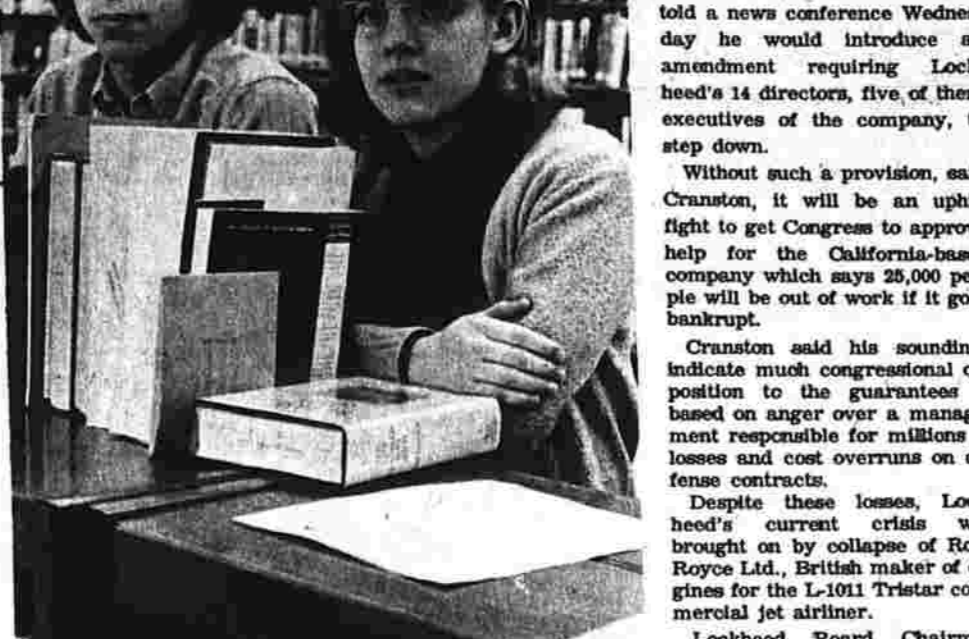

Many legends surround the discovery of tea. Some say it was discovered by accident when a Chinese official was boiling water in a pot of water to boil some of the scorched leaves from the fire fell into the pot. Intrigued by the aroma, the emperor tasted it, liked it, experimented further, and so we have tea. The date given is 2737 B.C.

The Japanese and Indian peoples have a different story concerning an Indian Buddhist monk, the monk named Darma, who had brought with him tea leaves from his native China. He was greatly revered and able to convince his people that tea was a healthful beverage in England and had surpassed coffee in popularity.

The very best tea comes from the tea bushes in the hills. There are three basic teas — black or fermented, green or unfermented and white or semi-fermented, the latter a combination of black and green. Of the three, black is the most common used. The designations orange pekoe and first flush are grades. The finest tea is made of the first one or two tiny leaves of the bud and stem of each twig. The third and fourth leaves are used only in country teas.

The flavor of tea will vary from one plantation to another and from season to season. Most of the tea we drink is a blend of an almost every blend contains some proportion of Indian tea.

(Continued from Page One) you not only ignore your obligation of humane treatment of the prisoner you hold, but you show your own meanness toward those of your own men who have been captured defending your cause.

North Vietnam and the Viet Cong continued to insist today that the United States set a "reasonable" withdrawal date for its troops before other questions, including prisoner releases, are brought up.

Earlier, North Vietnam accused President Nixon of ruling chances for peace in Vietnam after the United States agreed to halt bombing of the North late in 1968.

North Vietnamese Minister of State Xuan Thuy speaking in Hanoi before the opening of the 13th plenary session of the Vietnam peace talks, recalled that the Nov. 1, 1968, bombing halt had been agreed to in talks between him and Ambassador Averell Harriman, Lyndon B. Johnson was president at the time.

"Efforts for peace made by Mr. Harriman and me were, unfortunately, fought by Mr. Nixon," Thuy said. "He violated the agreement by continuing the bombing and other acts of war against the North."

Thuy said Nixon must take all the responsibility for the stalemate in the talks, which today entered their fourth year. The talks began May 18, 1968, between Hanoi and the United States and were expanded the following January to include the Viet Cong and South Vietnam.

Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh today at the head of the Viet Cong delegation in Hanoi, said the United States had agreed to set June 30 as the withdrawal date, "the question of a cease-fire, the Popular Armed Forces of Liberation and the American Army in South Vietnam, security for the withdrawing American troops and the question of prisoners of war."

Sales Tax Receipts Still Lag

HARTFORD (AP) — Connecticut's sales-tax receipts for the third quarter of the current fiscal year took a turn for the better but still lagged far behind the income needed to substantially reduce the state deficit.

Sales-tax income for the first three quarters of the 1970-71 fiscal year show a disappointing increase of only 1.6 per cent over the comparable period of the previous fiscal year, according to figures released Wednesday by the Connecticut tax department.

State fiscal authorities had been hoping for a 4 per cent increase in buying for the current fiscal year but the economy slumped cut into consumer purchases.

The sales tax, backbone of the state's revenue system, has been a primary factor in the existing state deficit, which is expected to reach \$200 million when the two-year fiscal period ends June 30.

Sales-tax collections for the three-month period from January through March amounted to \$82.3 million, compared to \$81.4 million for the comparable period a year ago, a 3.3 per cent increase.

Comparison of sales-tax revenue for the first and second quarters showed a 2.7 per cent increase followed by a 1.0 per cent decrease.

Other state revenues through the first 10 months of the fiscal year showed a one million dollar increase over the comparable period during the 1969-70 fiscal year.

These figures, released a day before the sales-tax report was out, prompted a statement from the governor's office that "although on the face of it this gain would appear to be encouraging, actually it falls short of expectations with only two months of the fiscal biennium left."
