First, they may hate the North Vietnamese, Communist way of life so much they do not want to return to it. You would think that the discovery of such a possible attitude would delight both Saigon and Washington, as a fine propaganda victory.

Strangely enough, Washington, at least, isn't happy the way it might be, and, instead of welcoming such proof that nobody chooses Communism, even when one has fought for it, has been suggesting that perhaps the prisoners have been receiving orders from Hanol directing them to refuse repatriation.

By this theory, Hanoi would be ordering its people to pretend not to want to go home in order to break up and frustrate the whole scheme for delivery of the prisoners. In that case, Hanoi, instead of feeling itself under pressure to reciprocate by releasing some American prisoners, would be busy attacking Salgon and Washington for their trickery in not delivering the North Vietnamese the complex web of life. prisoners they had originally agreed to

With this theory, we have now arrived at the point at which we apparently prefer to believe the North Vietnamese still really believe their system superior consequent escalation hodes no good for man, beast, or bird. to ours, but are pretending differently

HARTFORD (AP) - Three bills affecting welfare recipients were vetoed Tuesday by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill. One of the bills would provid

tax credit for 5 per cent of the cost to a company of setting up a day-care center on its grounds to tend young children of employes. It was devised to help ovide work for mothers who night otherwise seek welfare

"The purpose of this act is a good one," Meskill said in his eto statement. He refused to support, however, because did not carry an estimate of how much it would cost the state. A second bill returned to the egislature would ease the property restrictions on persons applying for welfare assistance Current law prohibits a person from giving away property to qualify for assistance. The pro posed change would make that restriction effective only during the three years preceding the

"I do not believe that we should make changes in our well fare which make it easier for more people to qualify," Mes-

The third vetoed bill would have changed the name of the State Welfare Department to the Department of Social Services. Meskill said the bill repre sents a new philosophy—one that he does not share—that "welfare is a right to be claimed rather than the benevolent gesture of a wealthy society."






