Hanoi Rejects The Bait

Now that the attempted release of North Vietnamese prisoners has collegeed, the episode seems in retrospect what some comment anticipated. Hanoi, having detected Washington in

an ornate propaganda pressure play, decided not to play along. The best guess would seem to be that

Hanoi got word to its prisoners that it expected them to refuse the opportunity to be released, and that, when 13 out of 660 somehow still agreed to be released. Hanoi then refused to accept them on the ground that the United States and South Vietnam had played a cruel joke by promising so many and delivering so few.

The objective the United States had in mind in trying to organise this release in the first place was to try to reverse the normal tradition and practice of war, and inaugurate the release of prisoners before, instead of after, the end of the

This has always seemed a dead end policy road for the Nixon Administration to be trying to follow, and it is to be noted that recently some of the peonie who have the right to care most -

some of the wives and relatives of the Americans being held prisoner by Hano have begun making public their own belief that the only way to get our prisoners freed is to end the war.

That President Nixon is striving to enthe war - or at least American participation in it - few would deny. But the prisoner of war issue has never been an issue which could possibly contribute to the ending of the war; it has, to the contrary, been a dead end diversion from it. President Nixon's recented promise about the prisoners that we will remain in the war until the are released -amounts to a self-defeating threat to continue the war forever on a basis which would make an ending

Hanot has rejected an all too obvious piece of bait. It is time for Washington to abandon a strategy which is obviousy barren, and get closer, if it can, to some real negotiation in which, for a change, it is willing to give Hanoi something it may want in return for something we want.

The Cynical Believer

Reinhold Niebuhr was so realistic about the human condition that he seemed more of a cynic about everything than a believer in anything.

But after he stripped us down to our atural unworthiness and sin, and placed us safely outside the reach of any cheap or easy emotional kind of redempand warned us that we would always have more ill than good to work our own natures and in our own systems, he would then give us our assignments and apply the lash of

The only millenium he could conceive or dare fight for came in very small, sometimes tangible chunks, like a little more in a pay envelope. It sometimes seemed that his highest hope in political action was that the unworthy motivations of men might be sometime beguiled into good deeds they never in-

fore, was to keep a close and realistic eye on our own imperfections, and to work for systems which might contain and outwit them without straining too heavily for the nobler, but unattainable

much, so that in the end the trains of his thought stopped too conveniently at too many stations for the discharge and for the whole journey or understood its final destination. Between stations, however, he was a vital, articulate reminder and stimulator of that spirit-mind part of all of us which never stops trying.

The trial was ended and the prisoners discharged.

How "massive publicity" could possi-bly be minimised in a case commanding such public interest, or with defendants so caught up in a country-wide machine ry for arranging crowd-scenes and pseu-

do-events, we still do not know.

But a jury immovably divided, and a judge looking in conscience at the defendants, the charges and the law, closed out with responsibility and dignity a case needlessly hampered from its start by academic emotionalism, by manipulated public controversy, and by false predic-tions of politicised justice. Judge Mulvey's decision does not total-

y satisfy the hope that truth will be learly winnowed from the welter of contradictory fact in a courtroom. But it serves the needs of justice — and of a Panther - weary community. — NEW
