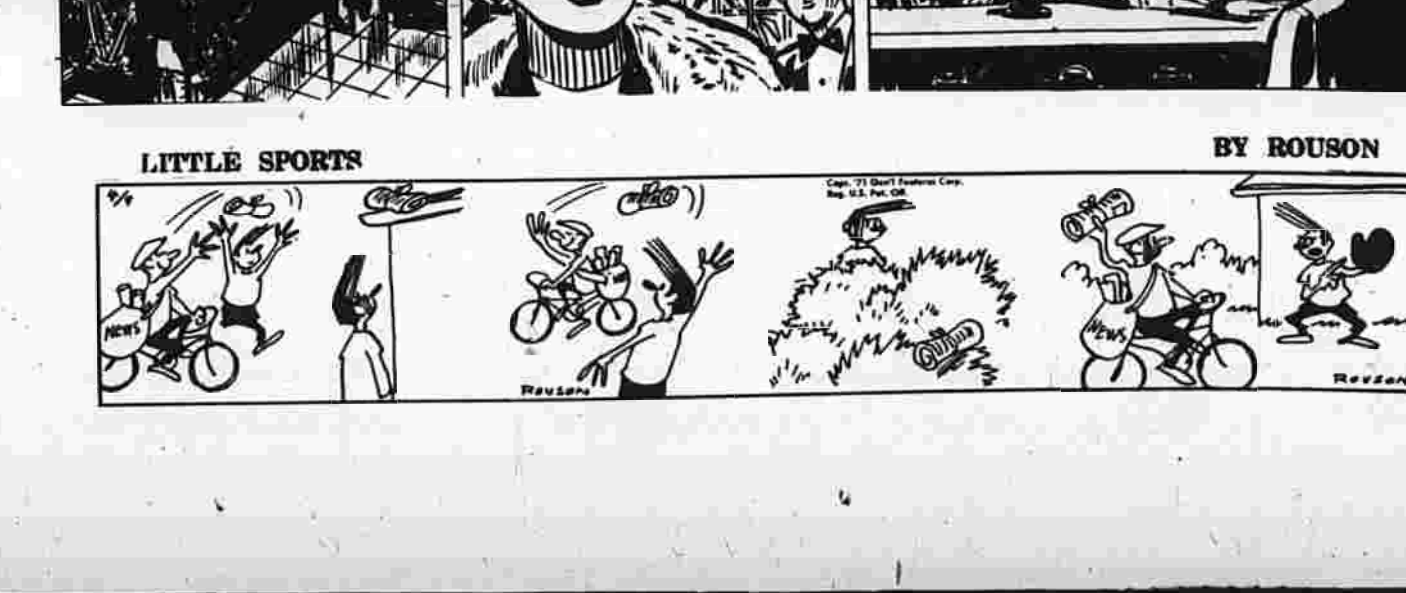
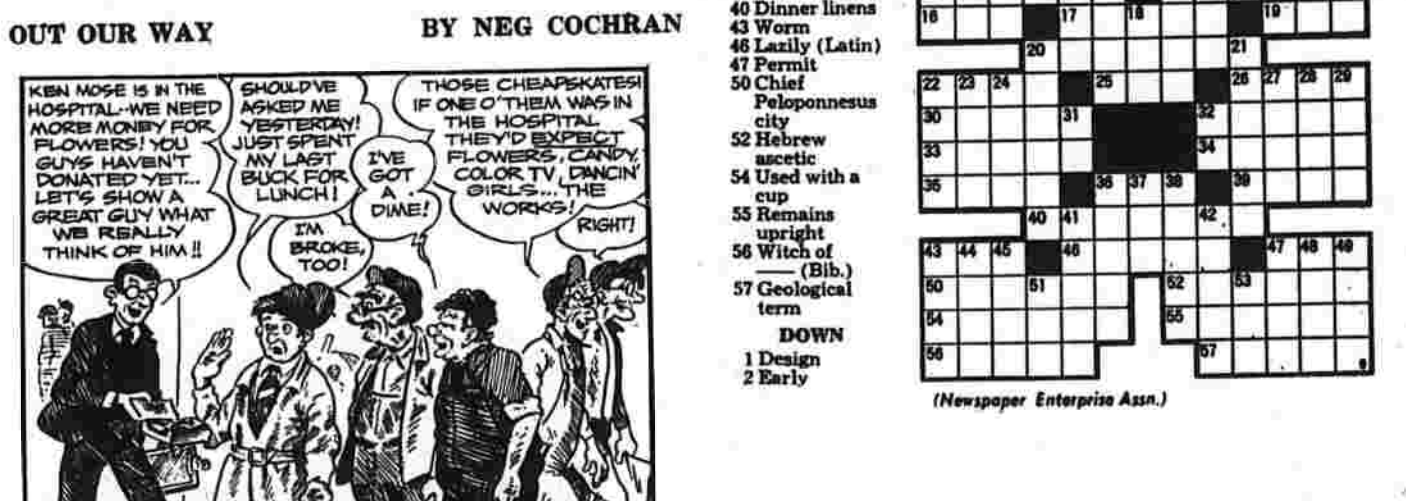
