And Now The Buses

We can all remember the hopeful fanfare with which the present management of the Connecticut Co. took over the peration of its bus lines. Everything that new equipment and progressive management could accomplish was going to be given its chance to reverse the decline in public patronage.

All that has really survived from this noble experiment has been the good will and the good intention of the management. It has not, like some railroad managements have done, deliberately conspired to downgrade its own service in order to discourage patronage in order to obtain permission to cancel its own passenger operations.

Otherwise, the experience of the bus lines has paralleled that of the railroads. Patronage has continued to decline. The bus company management has two ways of meeting such a situation, the first to get fare increases from the fewer riders it is getting; the second to discontinue lines where the higher fares operate to diminish still further the number of rid-

Nonetheless, although money cannot comes so close to being a necessity in the lives of a few citizens that it can be argued that the public itself has a duty to see that some such service is

It can be argued not only the need for some individual members of the public ought to be satisfied, but that we ought to maintain service against the possibility that there may be much greater need for it in days ahead when crowded highways and polluted air may dictate a reduction in the number of vehicles we operate getting to and from work, and in and out of our cities.

We now have in effect, for a similar problem with regard to the railroad passenger service, the so-called Amtrak solution, in which a government-created special corporation is hiring the railroads to operate the services they themselves would have liked to abandon.

It seems likely that, if we wish to maintain some basic system of bus transportation in the state, we are going to have to involve the state itself, either as the source of a subsidy to existing operations, or as an operator itself, indirect through state hiring of the bus companies to run their own routes, or direct, through state acquisition of the bus companies themselves.

Shining Example

One thing this kind of city really needs badly is a demonstration of how to place a casual bet on the horses. It tells us that the unsound spurious, and unprincipled formula is going to be the formula that works for ruined its own sponsors in the past history of society. And that part of ourselves which now peddles this line to us has, for its salesmen and spokesmen, some of our very best and most handsome political leaders.

Society's Children In Washington The nearly three constant weeks of ntiwar demonstrations in Washington, D.C., ended last week - and none too

For many Americans, the spectacle was just further proof that the country in general and the younger generation is particular is going to hell in a handbasket. To many moderate opponents of the war, such demonstrations inspire the anxiety that they will set back the "serious" anti-war efforts; the "I agree with your goals but disapprove of your means" agrument has been heard so many times that even I'm sick of it, and

And, for many young demonstrators there is the view that the war in Indochina continues despite their best ef-forts. This, plus the complaints of the "streight" citizens who were incon-venienced and the mass press-gang arto confirm the belief of many of the young that the society, as their rhetoric states, is piggish beyond all redemption. Although I wasn't exactly thrilled to

the depths by the events of the past few days, I would argue that these conclusions are, in the main wrong. The dem-onstrations don't indicate that there is anything wrong with the younger gen-eration, although many of them certain-ly were freaks, or neurotic adolescents, r radicals who really would like to pull the society down. Many more, however, were obviously bearing witness, in the old fundamentalist sense of the word, against something they see as morally wrong; those worried about the future of society might better worry about the young who were too spathetic or alienated to stir themselves in these past

You can fault the demonstrators on one thing — naivete. The idea that tying up traffic in Washington (which snaris lessly with a drizzle of rain or spit of snow) would accomplish anything drew yuks from the natives, and the idea hat anyone would suffer from the halting of business-as-usual in the Federal Government enlivened every coffee break in town. There was a lot of "no nemy would be so stupid as to bomb this place and end the confusion" hu

By the same token, skepticism is the first reaction to demonstration claims that their confrontations "raised the level of consciousness" of the war in the average citizen. That level had been raised to the point that the average citizen already was heartily sick of the matter, and the public-opinion polls undesire by the American people to be shut of the whole tragic, depressing business in Southeast Asia, I for one have been heartily sick of the subject for about six ter how morally driven, is going to raise

ny consciousness much more. Many young people seem to despair when their efforts don't show the iming for. Some of this, if they'll pardor me, is the result of vonth, the child's heing accustomed to dealing with parents whose responses renerally are immediate. Besides it's by no means sure that such results would be desirable. If Govental decisions and policy changes can be easily swayed by street demon-strations, as Weshington Post columnist William Rasberry perceptively not-ed last week, it can be for the bad as well as good. Other demonstrators, he points out, someday could possibly force a policy of racial apartheid — "or geno-

their nervous liberal sympathizers not-withstanding, antiwar demonstrations over the past few years have helped turn the country's policy in Vietnam around; they have persuaded more than they've antagonized. The spectacle of thousands and thousands of young people rioting in the streets and denouncing the society in such bitter terms has to be a sobering


xperience for anyone. You can be concerned about halting the spread of communism or aggression in Southeast Asia, but if the price is the loss of a generation or a good part of it, you do have to think about your policy,

Police are not pigs, as the young call them; they do reflect the attitudes and directives of the society that employs them. The comparatively mild treatment they afforded the young demonstrators reflects, to a great degree, the fact that those are society's children out there, and society, when all was said and done, didn't want them hurt. It takes longer for the individual to have an impact or society than on his immediate family but it does happen eventually.—JAMES R. DICKENSON IN THE NATIONAL

The roll-call vote for repeal was 120 to 32, despite warnings by some lawmakers that the action could jeopardize Connecticut's eligibility for \$8 million a year in federal highway funds.

But the law turned out to be unenforceable because of the vagueness of the regulations. In 1969, the Legislature enacted a bill that would amend the law to require motorcyclists on ly to carry helmets not necessarily to wear them. But, amid warnings of the loss of federal funds, the bill was recalled and amended to require the actual wearing of helmets. Then Gov. 



Sales Tax Receipts Still Lag

HARTFORD (AP) - Connecticut's sales-tax receipts for the third quarter of the current fiscal year took a turn for the better but still lagged far behind the income needed to substantially reduce the state def-

Sales-tax income for the first three quarters of the 1970-71 fiscal year show a disappointing increase of only 1.5 per cent over the comparable period of the previous fiscal year, accordng to figures released Wednesday by the Connecticut tax de-

State fiscal authorities had been hoping for a 6 per cent increase in buying for the current fiscal year but the economic slump cut into consumer

The sales tax, backbone of the state's revenue system, has been a primary factor in the existing state deficit, which is expected to reach \$262 million when the two-year fiscal period

ends June 30. Sales-tax collections for the three-month period from January through March amounted to \$59.3 million, compared to \$57.4 million for the comparable period a year ago, a 3.3 per

cent increase. Comparison of sales-tax rev enues for the first and second quarters showed a 2.7 per cent icrease followed by a 1.0 per Other state revenues through

the first 10 months of the fiscal year showed a one million dolar increase over the comparable period during the 1969-70 fiscal year. Those figures, released a day before the sales-tax report was out, prompted a statement from the governor's office that "al-
