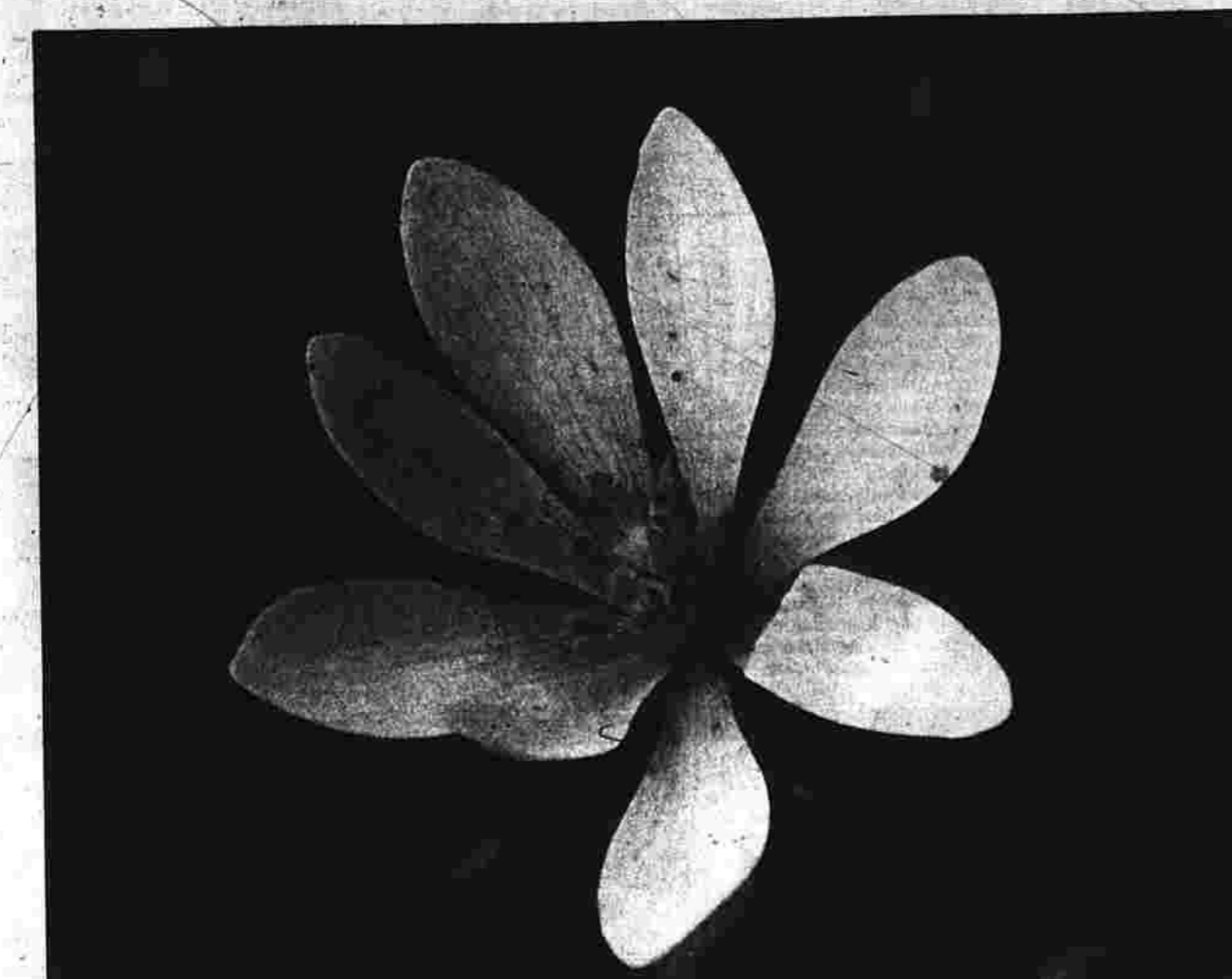
Here, quite rightly, he was defending the principles and practices of a free enterprise system.

The fact that Governor Rockefeller has now signed the same bill as he previously vetoed may be taken as an indication of how far this year's attempt to get the Connecticut General Assembly to free liquor prices in this state is likely to progress.

Our present system in which, in addition to paying ever higher taxes on liquor, as if it were a sin, we also pay higher prices in order to subsidize the sale of more packages stores than we really need, is apparently here to stay.

