Trout On A Cold Day Late in the afternoon when the sun

getting them to form one peaceful line,

had warmed the early grass and you sat in the shelter of the big rock below the ridge of pine trees which blocked away the northeast wind, you listened to the river, shrugged your shoulders to throw off any slight chill, and half closed your eyes, believing you were in eternal In the morning, when the stream edges were frozen and it was so cold up

in the hills that the long ridge ten miles way was clearly visible, the lone trees standing straight against the early purple sky. I had fished down the fast riffles with great concentration, my wits sharp ened by the chill which pained my finger-tips. In very little time I caught six trout. When the stream edges thawed, the trout became shy. The sky was clear and the sun was bright, although my fingers still pained unless I wiped away the drops of water after I had touched the dripping fly line. By midday, hidden in the hollow, it was easy to pretend it was summer, for the pines were as green as they ever would be on a summer's day. Then I felt a chill and decided to settle for spring; the days of spring and autumn were the best days,

The place in the sun, sheltered from the wind, had a dry, steep bank before a small pool which was deep enough to shelter trout beneath the big stones on he bottom, which you could not see except when the sun was directly overhead and shining straight down into the water. It was wasteful to fish the riffles where the trees hung heavily and sheltered the stream from the sun. There would be warm sun in the hollow for two or three hours, so you could cast out a worm and leave the rod in a cleft stick, and lie and dream.

When you lay on your back, your head cradled from behind in cupped hands. the sky was like a calm sea dotted with islands around which the tide moved n races and carried the fish close to the shore. The longer you stared at the sky, the more the river sound was like the roar of surf until sound and sight combined and enveloped you. The rod tip, which was set easily on

the cleft stick, did not move once for trees. I shrugged, but the cold could not be thrown away. The force and irritation of trying to force it off made me fully awake again, realising my limbs were cramped and the rheumatism in my right leg was painful. I wound in the line and stared at the limp, drowned worm There was a slight tear in it, but only where the current had nearly pulled from the hook or perhaps a minnow had tried to nibble it away.

Once the sun had gone and you were cramped and cold, it was easy to stare at the still pool and think what lifeless water it was. In summer it would be of splashing fish. Now it was empty, and soon the ice would form along the tops of the grass blades and ferns which trailed into the current edge.

Summer was a long way off, even spring, and it was useless to pretend that he cold early-year was anything else. I walked upstream toward the heavy sound of falling water which was The Force, a natural white-water tumble above a bridge which carried across small road to somewhere south-east of the river and the forest. I think that if you followed it far enough and long nough, it took you to Kirby Lonsdale.

When I reached the bridge, I climbed carefully along the rocky sides of The Force, throwing up the hood of my jacket to keep off the cold spray and making each step with careful deliberation, for he rocks were almost icy. You could never see the bottom of the

runs between the white water of The Force. The water was black and bottomless, although in reality it was barely four feet deep. But because it was black, it held unknown qualities and quantities and beneath the bridge, where nothing could be heard above the roar of the mountain water, I fished for a while in the great depths, casting a worm on a line weighted by a half-ounce lead bomb and allowing it to roll downstream with the current, feeling at each passage through the runs and eddies of the white water for the plucking or the heavy snatch of a taking trout, perhaps even an early salmon. After each cast the bomb rolls downstream, bumping against the rocks. It reaches the end of the run. It stops and drags on the line It is rewound and cast again. And so on.

And so on. Sometimes it catches against a stick and the current pulls against it in such fish-bite; but not quite. It only half de-

When you finally walk away from The Force, shaking your head to rid the pounding from your eardrums, the peace and silence are reassuring. You walk on through the forest until the roar is less and less; until the roar is a whisper, and the long riffle under the far bank which ends in a deep eddy sings whatever song you may wish in its rip-

fle and the eddy is that it has never failed to produce one big trout. You come to it purposely at day's end because it never fails, which is perhaps why it never fails. Day's end is the best time to catch

The worm reached the eddy, paused, and swung across it. I felt the steady tap-tap of a fish. I did not twitch the line, even froze my movements so there would be no chance to scare the fish. The taps became strong and then the fish jerked the line heavily and I jerked back, tightening the line on the reel. When I had unhooked the trout, killed it, and placed it in grass in my bag. I wiped my hands carefully, for the slime, like the water seemed icy-cold. Tomorrow there would be another fish in the empty hole in the eddy. - ANTHONY PEARSON IN THE MANCHESTER







Come for Dessert and Tea

If you'd like to entertain a group of friends, yet don't want to get involved with a dinner party, ask them over for dessert and tea. It will be less expensive and because a dessert party is usually seld after the hustle of family activity has quieted, it will prove to be more relaxing and nsequently more enjoyable for the hostess and the guests . The preferred time for a "Come For Dessert" gathering is in the evening, after seven - or eight or nine - depending on what time most of your friends finish dinner. It could be a Sunday afternoon party, if those on your guest list traditionally serve dinner in the middle of the day For the desserts, offer a choice of three or four with a range of flavors and richness. For friends on diets and ones who prefer a light dessert, include a bowl of fruit temptingly sweetened and flavored along with at least one new and intriguing cookie. By all means, make a splash with a fantastic cake or two and perhaps a pie. The two cakes here perfectly complement one another not only in looks but in taste. The round one is a yummy Cream Cake flavored with rum, delicately textured and simply frosted with whipped cream and a sprinkling of nuts

Although the Peppermint Party Cake looks imposing and difficult to frost, it is a simple-tomake 13 x 9-inch sponge cake, cut and split to make a four-layer cake, filled and frosted with an easy peppermint icing. If you decide to include a pie, the Sour Cream Lemon Pie shown here is ideal For the beverage, make it a choice of hot or iced tea. Tea is refreshing, young in spirit and most appropriately goes with springtime desserts such as suggested here. Easiest way to prepare and serve tea for a crowd is by using the concentrate method. For it, you prepare an extra strong brew of tea and use it for both hot and iced tea. For the hot tea, pour 2 tablespoons concentrate into a cup and fill with hot water. For iced tea, pour about 21/2 tablespoons of the concentrate into a glass. Add ice and cold water, . With a number of desserts to prepare, it's best to do as much ahead as you can. The cake and the custard-filling for the Rum Cream Cake can be made the day before then assembled the day of the party. The pie crust and the lemon filling can also be made ahead and put together before party time. Make the cookies two days in advance and store them in an airtight container. Make the tea concentrate no longer than 4 hours ahead.

Beat in vanilla and lemon extract. Fold egg yolks into whites. Gradually fold in dry ingradients, sifting 1/4 cup at a time over surface. Turn into ungreased 13 x 9 x 2-inch cake pan. Bake in 325 F.
