

As the California law has worked out, in the 20 years it has been in existence, it has led to the defeat of about half the low - rent housing projects subjected to the referendum process.

Looking forward to the potential practical impact of this Court decision. there are eight other states, Colorado, Iowa, Mississippi, Montana, Oklahoma, Texas, Vermont and Virginia, which now have similar laws on their books.

In many other states, any effort to pass such laws would probably fail. And in any case some analysis of this present Court opinion sees in it hints that it exempts the California law from unconstitutional motivation primarily because it has been on the books so long. The Court, it is suggested, might not approve the same kind of law if other states should rush to adopt it now in an effort to fight ghetto-eliminating pro-

Perhaps, then, the Court decision is to have less practical impact than the champions of low cost housing as the device for breaking up our ghettoes may

Wasp in Your Car Myrtle was driving a neighbor to the market when a wasp fley into the car, zoomed up her sleeve, and stung her under the arm. Myrtle hit the brakes so

hard that the car landed in a roadside ditch. The neighbor, injured, lost no ime in suing for damages, "Anybody who panics at the wheel," she said in court, "has no business driving at all. A driver has to be able to keep cool in a pinch."

The judge said Myrtle could not he held liable for reacting the way any average driver might re act in a similar situation. The need to "keep cool in a pinch" arises all too often in driving a car. As a rule, the law

will forgive a mistake caused by urgent and unusual circumstances But even in an emergency, driver must retain some degree o Another motorist faced a dilemma when the car ahead of him stopped suddenly. Although the right lane was clear, the

notorist chose to swing out to the left-where he collided with a car coming the other way. This time, the driver was held iable for the accident. The court said that even in an emergency, he should have had enough judg ment to take the right lane. Nor is a motorist excused by an emergency that he himself has created. In another case, a small hov was struck down when he suddenly dashed from the shou der of a highway into the path of an oncoming car.

When the motorist was sued for damages, he protested that he had been unable to stop in time. But at the court hearing, these further facts came to light: 1) that the boy had been facing away from the car: 2) that he had been in plain sight of the driver for a consider-3) that the driver had neither slowed down nor sounded his

Legless Veteran 'Walks' 25 Miles For Dimes Fund BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) Gene Roberts was the first of 4,000 persons to complete a 25-

mile March of Dimes walkaarms for 16 hours, the lower part of his body wrapped in a canvas bag. His wife Lisia walked at his side during the night. A police

car provided escort and his twin brother James accompanied him during the last few miles. Roberts, 25, a father of two, lost his legs five years ago when he stepped on a land mine one month after arriving in Vietnam with the Marines. A former high school athletic champion, Roberts completed the 26-mile Boston Marathon in a wheelchair last April and swam 12 miles across the Chesapeake Bay and back the follow-

ing August. This September he said, he will try to swim the English "Losing my legs never really bothered me that much. I had the same problems then that I had already. I'm not going to blame anything on my legs." A Bible reader since his Viet-nam tour, Roberts' conversation

is punctuated with frequent quotations, religious maxims and "Praise the Lord." "The reason I have to tal about Jesus so much is that no one else does. I have to spread the word. The only thing that keeps me going is my faith," he

Roberts began testing his physical endurance as testimo-ny to his religious faith. "I felt like quitting so many times it was a shame," he said after the March of Dimes walkathon. 'I was coming down the road and I was crying. I said to my-self, 'Why am I doing this?' " The marathon march raised \$150,000, but Roberts said, "It's not the money that's so important. The most important thing is that people got together."