What the actual result in quantity or quality of legislators made his case can be probed, but the 1971 session has developed one interesting and perhaps refreshing and also perhaps 'quite temporary style of doing business.

The new mode of operation has centered in the decision-making process of the legislative committee.

And the marked change in their operation has been that, in this session, the various committees have been more a few units themselves than ever before in modern legislative history.

Second, this legislature surge in a sense of its own independent importance has coincided with a period of some laxity on the part of organizational leadership in the middle of the session.

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Save "Inland" Rail Service

What makes the Scammon-Watberg warning bolts down to this? The 1971 Democratic convention is in danger of being controlled by the party's extreme left faction, so that its nominee—no matter how moderate—will be limited for the entire campaign. If so, the Democrats will have cast aside the lessons of both 1968 and 1970 and will help President Nixon into a second term in the White House.

What makes the Scammon-Watberg warning appropriate right now is the exceedingly dangerous game being played for the Democratic presidential nomination by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie. Fearful that anti-party toward him from the left might make his nomination worthless, Muskie has been twice open.

Within the past month, Muskie has made headlines endorsing and attending antiwar demonstrations, attacking the FBI, and turning up on the Mall to rap with the antiwar Vietnam veterans. He even wanted to visit the veterans while they were disobeying a court injunction, until aides convinced lawyer Muskie he might make himself liable to disbarment proceedings.

Being against the war is good politics, but undermining street demonstrations is not. Muskie's calculations is that once the left is sufficiently neutralized, he will turn again toward the center where the votes for general election victory are found. But once having given the left to power over candidate selection, can their influence be cast off that easily? That is the question posed by Scammon and Watberg, two liberal Democrats who have this danger with the greatest trepidation.

Their work, "The Real Majority" is no small part was responsible for convincing the Democrats that law-and order is not a codeword for racism and that the social issues—riots, crime violence, narcotics—are indeed a valid concern. The White House routinely concedes that the book was a major influence in making Democratic candidates less vulnerable.

But in their opinion, Scammon and Watberg suggest that Democratic liberals are now reverting to their discredited stance of pre-election 1970, "by defusing the social issue, by demonstrating that concern

