

P. Rogers said today Senate approval of a 50 per cent cut in U.S. troop strength in Europe "would be a mistake of historic proportions" and "would signal the end" of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.





Principle Yes, Numbers No

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansield, after a long campaign to have the Senate take a more innocuous vote in avor of troop reduction in Europe, has now put his sentiment into a concrete proposal, in the form of a Senate resolution which would require that our mill tary manpower in Europe be cut from 300,000 to 150,000 men by the end of this

This proposal is being met with the strongest kind of opposition from the Nixon Administration, which means the executive branch, And since we doubt that even those who sympathize with Senator Mansfield's objectives will want to risk the precedent of voting for his kind of solution, it is likely that the

It has its interest and its significance, however, for it parallels other instincts which have been rising to the surface in the Senate lately. The key to its particular significance

lies in one of the criticisms the White House makes of it - that it would have "a serious detrimental effect on the structure of the alliance."

The "alliance" in question is, of ourse, the North Atlantic Treaty Or-And it is quite likely that Senator

Mansfield now regards this alliance as historic usefulness, so that he may even be intending to downgrade it. But what we now have on view

once again, the spectacle of the Senate threatening to renege, in particulars, on. a national commitment it itself once made in principle.

Not too many present members of the Senate were in the body when it ratified the NATO treaty, and thereby fixed the foreign policy of this country into the dead end pattern which has kept the United States and Russia locked into their mutual partitioning of Europe for this quarter century after the end of World War II.

Such ratification, or repeal, with direct attention to the principle involved, of the basic treaty under which our armed presence in Europe is maintained i the proper channel for the exercise of the wisdom of the Senate.

If it is unwilling to record itself on the principle involved, it should refrain from trying to make itself the executive commander-in-chief who decides how many troops shall be placed where and when in accordance with the NATO principle. The Senate could, back at the begin-

ning of NATO, have listened to the voice of the late Senator Robert A. Taft, who warned that it was needless folly. And the Senate may now be heading toward its own eventual realization that NATO has been one of the great mistakes in American foreign policy. But its possible unhappiness with the present existence of the treaty does not give it the right or duty or privilege of becoming our NATO commander in the troops permanently in Europe is a question of the kind the Senaté should have a right to decide, if it dares, and if it can. The numbers game belongs to the executive branch.

### Let's Be Consistent

New Hampshire has completed action on, and New Jersey has begun favorable action on, legislation which would make the age of 18 the legal age of majority. It seems to us that if the arguments which have been stampeding the country into giving the vote to our 18-yearolds are valid arguments, we cannot logically and consistently hang back from applying them to other privileges for which an age limit is now involved. If the 18-year-olds are to be entitled to vote, they should also be eligible to run and hold public office. They

should be able to assume contractua esponsibilities. They should be able to stand liable for their own acts. They should be able to buy their own drinks. They should be allowed to attend x-rated movies, and to marry without parental consent.

We have apparently chosen to regard the 18-year-olds as adults in the matter f voting, as we have long considered them adults for the business of fighting and dying for their country.

Having made that choice, we should be consistent, demonstrate that we have the courage of our own judgment and officially concede that, in all respects, everybody grows up faster nowadays than they used to.

### Patent Pending?

There are times when we think that the great computer-dominated laboratories have preempted the business of invention so that everything new and notable which comes into our living is more likely to be the result of concentrated application of existing intelligence rather than the result of any happy flash of inspiration,



**Confessions of Pardue Held Tale of Murders** 

NEW HAVEN (AP)—The man who was accused of bombing the police station and robbing a bank last year in Danbury told a grisly deathbed tale of five slayings and four bank robberies, the FBI here said Thursday.

The FBI said John R. Pardue Jr. admitted in a "dying declaration" that he participated in the robberies and four of the slayings. The fifth killing, the FBI said, was carried out by two men who helped in one of the bank robberies and were la-

two men who helped in one of the bank robberies and were later slain themselves.

Pardue, 28, was shot down April 8 by a federal guard when he allegedly pulled a sawed-off rifle and attempted to escape from his federal lockup. At the time, Pardue was on trial in Bridgeport in the Danbury robbery-bombings.

due indicated it was two days before the Union robbery that "the other person" killed his father and grandmother. Pardue allegedly told the FBI that the two were killed because his father refused to allow them to use his farm as a hideout.

Charles E. Weeks, special agent in charge of the Connecticut FBI, said Pardue requested an interview with an FBI agent last month after he was "informed by his doctors that his injuries were terminal." Pardue died April 29, shortly after being transferred to a hospital in Springfield, Mo.
