When, in special session, the 1971 General Assembly and Governor Meskill get down to doing the spending and taxing business they were supposed to have accomplished by last midnight, they will at least have accomplished a narrowing down and restriction of their own op-

The negotiations to which they gave the final 10 days of the session were nerotiations which were an exploration of the possibility for general agreement on the enactment of a state income tax. When the negotiations themselves fail-

ed to achieve agreement on that aim, two things happened. First, some of the leadership itself, including Governor Meskill, backed away from the near-aceptance of the income tax which had eatured the negotiation meetings. Second, an increasing number of legislators, spurred by undeniable public reaction against the income tax prospect, disamociated themselves from the income

The collapse of the negotiations which had the adoption of an income tax as the basic premise of their possible success left relatively little choice.

The state's fiscal crisis is going to be met, for the present at least, without resort to the income tax.

The alarming inference from such a possibility is that we may be lead poisoning ourselves into mental instability

**Curb Sought** To Disruption By Attorneys

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ser James L. Buckley said today he will introduce a bill to allow fe ral prosecutors to bring disba ment proceedings against law yers they deem guilty of "unbe coming" conduct. Such conduct would include

fraud, deceit, malpractice, incitement to riot, arson, espion else a U.S. attorney finds unacemly.

Punishment would be put in the hands of the court, and could include censure, suspen-sion or disbarment.