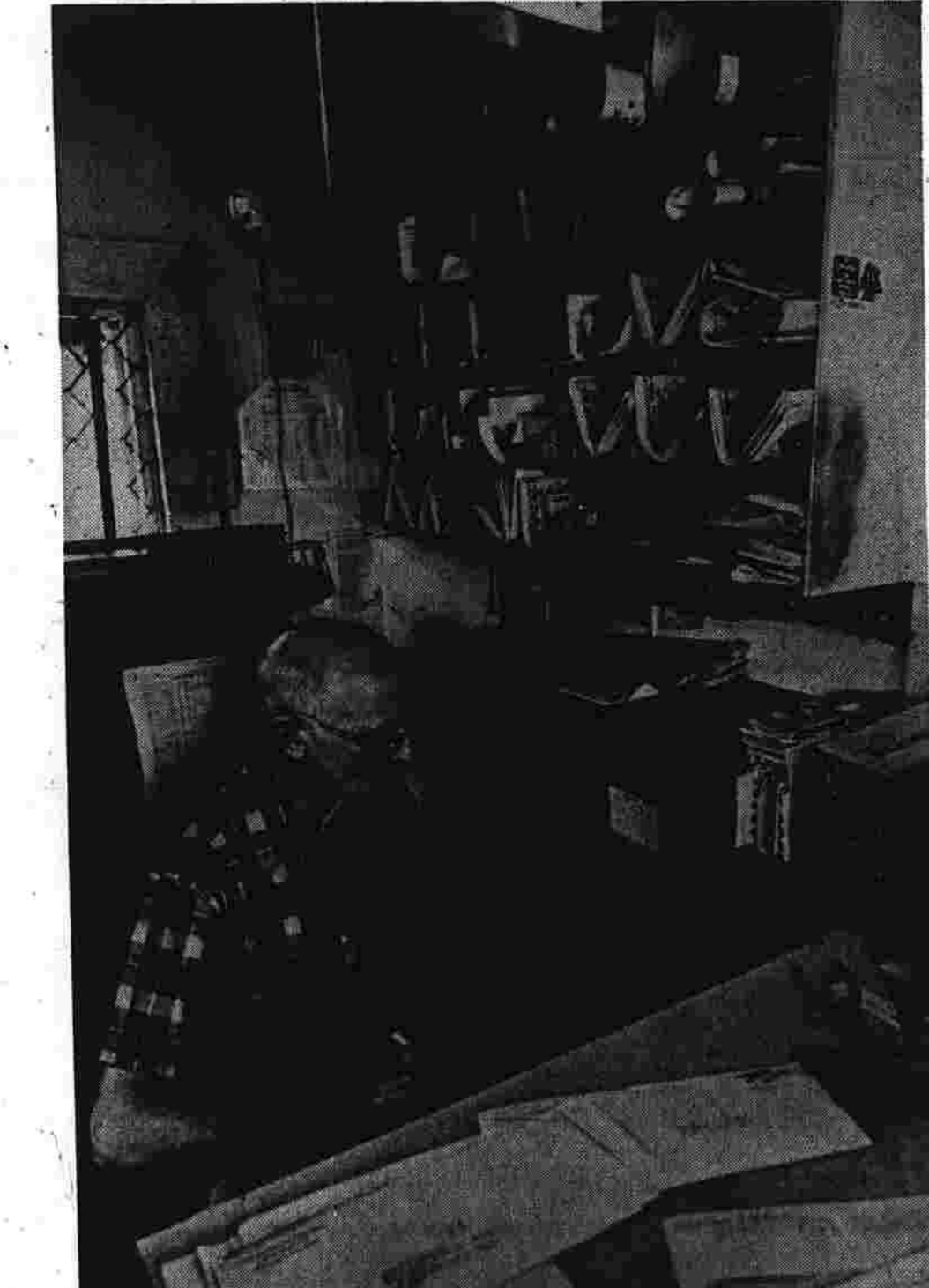


PINT SIZE POST OFFICE

Postmaster Brown sits in front of the pigeonholes where sorted mail is kept.

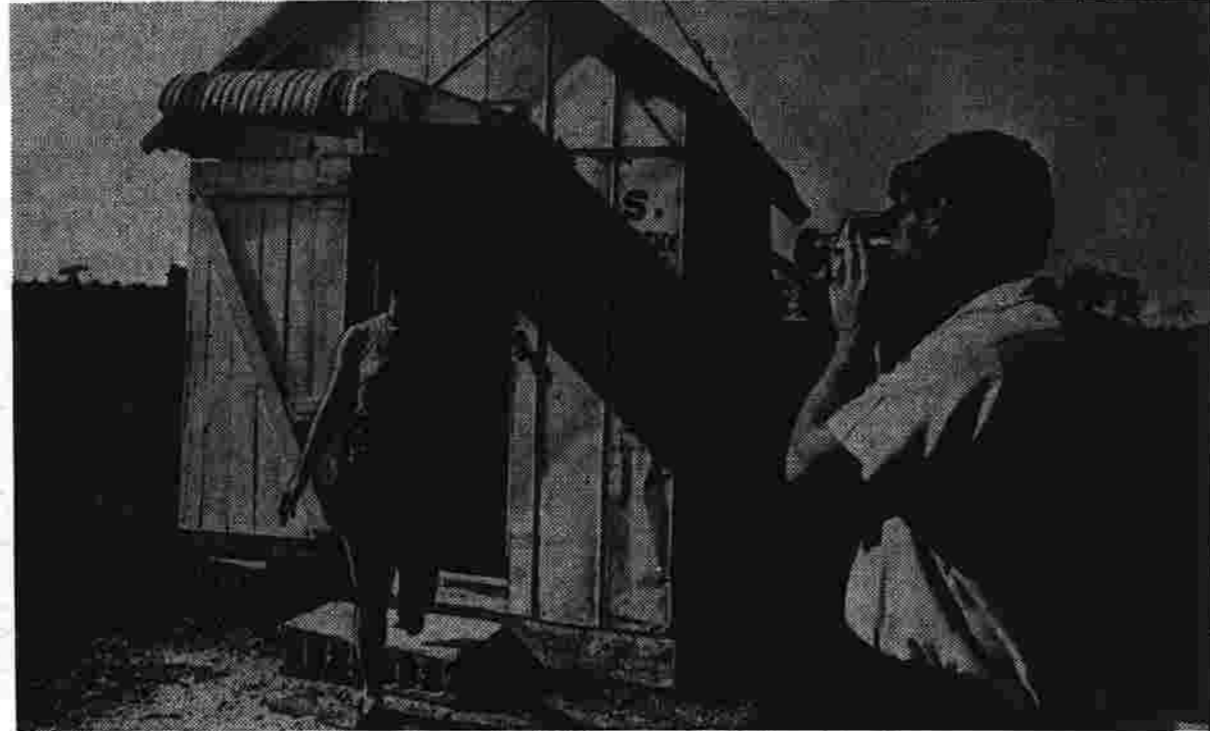

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Two More Bombs Rattle California Installations

LOS ANGELES (AP) — California was hit with two more bombings today, one knocking out a rural power substation near San Jose, the other causing minor damage at an East Los Angeles refinery.

