'Improving' UN General Assembly One could easily laugh, if one did not suffer from some strange feeling that one really ought to go into mourning, over the various proposals that have been advanced for "improving" the work of the United Nations General As-

Still another American proposal would have the General Assembly adopt a biennial instead of an annual budget. In the memorandum explaining some of its recommendations, the United

States observed that general debate held every year "has tended to become routine and repetitious and to have led to a waning of world interest," while "such a debate held every other year and at the level of head of state or minister for foreign affairs might constitute a more notable event attracting significantly greater world interest."

The nation of Liberia, for its part, is cause "due to the soaring cost of living in New York the cost of maintaining delegations in New York is fast becoming prohibitive."

The Philippines are suggesting, in one respect, a reform even more stringent than any of ours. Where we would try to help rescue the General Assembly by limiting speeches to 30 minutes, the Philippines would limit actual speeches to 10 minutes each, with a compensatory privilege of having more extended remarks in the published record.

As against all such recommendations for an improvement in the functioning and status of the United Nations General Assembly, there are certain memories from the past and certain hopes for the future.

One can remember, for instance, from the fall of the year 1956, when the General Assembly was in unlimited session, and listening intently to long speeches all night long, and never in any danger of lacking a quorum, and never in any want of important foreign ministers in attendance. That was when the General Assembly was assuming, and exercising, jurisdiction in a matter of world peace or war and employing both its diplomacy and its half-formulated law to impose peace on a war which had already started.

The General Assembly needed no special procedural rules or limitations o enhance its prestige and improve its

And the reason was simple: the General Assembly was, then, performing the work the United Nations ,was created to

nations which helped give the General Assembly that function and that power in 1956 have conspired together to take such jurisdiction and such power away from the General Assembly, thus reducing it to that status - of a mere debating society - for which new rules

For the future, one has to hope, if one hopes for the survival of civilization itself, that the General Assembly will some day again become something more than a debating society.

For this to happen, there must come a enewed, and more permanent, act of submission from those great powers which first cooperated in the aggrandizement of the General Assembly in the 1956 era, and then retreated from it, to gather power back toward their own Security Council vetoes, wher they beability to control the increasing memcame aware of their own growing inbership of the General Assembly.

The act of submission required from the great powers must acknowledge again, the need for the acceptance and enforcing of a world law against war, no matter whose war it happens to be. But until that inchides a willingness to subject our own wars to the free debate and judgment and jurisdiction of the General Assembly, it is not as hopeful as it might sound. 




