In most instances, the Connecticut r searchers found, it took repeated defoliation to kill trees that they studied in eight forest tracts of unmanaged wood land. Mortality was higher in the thrice defoliated plots than in undefoliated comparison areas but no different in the once-defoliated plot, it was concluded by

This information should be kept in mind by anyone who is trying to measure the pros and cons of spraying against the gypsy moth, Trees are sub ected to a certain amount of risk to avoid the heavy environmental damage that might be done by an insecticide, but the risk is not as great as it might appear from the mess made by the moths.

## **Groton Ceremony Launches** Navy's 100th Nuclear Sub

GROTON (AP) — Secretary of the Navy John H. Chafee launched the Navy's 100th nuclear-powered submarine Friday with a warning that America's control of the sea is being challenged by a Soviet submarine force already the world's largest and still grow-

submarine force already the world's largest and still growing.

Chafee said the Soviets' underwater fleet with about 350 subs, of which 92 are nuclear-powered, is three times the size of the United States'. And he noted that each year the Soviets are building three subs to every one the U.S. produces.

"It is one of the principal tragedies of our time," he said, "that the resources of the nations must be poured into expen-sive, sophisticated and deadly weaponry which, if all goes well, will be eventually retired to retire in peace with no-tubes unused except for the practice required to keep her sharp and credible.