There were no injuries, only hours earlier, Wednesday night, a fire bomb was tossed at the front of a bookstore in Chicago, near Sacramento, but it scorched the outside of the structure.

The downtown office of the Bank of America was the major target for picketing in Wednesday's antiwar demonstration in Los Angeles. Police reported those demonstrations were peaceful.

Bank of America branches have been a target for bombings since the late February of 1970—as well as some verbal attacks by left-wing radicals. Standard Oil of California has been verbally assaulted although not nearly to the same extent as the Bank, and had been relatively free from physical attacks.

The fire-bombing attempt at the American Option Book store in Chico did no damage outside of scorching the outside wall, police said. No one was injured.

The bookstore is about three blocks from a bank of America branch where a bomb attempt was made on a building at Standard Oil of California plant which refines oil for the petroleum industry.

Nader Claims Loophole In Smog Controls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer advocate Ralph Nader has charged that automobile emission standards proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency would permit cars to emit more than twice as much smog-producing hydrocarbons as Congress intended.

In comments submitted Tuesday to EPA administrator William D. Ruckelshaus, Nader said that when Congress in the Clean Air Act of 1970, required a 90 per cent reduction of such emissions by 1975, it believed the average 1970 car was emitting 2.2 grams of hydrocarbons per mile.

A 90 per cent reduction would have cut the emissions to 0.22 gram per mile.

But Nader said Ruckelshaus switched testing methods in proposing emission standards last Feb. 22.

The new test procedure indicated that 1970 cars emitted the equivalent of 4.6 grams of hydrocarbons per mile. Taking 90 per cent from that new level would permit emission of 0.46 gram per mile—more than twice the original expectation.

Nader said that "for purposes of legislative draftsmanship," the law set the standard in terms of a 90 per cent reduction rather than grams per mile, but that the intent of Congress was clear from the history of the bill.

John Esposto, Nader's environmental specialist, said in an interview he was not sure why "legislative draftsmanship" lawyers, he said, he was told it was "not good form" to write specific levels into law.

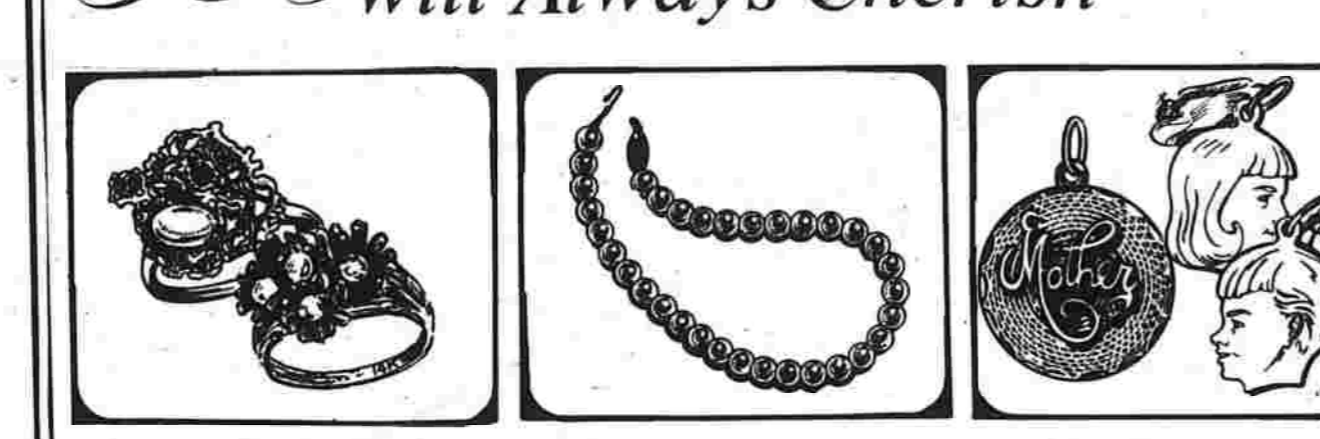

Nixon Legal Service Plan Promised a Major Revamp

WASHINGTON (AP) — against the federal government and barring the program's lawyers from taking any outside counsel.

