People Vs. Pundits people, mistaken though they may be, what they think is good for them, better than the world's smart thinkers and

One could draw a very intelligent and appealing prospectus, before the presidential election in South Korea, showing that it was time for the voters of that country to begin an enlightened move toward the future. President Chung Hee Park, the stolid conservative seeking a third term, was being challenged by an appealing new figure, one Kim Dae Jung, who dared stand for such longrange sense as an improvement in relations with North Korea.

Surely, 20 years after the Korean war, the people of South Korea had to be weary of what has amounted to dictatorship, and had to be ready to begin some normalization of relations with the other half of their own country. Then came the voting. It was ap-

parently conducted under fair conditions. And when the votes were counted, the challenger with his new ideas had done all right, for a challenger, in that he had survived, but President Park had been returned to office. That was in South Korea.

If there is any preachment we wouldbe pundits make with what may seem boring regularity with regard to the German question, it is to the effect that the people themselves to begin doing what the United States and Russia do not have statesmanship enough to do and begin taking steps to heal the senseless division of Germany.

We pundits have had a hero for this theory in Chancellor Willy Brandt, who has now obtained, after years of preaching of his own, the formal authority to lead Western Germany's foreign policy. Chancellor Brandt has dared inaugurate a number of policies looking toward the normalization of Central Europe. They are policies which, if carried through to their ultimate conclusion, would pry Russia and the United States out of the armed confrontation they have maintained against one another inside Germany since the end of the war 25

To the outside pundits, who suspect that some such endeavor is now the only way to establish a peace to follow the war that ended a quarter of a century ago, it has seemed that the German people would welcome and support Chancellor Brandt's highly in-

China" policy, under which Communis China would be admitted to a new mem bership in the United Nations while For mosa would retain its present seat.

Former Ambassador Lodge, reporting this at the moment of the famed ping pong thaw, described the recommenda tion as something in a pragmatic vein, in which his commission is suggesting that any government which is maintaining a stable rule over any definite por tion of the earth's territory should be considered eligible for membership in the world organization.

Under this pragmatic rule of thumb East and West Germany, North and South Korea, and North and South Vietnam would all be welcome.

It has to be admitted that this prag matic approach seems to have a more honest and acceptable ring than all the hypocritical charades which, in the past, have pretended that nations already inside the United Nations were somehow holier than nations outside it.

Perhaps, then, this is one construct

Even the very wind, rain ar sun conspire against him. But now, for the first time in many years, there is growing hope among scientists that significant advances against aller gy may be relatively close, perhaps helping sufferers in this

The chief hope lies in a grow-ing understanding of the highly complex biochemical mechanism of the allergic reaction and the related possibility of developing new drugs. If new relief is provided,
