

Sad—But Less So Than Planned Those who have this week taken over the leadership and management of the peace protest in Washington have gained a part of their objective when they can get this nation advertised to the world as a nation which requires the presence of 10,000 special troops and police in our nation's capital in order to make 7,000 arrests in a single day.

This gives the United States a sorry appearance in the eyes of the world, and in its own eyes, for that matter. The tragedy of it is relieved only by

onsideration of what it was these construtors really hoped to achieve. They hoped, by their tactics, to make it impossible for their own government to perform its normal functioning in its own apital city. But, even more than that, they hoped that, in the course of paralyzadmonition drink your tea. ing their government itself, they would ffect and offend and enrage many housands of uninvolved civilians who would be caught in those traffic jams

They were hoping, also, that they could succeed in provoking the use of armed military force against them-

As they would have preferred it, they would have had the challenge come between themselves and military forces which were just inadequate for the job at hand, so that the situation would remain, for as long as they themselves chose to keep it that way, one which was out of control.

So far, they have been maneuvered out of their own hoped-for achievements by the presence of a force large enough and forewarned enough and quick enough to take the initiative, and thus, so far, keep the situation just under control all the time. .

Their only success to date, therefore, consists in giving the nation and the world this picture of preponderant official force making mass arrests of people who claim they are demonstrating

This is sad enough, and it is more than enough violence, but it isn't half as sad and half as violent as things would have been had the leadership o this week's demonstrations been able to have its way.

Violence, governmental and legal, is still no real basic cure for what generates violence in demonstrations but the grief with which we recognize that has to yield the scene to an even greater and more fundamental realization, which is that deliberately to seek violence is never possibly the route to the peace these demonstrators, some of them most sincerely, claim to seek.

Senseless' Crime And Punishment The very "senseless" nature of the seven murders of which they were convicted dictated death in the California gas chamber for Manson and his three weirdo girl friends, said the judge who sentenced them.

Quite obviously, it never occurred to the judge that there are, many Americans who regard the action he proposes to have the state of California take in punishment for these crimes to be quite as "senseless" as the crimes them-

Some of us can admit to the mind and mood of the judge, which is that society has the right to rid itself, by the taking of their lives, of such wanton criminals. But others of us confess that we can

of horrors, a doubling of barbaric, blind ed savagery, in having the state itself provide its own spectacle of the cold blooded taking of human life.

For those who feel this latter way there is no legitimate easing of their conscience in the prospect that lawyers can delay any execution date, or in the possibility that some sort of common onsent may continue this nation's avoidance, through the past few years, of any execution of any kind.

This nation ought to stop sidestepping and move on to decide, frontally and directly, the moral issue of whether i still believes in giving the state the authority to turn off a heart, blast a brain,

As for the California judge, we are surprised he dared employ, in such a prominent way, the word "senseless." It is not only true in itself, but also close to another truth involved - "in-

The Vietnam Travesties

For whatever reason—and the reason may be the liberating effect of confes sion—a steady stream of Vietnam atroc ity stories is hitting the headlines. The latest is the testimony of three former Army officers that their commanding general in Vietnam knowingly approved of an artillery bombardment aimed a an enemy hospital—an action that would be a violation of the Geneva convention.

This particular set of circumstances. along with other stories of murder and rture, was related before an "Ad Hoo inquiry into U.S. war crimes. The session involved 11 Congressmen, meeting in a caucus room at the Capitol, and was not an official Congressional hearing. It is, however, as close as Congress has gotten to the subject to date.

From other parts of the nation, a continuing parade of horror stories is com-

ing out, some involving just a few peo-ple, and hence the stories are not even making the papers. They mainly involve isolated incidents of tossing Viet Cong prisioners out of helicopters, murdering prisoners, torture etc., events that have appened in other wars. But what seems different about this war is the callousness of it all, extending even to grenading U.S. officers by U.S. troops. This too has happened in other wars, but generally under the greatest duress, and not for the picayune reasons that have set

off "fragging" in Vietnam.