The Democrats hope to write the Mondale proposal into an OEO bill being considered by the Senate Poverty subcommittee.

But acceptance of the principle is an abrupt turnaround from earlier resistance to any change in the Office of Economic Opportunity's anti-poverty program.

Nixon's proposal, outlined to Congress Wednesday, would eliminate a governor's veto over the OEO director's appointment and allow the OEO director to override such a veto.

The administration proposals call for an 11-member bipartisan board appointed by the President to handle legal services for the poor.

Senate Democrats said that the plan is a rival plan by Sen. Walter F. Mondale, D-Minn., which would establish an independent corporation with a board of directors.

"The central issue in the controversy surrounding the legal services program," Mondale said, "has been the independence of lawyers serving the poor."

If these lawyers are not free from all political pressures, if they cannot represent their clients without interference from vested interests, then legal services for the poor is a sham, he said.

Mud Slide Victims Glued to TV Sets As Tragedy Struck

ST. JEAN VIANNET, Quebec, (AP) — Many of St. Jean Viannet's 1,200 people were watching the Stanley Cup hockey final on television when the disaster struck, and they were glued to their sets as the tragedy unfolded.

The rescue workers to other the out-also soon after the disaster, ground began giving way, tumbling down into the crater that widened into a sea of mud. Today five bodies had been recovered and no hope was held for 38 missing persons.

Francis Richard was watching the hockey game when he heard shouting and ran 700 yards down the mountain. He saw houses falling one by one, dropping "100 feet into nowhere."

"It just got the kids and wife out of the house in time," he said.

An entire street and part of another were pulled into the grayish mud pit about 700 feet wide and more than 100 feet deep.

A government geologist, Jean-Yves Chagnon, said the cave-ins may have been caused by erosion of sandy soil at the base of the mountain, according to the report of the coroner's jury. The report was filed in a court in Montreal Tuesday.

Chagnon said the erosion occurred in the area 118 miles north of Quebec City. He said he did not expect any more slides.

"But if it rains for two days, it could mean trouble," Chagnon said. He expects that a lot of rain could start sludge flowing down the new canyon and undercut the river banks elsewhere.

The small river which runs through the crater swept most of the houses down the valley to where it joins the Saguenay River.

There rescue workers probed the debris with long metal poles in search of bodies.

Kentham Laforgue, his pregnant wife and their three children were in one of the first houses to slide into the pit.

The bangs dropped more people who were seriously injured in an accident on Marrow floating mound of earth. The chink split and Laforgue's family sank into the mud as if in quicksand. He jumped off and found his way to the edge of the crater.

"He used his brute strength by pulling on anything he could find," said his mother.

His wife was hospitalized for shock and was not allowed to visit.

Larger States Delaying Work on Welfare Reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — The welfare of big states will give substantial relief to the federal government, but that the cities, with more massive Social Security-welfare measures.

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways and Means Committee, told newsmen various proposals to protect states against increases in welfare costs are under discussion, but no decisions have been made.

The committee, he said, still is awaiting full cost figures from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Nineteen states pay a higher welfare benefit scale than the \$2,400 for a family of four contemplated in the incomplete bill. As welfare rolls increase, these states are in danger of having any savings provided by the bill wiped out.

A few large states, such as New York and California, are especially vulnerable.

Proposals under consideration, Mills said, would involve guaranteeing that such states would not have to contribute more state funds to maintain their programs than they are now expending, or at least that they would be guaranteed against increases.

He said he still hopes to have the bill ready for House action before the end of May.

Yale Strike Supporters Told to Avoid Violence

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Negotiations between Yale University and a union representing 1,100 striking employees could end without progress Wednesday, while the leader of the union warned sympathetic students to keep their sympathy non-violent.

The labor leader, Vincent Strabala, said some among the students were counseling violence. "Don't do it," he said. "If there's one way we can lose this, it's for a bunch of cocky kids to go off half-cocked in the guise of helping us."

The strike has been on since Friday, with most of Yale's dining facilities shut down. The students want pay increases, and many of the students say they sympathize with them.
