# Gardening

The letter from a shipping company that handles ocean freight said, in effect, "your stone lantern has arrived in Seattle; please tell us what to do with it."

"This was in August, 1967, and we said, in effect, 'please send the lantern along to Manchester.' It came, in October. On the way it had proved a shrewd custom official in two Connecticut cities and a headache to the operator.

It stands in front of the "lantern garden" just below the picture window in our living room on Westland St. Just now the lantern has in front of it a stand of broom-rod and yellow tulips. The variety, "United Europe," may reveal the political hopes of its originator in the Netherlands, and although Europe is not yet united, the tulips are very nice.

In the summer months we'll have petunias where the tulips are growing now and in the fall, if all goes well, the lantern will be nearly surrounded by pale yellow chrysanthemums. As flowers of oriental origin, the chrysanthemums are more appropriate than either the tulips or the petunias.

Made by Korean Stoneware The lantern is hand-carved from granite and is in three sections, a base, an octagonal portion which is pierced with openings so that a light can be placed in the center, and a stone cap shaped like the roof of a pagoda.

Our daughter, Joanna Atwood, was teaching school in South Korea when she had the lantern made by a Korean stoneware artist to be a yard ornament for the home provided for her by her employer, the Gulf Oil Corp. When Gulf closed the school and assigned Joanna to Denmark, she and I decided to have the lantern sent to Denmark or to her parents' home. She had the lantern sent to us.

We knew it was coming. Joanna came home in June and told us about the lantern. "Great," we said, "it will be in time for Margaret's wedding." Our middle daughter was being married in August and we were to have a reception in the backyard.

In July came a letter from the Gulf manager in South Korea. He said that through a mistake he had been assigned to the East Coast and he had already ordered it trucked from Seattle up to Bridgeport. Somebody had decided that Bridgeport was the nearest ocean port to Manchester.

It isn't, of course, but no matter. How long would you wait for a ship to leave Seattle home? Weeks passed. The wedding came and went. Then the lantern came to Bridgeport, not by ocean freighter, but by truck. A New Britain trucking company, making local deliveries for a transcontinental trucking firm, picked it up in Bridgeport, took it to New Britain and asked us what to do with it.

400 Pounds of Granite The lantern weighed 800 pounds and the wooden packing case weighed another 50 pounds. Could one man unload it at our house or would they have to send two men?

I thought one man could manage, since there is a retaining wall beside the entrance to our basement garage and the truck could be backed up to the wall and the lantern pushed out of the truck on planks. This happened eventually, but first came the detail of clearing the shipper's truck across the Pacific Ocean. Bringing it overland paid, and as instructed by the Korean manager of Gulf, sent the bill to his company and was reimbursed.

Getting the case open was a couple of hours' work. It was made of heavy planks, cut to fit, with bracing inside so that the three blocks of stone could not move in any direction. The lantern was entirely undamaged.

Two high school boys helped me set it in the garden, and there it stands. We have now-where it is in the summer. In winter it has a most interesting appearance when snow piles up on the pagoda roof. 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ton somewhere else. We wanted to have it cleared in Hartford, but the Customs office there knew nothing about our lantern, had no "papers" and flatly was not interested. The helpful Customs man in Bridgeport dictated over the telephone to my wife a letter that she should send to his authorizing transfer of the "papers" to the Hartford office.

The lantern was now back in New Britain. I took half a day off work to go to the Customs office, then to the New Britain trucker's, back to the Customs office, back to New Britain, back to Hartford and back to the "papers" finally in my hands. It was a guess but it turned out to be about right. Would I put a value of \$100 on it. I said that was too high. We agreed on \$50.

"Then, was it sculpture?" I said it was not. The Customs man found a category headed "Objects of stone, not ornamented," and checked me \$7.50. I thought this was very reasonable. The trucker's bill was another matter. Gulf had paid \$30 to have the lantern carried by freighter across the Pacific Ocean. **Bank Directors Age Limit Bill Passes House**  
HARTFORD (AP) — A bill aimed at making Connecticut banks more competitive and more progressive — in part by making elderly directors retire — was passed by the House Thursday.

The House acted after being urged by Rep. William Lyons, R-Norwalk, with a description of an elderly bank director whose hobby was going down to the bank and watching the tellers count the money.

The bill would set a mandatory retirement age of 72 for the members of banks' boards of directors.

The state Banking Department tried to get banks to adopt such rules voluntarily, but failed to persuade them, said Rep. Roy Ervin, R-Fairfield.

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Senate Blocks Delay On Silver Lane Work

Silver Lane in East Hartford, a continuation of Spencer St., Manchester, will be widened after all, thanks to a vote in the State Senate yesterday which negated a delaying action in the House last week.

The Senate, by a 13 to 17 majority, rejected the bill which would have delayed widening of Silver Lane until such time as the Wilbur Cross Highway is widened to 10 lanes, between East Hartford and the Vernon Circle.

Manchester State Sen. David Odgers voted with the prevailing side — not to delay Silver Lane widening. When the bill to delay passed the House last week, Manchester's three state representatives voted for the delay.

Yesterday's Senate action was the second in two days on road bills which affect Manchester. On Wednesday, the Senate, by a 10 to 12 vote, defeated a bill which proposed an immediate halt to the planning and construction of an I-98 interchange, between the Pulman Bridge in Glastonbury and Laurel Lake in Manchester.

The widening had been given House approval last week. Senate action has killed both bills which were expected to proceed on widening Silver Lane and constructing the I-98 interchange.

The present two-lane State Highway 502 will be widened from 20 to 30 feet to a planned four lanes, from the vicinity of the intersection of the highway with new Rt. 6 (to be called 144) in Manchester.

The 1969 General Assembly had authorized \$2 million for widening Silver Lane and, to date, the state has spent about \$27,000 on plans and design.

The State Transportation Department has said it is ready to proceed with land acquisition and construction.

The widening had been opposed by the property owners whose land is involved. Immediate widening has been backed by East Hartford Mayor Richard Blakelock, by the East Hartford Town Council and by the East Hartford Planning and Zoning Commission.

East Hartford four legislators, all Democrats, were split evenly. State Rep. Harry Burke and State Rep. Richard Willard were for immediate construction and State Rep. George Hamon and State Rep. Daniel J. Ryan were against it.

Both Burke and Ryan were willing to provide more exposure to a broader cross-section of all levels of students. "This is the concept of the school-to-work" program, said Education Chairman Walter Doll Jr. summed up.
