





Full Circle On Inflation? What shall we hope about, or for? The latest reports on the economic

ront out of Washington are to the effect that the Nixon Administration has now begun to weigh the possible ad-If these reports are credible, they mark, with fascinating clarity, how completely full circle we have come with what began as a battle against in-

Even to think a tax cut is to think in an inflationary way. What has happened, then? Was not

inflation an evil, threatening thing when we first set out to control it? Does it not threaten just as much immediate damage to the people on fixed incomes and to the elderly, and just as much long range damage to the soundness of the economy, as it ever did?

vantages of a tax cut.

How can it be possible for an administration which began by pledging its efforts to shut down on inflation to come to a point where it is even considering helping inflation open up again? We all know the answer. It is that emporarily we have come to fear something else—unemployment —more than we fear ballooning prices, wages and

living expenses. The answer is that we have all been forced to admit that the Nixon Administration's effort to achieve a nice balance which would protect both the value of the dollar and a prosperity level for jobs has somehow failed

What is more, it has to be admitted that, as the effort to balance the two objectives has failed, the result of the failure has been tronically cruel.

The number of jobs has gone down, but the amount of inflation has continued upward.

This happens to be precisely the opposite of what we were seeking to ac-We do not know precisely what went

wrong. The Nixon Administration's original plan of battle seemed sound. One of the potential policy tragedies of our time centers, in fact, on the possibility that perhaps the Nixon Administration's original plan was working, and would have worked, if we could have held to it a few months more without flinching. But it is hard to blame anybody for flinching, as the hardship of joblessness began spreading.

Flinch we all did, the Nixon Administration included, last fall, when the first deliberate moves to feed tonic to the economy, no matter whether the tonic happened to be inflationary in nature, were taken. Since then, we have had lip service for the battle against inflation, and monthly claims that the inflationary statistics do not really mean what the figures say. But the real object tive has been to halt the loss of jobs and get some who have already lost their jobs back to work.

Now to talk of a tax cut is to consider going all the way -all the way to an openly inflationary policy which would. we hope, release money which would, it would be hoped, trickle down into jobcreating channels.

What disturbs us most is that all this progress from one policy to another and from one objective to another has been accompanied, all along, by the advice and support of respectable professional economists, supposed experts in the business of interpreting our economy, and supposedly qualified, if anybody could be, to try to manage it.

"The Only Hope Is Hope' 'The only thing we have to fear,"

The phrase undoubtedly set the tone for his own leadership, and for that psy chological national response, which helped this proud country live through those depression days when so many of our certainties had collapsed on us.

what does man do? Merely despair? . It is in his answer to that question tha Mr. Monod formulates his own little litany, so comparable to President

"We have no right, says the French biologist, "to have no hope, because if we have no hope, there is no hope."

Well, since we are here by the merest chance, and it wouldn't matter much if we weren't even here, and since there is no authority anywhere which sets up what we should try to be or what values we should follow, we are, after all, quite free to do as we please. We have total

In such a situation, what does My Monod himself choose? He wants what he calls a "stable-state society" in which we could keep either population growth or technological progress from running away with us, and he wants the 'destruction of nuclear stockpiles." To climb toward the summits of our potentialities. We try to climb ,no matter how much we keep slipping back as we try to achieve this will, he believes, call for "some form of world authority."

Why try to work for something like this? Because, being here, although by accident, in a world which has no point, we ourselves cannot resist trying to climb, not so much because the moun tain is there, but because we are.


