Both, perhaps, can unite in the memory of a bright blade of a young man, full of wit and good humor, inelligence and judgment, energy and ambition, as he stood, three decades ago, at the start of his public career.

It has been the difference between what were his own dreams then, and what were the expectations others had for him then, and the gradual accumulation of bitterness and disappointment in the ensuing career which has turned the story toward tragedy.

present public discussion is the joint supposition, both on the part of the attackers and defenders of the performance of the American media, that an attack on quality can be the route to control or suppression. There are elements in the Nixon Ad-

ministration which act as if they thought that, by enough proof of charges of bias in the functioning of the media, they can bludgeon their way to some control over the media, official or unoffi-

And there are elements in the media

which make the companion mistake of

acting as if any attack on the quality of their performance is automatically an attack on their right to exist and func-

The necessary corollary to that is that every one else has the perpetual freedom to criticize the performance of the

It is more important for the media to be continually examining their own performance, with the aim of making it more responsible and accurate and fair, than it is for them to be bristling against

That would be, incidentally, the best possible guarantee that there would never be any really formidable attack on their freedom.

Worse Than The Caveman

The particular circumstance which Israeli Premier Golda Meir found additionally painful in the death of Ephraim Istanbul was that "this was a man who had done no wrong." He had no involvement in the problem which concerned the Turkish terrorists. Nothing in his living had anything in the world to do with what happened to him when he was seized and held and then murdered in cold

For those who follow the crime news of our times, it will seem that the senseless way in which this particular diplomat became a victim is more the rule than the exception. The crime in which, so far as the criminals are concerned, the victim is an anonymous, inknown figure, without identity except for his official position, has seemed unsually frequent in recent years.

Sometimes it even seems that the more pointless a murder can appear, the more attraction it has for those sick people capable of committing it.

What is so patently senseless a crime, when it comes to such blind selection of victim, usually becomes doubly sensewhen its hoped-for accomplishments, if any, are measured.

They always succeed in advertising their own achievement of an unspeak able state of blind brutality.

Pressures For No-Fault Remain

The State Senate has predictably rejected any attempt to inaugurate a form of no-fault auto insurance in Connecticu this year, but the good senators have to be ever mindful the pressures for change are mounting and closing in on them.

How much longer can the legislators heed the opposition to no-fault of chiefly one group, that being the profession of trial lawyers, and continue to ignore the idespread support among the insursumer groups and yes, the state's editorialists, among others, is the explosive question awaiting them in the next ses-

The fact is, the existing system of auomobile insurance has been indicted and found guilty of being inadequate, inequitable and wasteful. A Department of Pransportation study found that accivictims recover but one-fifth their losses; that administrative and le gal costs eat up 55 cents of every premium dollar; and that litigation not only overburdens the courts but delays payment of compensation—the average wait

The fact is, those of the public who understand the no-fault concept are overwhelmingly in favor of it. A Gallup poll last April showed that among those who had knowledge of the plan, the support

The fact is, reports on the operation of the no-fault plan have been glowing. Adtedly, it has been in effect in Massachusetts only since January, but oppo-Puerto Rico, where the new concept has been in operation 17 months. It would appear the only unhappiness over nofault in Puerto Rico is being expressed by lawyers whose business has diminish-

The fact is, the federal government is breathing down the necks of the states on no-fault, and is very likely to enact a compulsory federal version if the states continue to drag their feet. The 19-14 Senate vote against no-fault on Wednesday (and 10 of the rejecting votes were cast by lawyer-legislators
