New Haven Tests Show Smoking Endangers Youth

NEW HAVEN (AP) - Thr physicians have concluded that cigarette smoking is causing "functional changes" and lung damage among New Haven area high school students.
The researchers said some of the cigarette damage "might be reversible on cessation of smok-ing" but "permanent effects, including premature arrest of lung development cannot be ex-cluded at this time."

The findings, published in the current issue of "Science," the weekly journal of the American Association for the Advancement tudy involving 356 high school

students.

Drs. Arend Bouhuys, Jenet E.
Seeley and Eugenia Zuskin were
at Yale University when they
made the study. Dr. Bouhuys
is still at Yale, but Dr. Seeley is now at McGill University in Montreal and Dr. Zuskin has returned to her native Yugoslavia, The three said students who have been smoking for between one and five years cough excessively, produce phlegm as a result of irritation and have a shorthess of breath.

The smoking students also cannot inhale as much air as non

smokers, and there is evidence that the smokers may develop small airway obstructions, the report said.

The three physicians said antismoking propaganda that emphasizes the possibility of lung cancer in adult smokers has not significantly reduced the inci-

The antismoking campaign would be more effective, they said, if it pointed out immediate dangers of smoking to the





Union Goof

When Mike was fired from his job as a mechanic, the company cited "incompetence" as the rea-son. But Mike thought the real reason was prejudice. At his re-quest, the union started the grievance machinery in motion. Eventually, the arbitrator ruled against him, But Mike, still not satisfied, decided to file a damage suit against the union itself. "They just didn't try hard enough," he argued in court. "At the arbitration hearing, the union

representatives didn't even know the facts of my case. Further-more, they forgot to tell me the date of the hearing, so I wasn't even there. They also forgot to keep record of proceedings." The court decided that the union had indeed fallen down on

its job and would have to pay damages to Mike. The judge said a union must show reasonable diligence in standing up for the rights of its members.

Most courts agree. However, that does not mean a union is liable every time a member's grievance is turned down. As a practical matter, the law gives a union considerable leeway in de-

ciding how to handle a particular grievance. In another case, involving discharged welder, the union flatly refused to ask for arbitra-tion at all. When the man took the matter to court, the union pointed out that he had repeatedy failed to show up for work. Thereupon, the court held that the union was exercising a legitimate discretion in not putting up a fight. A union that pushes weak grievances, said the court, would soon lose its effectiveness in pushing strong grievances.

Furthermore, a union may even be justified in favoring one group of members at the expense of another. Thus:

Two companies merged, raising questions of job seniority among their respective employees. Negotiating with management, the union worked out a compromise that left some men out of work. Could these men hold the union liable for "failing to the union liable for failing to represent" their interests?
No, said a court, so long as the union had acted in good faith. The judge said:

"The complete satisfaction of all who are represented is hardly let be averaged."

He had graduated from an Arab high school and had patched up his broken Hebrew with private lessons.

The Hadassan School fitted him in among African and Asian students studying under Israel's international aid pro-

gram.
Once a month he would go home. He would ride a bus into the heart of the desert and get off at a pre-arranged landmark, where his brother would be waiting with a horse for him, For 24 hours he would live a Bedouin existence with his parents, seven brothers and three sisters. Then he would travel back to the 20th century.

He won scholarships for three consecutive years of his medical studies, financed the rest with part-time work as a campus se-curity guard, public relations of-ficer and laboratory assistant. He now begins his internship at the Negev Central Hospital in Beersheba, and intends to

travel around the desert lectur-ing to Bedouins on hygiene and first aid. His chief goal involves break-ing through one of the Bedouin's most ancient taboos—he wants to persuade Bedouin fathers to let their daughters attend
